British West Indies Trade To Be Partially Restored To Canada

OTTAWA, Oct. 30 — (Monday) — (CP) — The British West Indies market, severely curtailed by dollar import restrictions, will be partially restored to Canadian exporters Jan. 1.

The Trade Department today announced that through a dollar liberalization agreement, completed after months of negotiation, the B. W. I. colonies will out controls to allow for an increased flow of Canadian goods.

Bulgaria Threatens Expulsion Of 250,000 Turks

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29 — (AP) — Turkish Ambassador Feridun C. Erkin forecast today that the United Nations soon may be confronted with an urgent new cold war dispute — the threatened mass expulsion of 250,000 Turks from Communist Bulgaria.

Unless there is a prompt solution, the envoy said, Turkey will formally charge Bulgaria with a flagrant new violation of human rights, and appeal either for direct U.N. action or a ruling by the international court, an arm of the U.N.

On three months notice, Bulgaria has set a Nov. 10 deadline for the departure of uprooted Turkish residents and demanded that anti-Soviet Turkey accept them. Both Turkish protests and proposals for arbitration have been rejected in an angry exchange of notes during recent weeks.

Peace, National Security Top Issues In Current U. S. Political Campaign

 NEW YORK, Oct. 29 — (CP) — Peace and national security have colored the issues in the campaign for election of the 82nd United States Congress now entering its final week.

Party leaders, in statements to the nearly 70,000,000 eligible voters, are pretty close to agreement on what electioneering for the Nov. 7 off-year polling is all about.

The Democratic national chairman, William M. Boyle, Jr., put it this way:

"I believe that the voters chiefly are very deeply concerned with making sure that this country's positive efforts to obtain security and world peace are not interrupted and that our national prosperity is maintained and advanced."

The Republican national chairman, Guy George Gabrielson, said:

"The principal issue of the campaign is the demonstrated incompetence of the Democrat Congress and administration to achieve peace or maintain an adequate national defence."

The polling will result in election of a complete new House of Representatives — 435 members — and 36 senators, as well as governors in 33 states and a host of state and municipal officials.

Political classification of the present House is Democrats 259; Republicans 169; American Labor Party one; vacant six. Senate standing is Democrats 54; Republicans 42. Of these, seats held by 23 Democratic senators and 13 Republicans are up for election.

The polling, coming mid-way through the presidential four-year term, is called an "off-year" election. A complete House of Representatives has to be elected every two years. Senators have six-year terms and their election is staggered, 32 seats coming up for election every two years. In addition, four unexpired terms that are filled this year.

The Republicans need to gain seven Senate seats and 49 in the House to wrest control of Congress from the Democrats. Both parties predict gains but the best forecast is that the Democrats will retain control of both Houses.

Sweden's King Dies After Peaceful Reign Of Almost 43 Years

 STOCKHOLM, Sweden, Oct. 29 — (AP) — King Gustaf V of Sweden, Europe's oldest reigning monarch, died at Drottningholm Palace today at the age of 92, ending a peaceful reign of nearly 43 years. All Sweden was plunged into mourning.

With his death, his oldest son, Crown Prince Gustaf Adolf, 67, became Sweden's new king. The Crown Prince's wife, British-born Princess Louise, great-granddaughter of Britain's Queen Victoria and sister of Lord Louis Mountbatten, became the queen. Four-year-old Prince Carl Gustaf, great grandson of the late King, is the new Crown Prince.

The new King will be sworn in formally at a ceremony in the royal palace at 2 p.m. (6 a.m. EST) Monday. King Gustaf himself did away with the ancient coronation rites and substituted a simple state ceremony.

The Government of Premier Tage Erlander will resign Monday to give the new King the opportunity to appoint his own. He probably will re-appoint the same one.

The old monarch, who steered his country in neutrality through two world wars, died at 3:35 a. m. It was on a similarly cold, drizzly Sunday in 1907 that his father, King Oscar II, died.

