South says he has the idea that an expert bridge player makes one sensational bid or play after another and wins his points that way Nothing could be further from the truth. The fact is that the expert acquires his reputation chiefly from his source—he makes lots of mistakes than the next fellow. He seldom does anything really dramatic—the judge slugs away hand after hand and decision

after decision, trying to make four or five bid or play, as the case may be. His judgment is not warped by extraneous influences—he reasons things out coldly and to the best of his ability. If his logic leads him to make a play that could be classed as sensational, that is not the reason he makes the play—he does so solely because it is the right play. Here is a hand that features exceptional defense, the colorful kind. The deal was played in a tournament in Asheville, N. C. North-South to three no-trump and West (Mrs. Margaret Wagar, famed Atlanta expert) led the club clubs. Dummy's king won the trick, and on the East Hal McDonald, also of Atlanta) played 13-d Jack! Declarer then led a low heart to the ace, and on it Mrs. Wagar played the king! These two plays fixed South's way beyond repair. He couldn't do better than continue with hearts and when East got in with the jack, he returned a club and South went down two. But note that McDonald had failed to play the jack of clubs on the opening lead, the suit would have become blockaded so that it could not be run, and note also that if Mrs. Wagar had failed to drop the king of hearts of the ace, East would have been able to obtain the lead for the vital club return.
