TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

CANADIAN. MONTREAL, July 9.

The night passed very quietly on the wharves, no disturbance at all taking place. Strong guards were kept up and Mayor Beaudry was on the wharf nearly all night to read the Riot Act if necessary. The volunteers were under arms all night, but were not called out.

Mr. Creighton, who was stabbed in the Windsor Hotel office by F. A. Goldstone, gradually sank during the night, and died about 10.30 to-day. He had recovered from the wound inflicted, but died from blood-poisoning.

THE WOUNDED PRESIDENT. EXECUTIVE MANSION, WASHINGTON, July 10.—1.30 p. m.

The following despatch has been sent by the surgeons in charge to the two consulting surgeons, Dr. Frank H. Hamilton and Dr. D. H. Agnew:—

Such slight changes have taken place in the President's condition since our telegram yesterday, as are of a favorable character. About 7 p. m. his bowels freely moved. Shortly afterwards he received a hypodermic injection of one quarter of a grain of morphine. He slept more naturally during the night than he has done since he was hurt, and this morning was comfortable. He takes his nourishment well and appears, on the whole, better than hitherto during the last twenty-four hours. He has taken altogether fourteen ounces of milk and one ounce of rum. This morning at 10.30 he again received ten grains of bisulphate of quina. Both yesterday and the day before, the wound was dressed antiseptically. This morning it was discharging rather less pus than yesterday, but its appearance is healthy.

The above is signed by the four physicians. COLUMBUS, OHIO, July 10.

Gov. Foster has proposed to the Governors of several States that a day of thanksgiving be fixed for the blessed deliverance of the President and for the evidence of God's goodness to this people and nation in the recovery of its ruler from the attempt upon his life.

NEWS FROM EUROPE. LONDON, July 9.

The Cornell University crew write to the Sportsman saying that they do not regard favorably the offer of the Dublin University Rowing Club to row three races, etc.; firstly because the date for the races fixed upon clashes with the date of their race with the Vienna University crew on August 5th; and secondly, because they have no boats or experienced sculler to compete. The letter concludes as follows:—"We have already informed the Dublin crew that we will row them a four-oared race at Putney next week, and now repeat it." The Cornell crew commenced practice at Putney on Thursday for participation in the Metropolitan Amateur Regatta on the 14th inst. The Metropolitan regatta committee unhesitatingly waived their rule that foreign crews should send in their entries by 1st of May.

The weather this morning is fine and not too hot for the grand review of Volunteers by the Queen in Great Park, at Windsor. The occasion will be observed as almost a complete holiday. The utmost interest is felt in the review by all classes, and it is anticipated that 100,000 spectators will be at Windsor to-day. The number of volunteers participating is 52,000, much the largest hitherto assembled. The review is considered as an experiment to test the possibility of rapid concentration of Volunteers, of whom there are about 200,000 in Great Britain. The two lines of Railway—the Great Western and the South Western—will have to do all the transportation from London. The troops will fall into line at three o'clock. The Queen will leave the Castle at five, under a royal salute, and proceed to Great Park, accompanied by the Princess and Princesses, the Duke of Cambridge, Commander-in-Chief, Generals Wolseley and Roberts and a brilliant staff. The march past will finish about eight o'clock in the evening, when the troops will march to the railway stations and depart forthwith.

Lefroy will be taken to East Grinstead to-day for examination, as the murder, it is supposed, took place there. The police deny that he made a confession. The steamship Britannic, while towing out, sprang a fresh leak in the engine room, which filled in a hour. She was towed into South Bay, of Wexford, and beached in five fathoms in a sheltered position on a smooth sandy bottom. The steamer Vandalia will be repaired on the Clyde. Her passengers will be sent thence to New York on one of the Atlantic liners.

A Paris correspondent telegraphs that Gen. Saussier arrived at Algiers on Friday. His arrival there may be regarded as an indirect pressure on Governor Grevy to resign, but it seems he disclaims the idea of accepting the civil and military governorship. A despatch from Tunis says preparations are being made at Goletta for cavalry embarkation of the French for Sfax.

PARIS, July 9. M. Asselin, who killed St. Victor, steward to the Countess Tallyrand, near Autun, in May last, was condemned to four months imprisonment, and to pay 100,000 francs to the family of the victim.

MELBOURNE, July 10. A new ministry has been formed in Victoria, Australia. Sir Bryan O'Leighlin, the Premier, is Colonial Treasurer and Attorney General.

Negotiations between St. Petersburg and the Vatican have been broken off.
