Canadian Agricultural Men May Visit Russian Northland

OTTAWA (CP) — Canadian agriculture scientists may go to Russia this year to see for themselves the scope of Soviet farm production in the north. Russia's resumption of nuclear testing last fall washed out arrangements for a reciprocal visit by northern specialists from the Soviet Union but there's a 50-50 chance that two northern Canadian agriculture specialists will carry on with the original plans, informants said here.

Russia had intended to send a 10-man team to view Canadian construction techniques, communications and other northern developments.

Similarities between conditions in the two countries extend to agriculture, where frosts are early, good soil limited, moisture scarce and permafrost perhaps only a few inches below the surface in summer. Canada's northern "farm belt" runs past the Arctic circle in the Mackenzie River Delta at Inuvik, The Yukon and Northwest

Mystery Is Reported Solved Of R. B. Bennett's Portrait

OTTAWA (CP) — A portrait of the late R. B. Bennett, Conservative prime minister of Canada from 1930 to 1935, has been hung in Prime Minister Diefenbaker's office, Mr. Diefenbaker told the Commons.

The portrait, a gift of Lord Beaverbrook and the University of New Brunswick, has been the subject of recent questions in the Senate and House of Commons. No one seemed to know where it was.

H. W. Herridge (CFP—Kootenay West), House leader of the CCF - New Democratic Party group, raised the subject, referring to a report that a prominent Calgary Liberal had a portrait of the Conservative leader.

Mr. Herridge asked if this was the one which had been sent to Ottawa by the University of New Brunswick.

He said the Liberals had already taken one CCF member—Hazan Argue, who resigned last week as parliamentary leader of the NDP—and he wondered if the Liberals were also trying to absorb Conservative leaders posthumously.

Mr. Diefenbaker said the Conservative party did not allow the Liberals to do that—even if J. W. Pickersgill (L—Bonaventure) (Twillingate) was "re-writing history for the benefit of the Liberal party." This was a reference to a book on the late W. L. Mackenzie King by Mr. Pickersgill, Mr. King's former private secretary.

"The picture in question, that was presented to the people of Canada by Lord Beaverbrook, hangs in the prime minister's office here—and is not in Calgary," Mr. Diefenbaker said.

"The mystery is solved," said Mr. Herridge.

Quebec Show Set Thursday

The Quebec Carnival Auto Show, under the auspices of the Quebec Chronicle-Telegraph will be officially opened at 4:30 p.m. Thursday, when Bonhomme Carnival will cut the ribbon at Place Laurier. "The Show-Place of Quebec".

Lasting three days the Carnival Auto Show will occupy the entire Mall of Place Laurier, Ste. Foy, as well as the mezzanine. It will be the first major show of any kind to take place at this location.

Carnival officials, representatives of Place Laurier, the Chronicle-Telegraph, and a broad slate of Quebec's automobile people, will be on hand with the Carnival Duchesses at the opening. Well over \$150,000 worth of new cars will be shown to the general public.

Part of the Winter Carnival, it is to be a major annual attraction for Place Laurier. Record attendances are forecast for this ambitious three-day spectacular event with French and English radio and television coverage expected.

The Quebec Chronicle-Telegraph, organizers of the auto show, are preparing a special edition to mark the occasion, containing full details of the 19-82 automobile trends, as well as pertinent data on buying cars, road safety, local background, historical material, etc.

Poachers Raid New Oyster Beds

OTTAWA (CP) — Oyster poachers in one or two areas of New Brunswick have removed shellfish transplanted from Prince Edward Island beds to rebuild depleted stocks, Fisheries Minister MacLean said in the Commons.

He added, however, in a reply to Herve J. Michael (L—Kent, N.B.) that there is cautious optimism that transplanting of 10,000 barrels of oysters from P.E.I. to New Brunswick has been successful.

The situation does look black, but, if you consider the matter further, another faint glimmer of hope appears. Maybe you can do West out of his trump trick if the cards are divided favorably.

You lead the jack of clubs and West ducks again. Obviously, he's no 'frens of yours or he would have covered the jack with the king. You finesse the club and then cash three diamond tricks, ending in dummy. Next you ruff a spade, reducing your trump holding to only the 10-9.

Now you play the A-K and another heart. Fortunately, East wins the heart as West follows suit.

Your work is done. The contract is in the bag. With only two tricks to go, you have two trumps left and so does West. Dummy at this point has the ace of clubs and ten of hearts.

East has to lead a spade or a diamond. Whichever he plays, you ruff. It doesn't matter what West does: His trump trick disappears. The king is snothered.

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
