Down Acadia 15-0 Saturday

Ch'town Nomads Capture Mar. Senior Rugby Ch'ship

Unleashing a powerful second half attack the Charlotteville Nomads overwhelmed the Acadia Hatchmen 15-0 at St. Dunstan's gridiron Saturday afternoon to win the Maritime Senior Rugby Championship and the right to advance against Acadia Axemen for the McCurdy Cup.

Leading 2-0 at half time on the strength of fullback Jack Ready's penalty kick the Nomads really poured on the pressure in the second half to rack up 13 more points on two tries by speedy Dave MacLeod, one by Dick Carroll and a convert and another penalty by Ready.

The Hatchmen showed a lot of fight in going down to defeat but their passing attacks and half line rushes were unsteady with frequent fumbles resulting.

When they did break away from the Nomads' frantic clutches the Acadia team looked to be a better one than the score would indicate. However they were up against a fiercely fighting Charlotteville squad that had been keyed up for this big one and were not to be denied victory.

Just about every member of the Nomads team played excellent football but the player who stood out most was Dave MacLeod. Dave's frequent running attacks left the Acadia defenders slightly unnerfed and both of his tries were things of beauty.

The Acadia kickoff was immediately brought back into the loser's zone and remained there for the best part of the half. But despite

the Nomads wide margin in play and their numerous sorties to the brink of paydirt the Hatchmen were a stubborn lot and fought with a grim vengeance to keep the Nomads from rolling in goal-dust.

Overweighed their scrum took a pushing around from the Nomads and their forwards were constant targets for the bonecrushing tackles of Fred Driscoll, Ron MacIvor and Big Charlie Ready. They stood their ground though and Ready's penalty at the 6 minute mark was the only scoring done.

George Kelly made a couple of fine runs and on one occasion crossed the line with the pigskin but the play was called back for an off-side.

Acadia came close a couple of times but the Nomads usually brought the play out of their zone before any damage could be done. The most dangerous attempt came when an Acadia player intercepted a Nomad pass and went flying down the field. But he was brought down at the centre stripe by Joe Coyle.

When Dave Nicholson scooped the ball from a scrum passed it to Driscoll. Freddie relayed to Clee Gillis who passed to Kelly.

Despite their big territorial margin and their 7 point lead the Nomads kept coming to the attack and MacLeod was back carrying the mail again to go over on a pass from Dick Carroll. It was a tough angle for a convert but Spy Ready made one of the nearest converts seen at S.D.U. this year and the Nomads were leading 12-0.

With the time running out, Dick Carroll slipped through after taking a relay from MacLeod and laid the ball on the turf to give the Nomads their big 15 points. Ready missed the convert from another rough angle but it didn't matter anyway.

Seconds later the whistle sounded the end of the game and the Charlotteville Nomads were the Maritime Senior Rugby Champions and on then were looking forward to meeting the Hatchmen's senior brothers the Axemen.

The victory was the Nomads sixth in a row and they will meet the Axemen here next Saturday for the McCurdy Cup.

Bruins, Canucks Win Saturday

MONTREAL (CP) — Montreal Canadiens came up with one of their best games of the National Hockey League season Saturday night, blanking Detroit Red Wings 3-0 before a crowd of 13,813.

The Montrealers counted one in each period, scoring two goals on power plays while the Wings were shorthanded, and outskated and outchecked the visitors all the way.

Goals were scored by Jean Beliveau, Bernie (Boom Boom) Geoffrion and Henri (Pocket Rocket) Richard scored for Canadiens, who tossed 32 shots at goalie Gleh Hall. The Detroit netminder played an outstanding game in restricting the winners to three goals. Jacques Plante, in the Montreal nets, had only 18 shots to handle but came up with the saves — particularly on shots by Gordy Howe, Ted Lindsay and Marty Pavelich — in earning his fourth shutout.

Plante Blanks Chicago 2-0

CHICAGO (AP) — Jacques Plante racked up his second shut-out in two nights as the Montreal Canadiens defeated Chicago Black Hawks 2-0 in a National Hockey League game Sunday night.