Says Pyromaniac Caused Fires On Cruise Ships

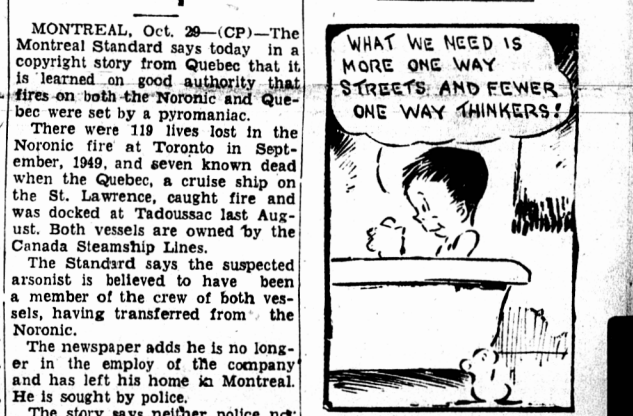
MONTREAL, Oct. 29 — (CP) — The Montreal Standard says today in a copyright story from Quebec that it is learned on good authority that fires on both the Noronic and Quebec were set by a pyromaniac.

There were 119 lives lost in the Noronic fire at Toronto in September, 1949, and seven known dead when the Quebec, a cruise ship on the St. Lawrence, caught fire and was docked at Tadoussac last August. Both vessels are owned by the Canada Steamship Lines.

The Standard says the suspected arsonist is believed to have been a member of the crew of both vessels, having transferred from the Noronic.

The newspaper adds he is no longer in the employ of the company and has left his home in Montreal. He is sought by police.

The story says neither police nor company officials would comment.

Sioux Lookout In Midst Of Gold Rush

SIoux LOOKOUT, Ont., Oct. 29 — (CP) — For more than 30 years Sioux Lookout has been the jumping-off place for mining rushes to the north. Now the Northwestern Ontario town has a gold rush in its back yard.

Prospectors who in past years stayed here only long enough to outfit themselves for the hinterland have come back to stake claims — if they can find open ground.

At night, Sioux Lookout streets look like a mining convention. There are mining men — from neatly-dressed engineers and promoters to rugged prospectors — from as far away as Yellowknife, N. W. T., and Quebec.

More than 30 companies have picked up properties.

Special Force To Number 11,000 Men

OTTAWA, Oct. 29 — (CP) — Canada's special force brigade, which may go to Korea but more likely will become part of the Atlantic Pact defensive wall in Western Europe, will number close to 11,000 men in its final form.

This will give it the strength of a self-supporting brigade with a front-line strength of between 5,000 and 6,000 men and some 5,000 men in reserve to replace any battle casualties.

A defence spokesman said that at the moment the brigade, divided at present split up in training groups at seven camps across Canada, numbers 9,806 including 9,542 other ranks and 264 officers.

In addition it will contain another 1,000 men who will be drawn from the permanent army on a volunteer basis.

Lists 6 Survival Secrets If Atom Bomb Explodes

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29 — (AP) — "You can survive!"

With that introduction, the United States Government put out Saturday its long-promised booklet telling everybody exactly what to do if an atom bomb falls.

You can live through an A-bomb raid, the Government said, if you're lucky enough not to be right under the bomb and if you follow these "six survival secrets":

1. Try to get shielded. If you have time, get down in a basement or subway. If you're caught outdoors, seek shelter alongside a building — or hump in any handy ditch or gutter.
2. Drop flat on the ground or floor. To keep from being tossed about or hit by flying objects, flatten out at the base of a wall or the bottom of a bank.
3. Bury your face in your arms. This will protect your face from flash burns, prevent temporary

Mr. Nowlan arrived from Fredericton, N. B., where he addressed the annual executive meeting of the New Brunswick Progressive Conservative Association on Thursday. Commenting on the breakup of the Liberal-Conservative coalition in Manitoba, he said that from the federal standpoint this change is being welcomed with satisfaction by Conservatives, as it means that party issues can now be more clearly defined. The coalition resulted in a great deal of confusion as between federal and provincial appeals.

Veteran Actor Dies At Hollywood

HOLLYWOOD, Oct. 29 — (AP) — Maurice Costello, 73, matinee idol of the gay 1890s who later became one of the great lovers of the films in the silent era, died today at Cedars of Lebanon Hospital.

