Unemployment

Quite a large number of those registered at the local office as being out of work, are men who have returned from Upper Canada, or the neighboring provinces of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. Unemployment figures are more than 25 per cent higher than a year ago, but it is still true to say that by far the larger proportion of the workless are idle because of seasonal conditions. The T. Eaton Co. construction job on Kent street is as yet only in the preliminary stages, and is employing only a dozen laborers and carpenters, plus a few men engaged in excavating for the foundation, and some trucks to haul away the excavated clay. The carpenters are building a field office and store room and the laborers are demolishing the last portion of the old building which has occupied part of the site. A large number of these who are drawing benefits apply each day at the Employment office for work on the T. Eaton job, and the new High School as well. The applicants for work on these two projects would run into the hundreds, says National Employment officials. Most of the hundreds of job seekers are from Charlottetown but many travel to town from as far away as Murray Harbour and Souris to make their applications. Every day more than 200 city residents or those living close to the city receive their weekly benefit cheques and in one way or another the local office has upwards of 400 visitors during office hours. At night behind closed doors some members of the staff work overtime to keep abreast of the large volume of claims and paper work involved. The National Employment Office in Charlottetown has been advised that it is one of a number of Federal Government offices in the city, which will go on the five day week commencing on April 1. For some months now some of the larger National Employment offices in the Maritimes have observed the shortened week including the Regional Maritime headquarters office in Moncton. Although the office will be closed on Saturdays the staff will have a longer work day to offset the hours formerly worked on Saturday. This will probably mean an earlier starting time in the mornings and a later closing time in the evenings. At present the local office opens at 8:30 a.m. and closes at 5:00 o'clock in the evening.

Continued from page 1. by a delegation headed by H. H. Hannan, CFA president, called for enlargement of world markets, it also urged stiffening of anti-dumping legislation to protect growers against imports of foreign surpluses at depressed prices. The dairy industry, in particular, had to be safeguarded against low-cost imports and "unfair competition" from vegetable oils, the federation said. Other federation recommendations: 1. Federal supervision of the livestock industry should be established under the united authority of a board of livestock commissioners. Stop Speculation 2. The government should eliminate the speculative futures market by the Canadian Wheat Board in the marketing of coarse grains. 3. More winter grain storage should be erected in eastern Canada. 4. The U. S. import duties on Canadian potatoes either should be lowered or Canada should impose higher tolls on American potatoes. 5. In settlement of labor disputes, the government should insist on a secret ballot on all strike votes, supervised either by the federal or provincial labor departments. 6. Pensions should be paid to Canada's incurably crippled. 7. The government should resist local attempts to have the Central Experimental Farm at Ottawa moved from its present site. Turning to marketing policy, the federation maintained that reserves of storable foodstuffs be treated as "valuable assets" and not as liabilities.

Urges Provinces Do More Highway Work

EDMONTON, (CP)—Works Minister Winters said Thursday the federal government, which has made a cash outlay of about \$43,000,000 for the trans-Canada highway, has written the provinces urging them to do as much work on the route as possible. Mr. Winters said in an interview that the government reminded the provinces the trans-Canada agreement terminates in December, 1956. He said he could not anticipate what might be done beyond that date. A busy program for the highway was planned this year. Total allocation by the provinces was between \$130,000,000 and \$140,000,000, of which half would be provided by the federal government under the 1949 agreement.

OSLO, (CP)—A spill at the end of a difficult jump cost Tenley Albright her world figure-skating crown Friday night. Gundl Busch, first German to take the title since the Second World War, is the new champion. Barbara Gratton of Toronto won fourth place behind Britain's Erica Batchelor. Miss Albright, the defending champion from Boston, held a 22-81 point lead over her German challenger at the start of Friday's free-skating competition. Even after her fall at the end of a double loop jump, she was rated on a par with Miss Busch on the quality of her program. But her mishap gave her rival top marks in execution. Haves Alan Jenkins of the United States won the men's singles, Norris Bowden and Frances Dafoe of Toronto carried off the doubles crown, and the ice-dancing competition went to Jean Westwood and Larry Demmy of Britain.

The invitation of the governor-general, it was understood, was confined to asking the Queen Mother to be his guest at Government House here during the course of her American visit. No dates were mentioned. The Queen Mother is to be at the White House Nov. 4-6, but other details of her itinerary have not been announced. Fourth Visit Should she come to Canada, it would be British royalty's fourth visit to this country in 15 years. In 1939, she and the late King George toured the country from end to end, and then the present Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh followed their trail about two years ago. Next summer, the Duke is to make another but shorter visit—this time alone—travelling by air and spending much of his time in the West and Northwest.

Purchaser Praises Island Yorkshire

That Island swine continues to hold supremacy throughout the North American continent is shown in a letter received by Mr. W. Roland Paynter of French River from the purchaser of a Yorkshire boar "Payndale Emperor" 22-406470. Two years ago Mr. Paynter shipped the boar to Mr. Alex P. Bell of Franktown, Ontario. Recently Mr. Bell wrote the Island breeder to the effect that "Payndale Emperor" had sired the highest scoring litter in advanced registry in the Province of Ontario from May 1952 to May 1953 and that the owner had received a very coveted award as a result. The Ontario breeder notes that many swinemens in his Province have been importing Yorkshires from England; one of which he says cost \$2,500. Mr. Bell also purchased from Mr. Paynter a young sow which produced two litters which tied for 1st place in carcass score. Last Summer Mr. Paynter shipped another boar "Payndale Emperor 3 D" to the Experimental Farm at Lennoxville, P. Q. Previous to shipping, this boar had sired two litters, scoring 95. "This" says Mr. Paynter "is the only boar in Canada that ever sired two litters with such a high score." The French River breeder is also the owner of "Payndale Empress 336" which was junior and grand champion at the Charlottetown Exhibition last summer.

Transport Board May Make Tour

OTTAWA, (CP)—The board of transport commissioners may make a cross-country tour this spring to study railway commodity rates in connection with the equalization of Canadian freight rates. Mr. Justice J. D. Kearney, chief commissioner, mentioned the possibility Thursday during hearing of an application by west coast lumber operators for lower rates on lumber movements to prairie points. Mr. Kearney suggested earlier this week that all parties interested in a more equitable scale of lumber rates meet at a round-table conference. He suggested Thursday that these representations could be made to the board during a cross-country tour to study a variety of current commodity rates. The board travelled across Canada last year studying class rates.

Conservative Wins Alberta By-election

INNISFALL, Alta. (CP)—Progressive Conservative membership in the 81-seat Alberta legislature was increased to three with the election Friday of W. J. C. Kirby in the Red Deer by-election, a gain from Social Credit. The third count of ballots gave Mr. Kirby 3,385 and Donald Prescott, Red Deer Junior high school teacher and Social Credit candidate, 3,130. Four candidates ran in Monday's by-election, made necessary by the death in December in a highway accident of Hon. David Ure, Agriculture Minister. The first and second counts failed to give the majority required for election under Alberta's single-transferable-vote system of counting. The CPC candidate, Auburn C. Pyle, was the lowest on the first count and was eliminated for the second count with the second choices on his ballots distributed to the remaining three. Liberal nominee, George Roth was eliminated for the third count.