The league-leading Canadiens, two super stars, Maurice Rocket Richard and Jean Beliveau provided Plante with the goals he needed.

Richard's marker came with 45 seconds left to play in the second period and was the result of a neat bit of passing and skating on the part of the Rocket, his brother Henri and Inemate Dick Moore.

EIGHTH FOR ROCKET

It was Richard's eighth goal of the season.

Beliveau's 10th goal of the season came at the 18:10 mark of the final period. It was a hard shot from 30 feet out that handuffed Chicago goalie Al Rollins.

Toronto Upsets Ti-Cats 32-28

HAMILTON (CP) — Toronto Argonauts, their dazzling passing attack under quarterback Tom Dublinski working to perfection, played their finest game of the season Saturday as they came from behind in the final quarter to upset Hamilton Tiger-Cats 32-28 in the Wake Four football sudden-death semifinal.

Dublinski, hitting his receivers with deadly accuracy, came up with a sensational performance to guide the Argos to a thrilling victory before a Civic Stadium crowd of around 19,000. The lead in the tense, fought game changed hands five times and Argos only managed to pull out on top by driving for two converted touchdowns in the fourth quarter.

MONTREAL NEXT

The win made up in part for Argos' unimpressive record over the regular schedule, having barely squeaked into the three-team playoffs. They now will collide with Montreal Alouettes in Montreal next Saturday in the sudden-death final for the Big Four title and the right to represent the East in the Grey Cup final in Vancouver.

British Flat Season Ends

LONDON (AP) — The 1955 British flat season ended Saturday with Lady Zia Werhner heading the list of money winning owners. She won a total of \$46,345. Queen Elizabeth topped the list last year with \$40,993.

The Queen won prizes totalling \$10,579 this year.

Lady Zia Werhner's three-year-old filly Meld won three classes — the 1,000 Guineas, Oaks and St. Leger.

Frenchman Pierre Wertheimer was second with winnings of \$27,101. Most of that prize money came from Vimy's success in the valuable King George VI and Queen Elizabeth Stakes at Ascot.

Doug Smith retained the champion jockey title with 168 winners.

Toronto Upsets Ti-Cats 32-28

The Argos, underdog in the betting, blew a 12-point lead to let the Tiger-Cats tie the score at 14-14 by halftime. The Hamilton club went ahead twice in the third quarter by three points, 17-14 and 23-20 but then Argos, in a tremendous display of fighting spirit, came surging back in the last quarter to get in front for the third time and stay there.

DUBLINSKI PAYS OFF

Dublinski, the highest paid football player in Canada at \$17,500 for the season, tossed three touchdown passes and scored two himself after his passing got the Argos near the Hamilton goal line. The payoff passes went to Al Pfeifer, Bucky Curtis and Corky Tharp and Pfeifer converted all five touchdowns. Pfeifer also got another point when an attempted field goal went for a single. The other Argo point came on a kick by Gerry Doucette.

Dublinski's showing was only slightly better than the sensational games played by the Tiger-Cats' Ron Howell, rookie of the year in the 1954 Big Four season. The 19-year-old Howell scored three of Hamilton's four touchdowns, snaring passes from quarterback Nobby Wirkowski for two of them and racing 98 yards on a weaving kickoff return for the other.

Wirkowski, an Argonauts castoff, also fired three touchdown passes. Besides his two to Howell, he threw one to Frank McDonald for the final Hamilton score after the Argos had moved in front 32-23. Pfeifer converted four of the Tiger-Cats' four touchdowns. Steve Oneschuk boot a 21-yard field goal and Cam Fraser kicked two singles for Hamilton's other points.

Official Opening Of The Sports Arena Tonight

Formally known as the Forum the Sports Arena has taken on a new look since it was purchased by Messrs. Carl F. Burke and Fred Briggs early in September.

Extensive renovations and a near complete paint job have been carried out in the last couple of months.

The ladies dressing room complete with showers and ceramic tiled powder room is located in the old dressing room West side of the building. The room itself has been redecorated with a few new added fixtures.

