Liquor Permit Refusal Is Reverse Decision

The P.E.I. Liquor Control Commission has reversed its decision to grant a liquor license in connection with the operation of a club in Southport. Arrangements had been previously made by John Bond and Paul Nicholson to lease the entire facilities of the Southport Country Club and operate it under the incorporated name of the Suburban Country Club.

Last week Mr. Bond and Mr. Nicholson appeared before the liquor commission and, according to them, the commission was satisfied that the proposed operations of the country club met all requirements for a liquor license.

The commission reportedly assured the two that a license would be granted and Mr. Bond and Mr. Nicholson were told to pick up the license in a few days.

When Mr. Bond and Mr. Nicholson returned for the license, the commission advised them that there had been a reversal of decision and a license would not be granted.

Mr. Bond said that "a considerable amount of money was spent in preparing the club for operation, most of which will be lost. In a sense, however, we were fortunate in that we found out no license would be granted before signing a lease and expensive contracts for entertainment."

It was also pointed out by Mr. Bond that the club was prepared to make the pool on the grounds available for Red Cross swimming classes and the ball field was to be available for sporting events.

Mr. Nicholson and Mr. Bond had a brief audience with Premier Walter R. Shaw on the matter this morning. Earlier, the premier told the press that the liquor control commission is an independent body and makes its own decisions on the granting of licenses and the operation of the Liquor Control Act.

Premier Shaw told the press, after the meeting with Mr. Bond and Mr. Nicholson, that the commission's decision against granting the license for the sale of liquor at the club is no reflection against the character and reputation of Mr. Bond and Mr. Nicholson.

Two Fined \$100 Each For Stills Possession

SUMMERSIDE — A St. Felix man, Edwin Joseph DesRoches, and a resident of Tignish, Edmund Joseph Peters, were each fined \$100 and costs or three months when they appeared before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in Prince County Court Tuesday on charges of illegal possession of stills contrary to the Excise Act.

A member of the RCMP testified that when apprehended in a wooded area in Killdare, the two accused had two complete stills and all apparatus to go with it. They were caught "in the act of running off illicit spirits," he said. Also seized at the same time was a 1957 car.

Milton John Fraser of Montague was fined \$75 and costs for driving while impaired. Three Lennox Island men, Joseph Lee Bernard, Freeman Austin Bernard and John Henry Bernard, all pleaded not guilty to charges of causing bodily harm to Stephen Bernard, also of Lennox Island, by punching and kicking him. The three accused were remanded in custody until July 6, 1965.

James Arthur Bearsto of Kensington was fined \$25 and costs for failing to display number plates on his vehicle. A Summerside man, David Joseph Bernard, was fined \$10 and costs on a charge of failing to transfer registration of a vehicle.

Brendon Wallace Murphy, Carleton Place, and Myron Turner, Winsloe, were each fined \$10 and costs while Ralph Buffett of Summerside was fined \$15 and costs on a similar charge. For driving without a license, Lloyd Charles Collicutt of Free-town was fined \$10 and costs.

Residents of Port Hill, Summerside, Darnley, Emerald, Breadalbane, and Miscouche were each fined \$20 and costs on charges of unlawful possession of liquor. A Tignish man and a resident of Central Bedouque were each fined \$20 and costs on separate charges of drunkenness.