Costello had been ill for some time and was admitted to the hospital Oct. 12 because of a heart ailment and complications. Frequent visitors during his last illness were his daughters, Dolores and Helene Costello, the former actresses.

The once famous actor was beset by illness in recent years and lived in obscurity. But in the old days he was a reigning favorite both on Broadway and in Hollywood.

Costello is generally credited with being the first of the great screen lovers; the first to receive fan mail and, as he once put it, the first to show temperment.

He first joined the movies in 1905, leaving a successful stage career to take a job with the old Vitagraph Company at \$30 a week.

HALIFAX, Oct. 29 — (CP) — Four Nova Scotians were killed in highway accidents during the weekend. Mrs. Sabra Hines, 74, of Lantz Sliding, 30 miles north of Halifax, died instantly when struck by a car near her home. Police said the car was driven by Lawrence Wright of Truro, N. S.

Returning home from a Halloween party, Roland Scott, 23, Roman Smith, 24, and Douglas MacQuarrie, 17, all of Pleasant River, N. S., 60 miles west of here, were killed when the car in which they were travelling left the highway and landed on its roof. Two other passengers were slightly injured.

News In Brief

CALCUTTA, India, Oct. 29 — (CP) — The Kalimpong correspondent for the newspaper Statesman said today that Chinese Communists who launched an attack on Tibet Tuesday now are said to be expected to aim a three-pronged drive on Lhasa, Tibetan capital.

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., Oct. 29 — (AP) — Senator Henry Cabot Lodge of the United States told Russia's Andrei Vishinsky politician Saturday the growing American military power is not meant for an offensive against the Soviet Union. He said "every child knows that" and advised the Russian bloc to "stop being afraid."

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Oct. 29 — (CP) — The hearings by the Board of Transport Commissioners on freight rates in Newfoundland adjourned Saturday until the first week in December to give counsel for the railway and the Newfoundland Government time to prepare legal arguments. The hearings had occupied two full weeks.

MONTREAL, Oct. 29 — (CP) — Canadian Pacific Railway Saturday reported net earnings of \$4,926,268 for September, an increase of \$2,710,832 compared with the corresponding month last year.

Gross earnings amounted to \$36,715,912 for the month against \$32,353,708 last year and working expenses to \$31,785,644 against \$30,338,072 in the same period last year.

Canteen At Pownal Is Destroyed

A canteen owned by Mr. Richard Jenkins, Pownal, was destroyed by fire shortly after noon yesterday. All contents in the canteen, used for supplying tourists in nearby cabins, were destroyed.

The fire broke out shortly after Mrs. Jenkins had finished preparing potato chips for dinner on the canteen's gas stove. She had returned to her dwelling house and in a short time noticed that the canteen was on fire.

Lost in the building were a refrigerator, a sum of money in the cash register. Menus were served in the canteen to tourists during the summer months.

City firemen responded to the call with the fire pumper but were unable to reach the fire before the building was destroyed. The canteen was equipped with fire hose but it was impossible to secure the hose. The loss is partially covered by insurance.

Eats 200 Sleeping Pills But Survives

MONTREAL, Oct. 29 — (CP) — Albert Belanger, 67, today was awakened in hospital from slumber that lasted all week-end after he had swallowed 200 sleeping pills. Belanger was arrested Friday on four charges of indecency and was to be arraigned in court Saturday. At the time of his arrest, he was eating "candy" that later turned out to be sleeping pills.

Federal Cabinet Shuffle May Take Place Shortly

 OTTAWA, Oct. 29 — (CP) — A Cabinet shuffle, opening the way for younger parliamentarians to step into the Federal Council, appears to be in the political cards, possibly before the new session of Parliament opens next February.

Two men mentioned recently in political speculation as potential Cabinet material are George McIlraith, able, 42-year-old parliamentary assistant to Trade Minister Howe, and George Prudham, 46, parliamentary assistant for Resources and Development.

Other possible appointees are Leslie Mutch, 53, parliamentary assistant for Veterans Affairs, Ralph Maybank, 60, parliamentary assistant for Mines and Technical Surveys, and James Sinclair, 42, parliamentary assistant for Finance.

The last Cabinet change came in August, when Prime Minister St.