The men's dressing room, a smoking room and two dressing rooms for hockey teams are located on the East side of the building. All have been completely redecorated, each having a lavatory of tiled walls and floors.

A ventilating system has been installed in the smoking room, which will allow the smoke to escape to the outside and greatly increase the comfort of smokers having their "between-periods" smoke.

Two Brooklyn Players Named On All-Star Team

NEW YORK (AP)—Brooklyn is the only club with more than one representative on the 1955 Associated Press major league all-star baseball team.

Nine of the 16 big league clubs are represented in the AP's 10th annual all-star squad, selected by 99 members of the Baseball Writers' Association of America. The seven National League players are honored along with three from the American League.

Duke Snider in the outfield and Roy Campanella behind the plate are the representatives from the world champion Dodgers. Oodly enough, the American League champion New York Yankees have only one member on the team—southpaw pitcher Whitey Ford.

The all-star team (batting and pitching records in parentheses): First base—Ted Kluszewski, Cincinnati Red Legs (.314). Second base—Nelson Fox, Chicago White Sox (.311). Third base—Eddie Mathews, Milwaukee Braves (.289). Shortstop—Ernie Banks, Chicago Cubs (.282).

Left field—Ted Williams, Boston Red Sox (.356). Centre field—Willie Mays, New York Giants (.319). Right field—Duke Sider, Brooklyn Dodgers (.309). Catcher—Roy Campanella, Dodgers (.318). Righthanded pitcher—Robin Roberts, Philadelphia Phillies (.23-14 3.30 e. r. a.). Lefthanded pitcher—Eddie (Whitey) Ford, Yankees (18-7 2.62 e. r. a.).

THREE HOLOVERS
Only three all-stars are holdovers from the 1954 team. They are Kluszewski, Mays and Snider. Stan Musial, whose batting average "slumped" to .319 for the second lowest mark of his brilliant career, failed to make the team for only the second time since the poll was inaugurated in 1946.

The power-packed squad, led by Williams' .356, batting average, shows six 300 hitters, five sluggers with more than 40 home runs each and six with more than 100 runs batted in. Surprisingly, it doesn't list the two 1955 batting champs—Al Kaline of Detroit and

Richie Ashburn of Philadelphia. Neither does it have the American League homerun king, Mickey Vernon of the Yankees, but Mays, with his 51 homers and Snider with his 138 RBIs (both major league highs) are included.

The biggest vote getter was Roberts, named on 92 ballots, four other righthanders received mention, Brooklyn's Don Newcombe, Cleveland's Early Wynn, Pittsburgh's Bob Friend and Boston's Frank Sullivan.

LETTIES BUNCHED
There was a much closer race for southpaw honors. Ford won the honors from Billy Pierce of the White Sox 55 votes to 37. Also named included Tommy Byrne of the Yankees and Cincinnati's Joe Nuxhall.

Of the remaining all-stars, only Campanella and Williams received stiff competition. Campanella, hard pressed by Berra, the Yankees' sturdy backstop, finally winning by six votes, 52 to 46.

Williams also had a six-vote margin over Kaline, the Tigers' brilliant outfielder.

Detroit Wings Play 0-0 Tie With Boston

BOSTON (CP) — Boston Bruins and Detroit Red Wings, who have yet to score a goal on each other this season, fought to their second successive scoreless tie in a National Hockey League game Sunday night.

As a result of the double-blanking the Bruins moved into third place with 17 points from 15 games and the Red Wings climbed from the cellar into fifth place with 13 points from 17 games.

Both goalies, Terry Sawchuk of Boston and rookie Glenn Hall of Detroit, were kept on the go, as the teams piled on the pressure to get the equalizer. Sawchuk, noting his fourth shutout, made 31 saves and Hall, getting his third shutout, made 29 stops.

Midway in the final period Hall was penalized for holding the puck for more than three seconds. Norm Ullman served out the penalty.

John Disley was awarded the Harvey Memorial Gold Cup for the best performance at the AAA championships in winning the 3,000-metre steeplechase in 8:56.6.

Hewson is Britain's best prospect for an Olympic gold medal next November at Melbourne in the 1,500-metre race. He also is a half-miler.
