150 Man Minimum For Licensing Base

SOURIS — At a meeting of the East Kings Fishermen's Association held last night in Souris it was decided that the association make known its opposition to any reduction in benefits that may be brought about by the Government of Canada with regard to unemployment insurance for the fishermen.

At the meeting, which was chaired by president Harvey Pooe, it was decided to propose to the Department of Fisheries that a person given a lobster fishing license only if he possesses 150 traps.

It was also decided that all roads leading to fishing ports at the eastern Kings area now unimproved be paved immediately, namely the roads to, Nauffrage Harbor, Fortune Harbor, North Lake Harbor, MacCormacks Road and Basin Road.

Three people, Roland MacDonald, Leonard MacDonald, and Dan Ward were appointed permanent delegates to which they were invited.
