Russian Action Sparks Comment

MOSCOW (Reuters) - Appointment of Gen. Mikhail I. Kazakov as Warsaw Pact chief of staff may signal a drive to streamline the Communist joint military organization, Western experts here said here. Kazakov, named to the post Tuesday night, has a reputation for operational efficiency after holding a series of top command positions in the Soviet Army. The Warsaw Pact change-over followed recent warnings by Leonid Brezhnev, Soviet Communist party leader, that the organization might be strengthened to meet "imperialist threats." The 65-year-old general was described today by observers as an aggressive and ambitious commander. As chief of staff, he takes over day-to-day control of the seven-nation military alliance, set up by the European members of the Soviet bloc in 1955 as communism's answer to the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

Winter Ventilation Of Livestock Buildings

Ventilation of livestock buildings is important any time of the year but during the winter months the problems are minimized because windows and doors may be left open for greater circulation of air. It is during the cold winter months, from December to April when ventilation presents the most headaches. Since the livestock barn is closed the humidity and related problems increase. In the past years a great many farmers accepted the fact that there would always be moisture and frost accumulation on the wall and roofs of their livestock barns during the cold winter months. FINANCIAL LOSS They could not see any great financial loss due to this condensation and so did very little to rectify it. Poor ventilation contributes to many of the health problems in livestock. In most cases pneumonia is a direct result. Condensation on walls causes wood decay and results in expensive repairs to the buildings.

WATER VAPOUR The second step in understanding ventilation is to realize that all livestock gives off a substantial amount of water vapor in their breath. For instance, a 1,000 lb. cow will give off 12 to 15 lbs. of water vapor in 24 hours. Of course considerable heat is also given off from these animals. This heat is needed to help vaporize the moisture and so should not be wasted by poor or no insulation.

In a well constructed building housing livestock if ventilation is not provided, the results will undoubtedly be a warm, moist unpleasant atmosphere. WET WALLS The third step is to understand what causes walls and ceilings of enclosed buildings to become wet. We know that warm air will absorb more moisture than cold air, and so when the warm moist stable air comes in contact with a cold wall, some of the moisture condenses out of the air and is deposited on the

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Exchange Manager Polices Hectic Vancouver Trading

VANCOUVER (CP) - Frank Pierce has been a quiet "policeman" behind the scenes during the recent chaotic weeks of trading on the Vancouver Stock Exchange.

Until Pyramid Mines Ltd. made its first announcement three weeks ago of favorable results of drill holes on its Pine Point area property in the Northwest Territories, volume on the exchange was averaging 700,000 shares a day.

Then Pyramid boomed, taking other speculative mining issues with it. Trading volume soared, one day establishing a record total of more than 6,000,000 shares traded. Volume now is in the range of 1,000,000 shares.

With the exchange suddenly in the national spotlight, Frank Pierce worked quietly to ensure a responsible and efficient market.

75 FLOOR TRADERS As floor manager, he is policeman and overseer for the 75 square inches of the fan. Protect the insulation against moisture by using a vapor barrier, such as four mil polythene plastic.

ESTIMATES ORDERS After receiving information from traders, he estimated the prospective buy and sell volumes and authorized the opening of trading only when a rough buy-sell balance was obtained.

During the day Mr. Pierce assists traders in the mechanics of their transactions. To eliminate favoritism in a situation where large blocks of stock are being offered, he uses numbered peas which he shakes and spreads among the first traders to approach.

He must also oversee general transactions among the 75 men on the floor. One trader offers a number of shares in an issue, which may then be accepted by another trader on behalf of a purchaser.

The trader who is selling for a client writes a triplicate ticket on the sale, keeps one copy, gives another to the buyer and the third to the exchange.

A trader is either given a "carte blanche" by clients to buy or sell in an issue at what he considers a favorable price, or a client will order a transaction to be handled only at a specific limiting figure.

Puritanism Hampering Automation

TORONTO (CP) - Part of society's concern about the effects of automation is a feeling that leisure is wrong and not to be indulged in, says a Toronto teacher.

Nora Hodgins, secretary treasurer of the Ontario Teachers Federation, says the feeling is a hangover from puritanism and the industrial revolution.

Speaking to a conference of suburban Willowdale women Wednesday, Miss Hodgins said leisure always has been "the sought-after ideal."

"Upper classes have always had leisure based on the work of other people. What's the difference between that and leisure based on the work of machines?"

Miss Hodgins said women will be acutely affected by increased leisure time. Husbands will have longer holidays and retire earlier, and "it's up to wives to help them plan constructively for a early retirement."
