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P.E.I. Rink Wins Twice; Saskatchewan Unbowed

HALIFAX (CP) — The standings were shuffled in the Canadian schoolboy curling championship Wednesday but Saskatchewan escaped unscathed and continued undefeated.

The Speers crew skipped by 15-year-old Mike Lukovich was held to low scores but still managed two victories, identical 5-4 wins, over Ontario and New Brunswick.

Most of the excitement was focused on the battle for second and third spots. Defending champion British Columbia returned to contention along with Manitoba as both posted double victories. B.C. edged Nova Scotia 9-8 in a thrilling match in the sixth round in the evening after beating winless Newfoundland 10-7 in the afternoon round.

Manitoba beat Northern Ontario 8-5 in the afternoon and then edged Quebec 7-6 in a thriller in the sixth round.

This gives B.C. five wins in six games. Manitoba has four wins in five games and has a game in hand.

Other sixth round results saw Alberta beat New Brunswick 11-4, the second loss of the day for Ron Sansom's Edmonton crew and Prince Edward Island won its second in a row, an 8-4 victory over Newfoundland.

QUEBEC EDGES N.S. In other fifth round play Quebec beat Nova Scotia 11-9 in an extra end, and Prince Edward Island beat Ontario 8-7 Alberta had a bye in the fifth and Northern Ontario in the sixth.

Trailing in the standings are New Brunswick with three losses and three wins, Nova Scotia, Northern Ontario, Alberta and Prince Edward Island with two wins and three losses, Ontario with a win and five losses and Newfoundland with no wins and six losses.

The sixth round saw some of the best draw play to date, particularly in the B.C.-Nova Scotia contest which brought applause from the fans.

Saskatchewan, which breezed through its earlier games with little difficulty, found tougher going against New Brunswick.

The Edmonton rink opened with a single, gave up one in the second and then in the third took a lead when Sansom on last rock gambled a sure single against a possible two and won.

Lukovich scored in the fourth but the next three ends were blank. Sansom missed an opportunity for one in the sixth when his last rock slid through an empty house.

BREAK IT OPEN In the eighth Saskatchewan broke it open. With Saskatchewan sitting a well-guarded two Sansom's last rock pushed a Saskatchewan guard into the house. In the 10th Lukovich cleaned the house with his last throw to blank the end.

Leading by five rocks Quebec should have won in 10 ends but a miss by skip Andy Hryciuk when Nova Scotia was sitting four gave Dick Rafuse of Bridgewater, N.S., the opportunity to make his last rock count for a total of five.

Hryciuk recovered the win in the 11th when his takeout of the Nova Scotia shot gave his rink two.

Prince Edward Island's first win came when Ontario's Wallace Smith of Alliston threw his last rock through an open house. If he had counted the match would have gone into extra ends.

It was P.E.I.'s best game as they overcame a four-point Ontario margin with five rocks in the seventh, eighth and ninth.

NEWFOUNDLAND TOUGH Newfoundland was surprisingly tough for B.C. At one point they held a 6-5 margin. However, John Munro's Salmon Arm rink counted four in the eighth to pull ahead.

Three rounds are scheduled today. In the 9:30 a.m. AST draw Ontario meets Alberta, Nova Scotia plays Prince Edward Island, Manitoba meets 3.C., Quebec meets Northern Ontario and Saskatchewan plays Newfoundland.

In the afternoon at 2:30 p.m. B.C. meets Northern Ontario, Saskatchewan plays Nova Scotia, Alberta plays Newfoundland, Ontario plays New Brunswick and Manitoba plays P.E.I. Quebec has a bye.

At 8 p.m. Newfoundland meets New Brunswick, Manitoba plays Saskatchewan, Northern Ontario goes against P.E.I., British Columbia plays Quebec and Alberta meets Nova Scotia. Ontario sits out.

TORONTO (CP)—First-place Montreal Canadiens, showing much more finesse and know-how, defeated Toronto Maple Leafs 4-2 Wednesday night to extend their National Hockey League lead over the faltering Leafs to a healthy 13 points.

The Canadiens went ahead 1-0 with their first shot of the night on the Toronto goal and never were behind in the proceedings which were dull at times, particularly in the second period when play became ragged.

Throughout most of the game the crowd of 13,750 razzed the second-place Leafs for their ineffectual play.

Jean Beliveau, Dick Moore, Ralph Backstrom and Henri Richard were the Montreal scorers while defencemen Allen Stanley and Tim Horton were the scorers for Leafs. Montreal went ahead 2-1 after the first period and put the game out of reach in the second session on Richard's 19th goal of the season.

Although Canadiens clearly outplayed Toronto, goalkeeper Johnny Bower in the Leaf nets made 19 saves against 27 for the masked Jacques Plante. But many of the Toronto shots were from far out.

GETS A GIFT Stanley was serving a charging penalty on Beliveau's goal at 2:47. It was a gift all the way.

Beliveau coasted down the right boards, slid a pass around the Toronto nets intended for Gilles Tremblay and the puck, which didn't leave the ice slithered past Bower who apparently had his eye on Tremblay. That was the first Montreal shot on goal.

Black Hawks Top Red Wings 6-4

CHICAGO (AP) — Fast period goals by Ab McDonald, Stan Mikita and Eric Nesterenko gave Chicago Black Hawks a 6-4 triumph over Detroit Red Wings in a wild National Hockey League game Wednesday night.

By winning, Hawks moved to within three points of second place Toronto Maple Leafs, who were beaten by Montreal. The loss dropped Red Wings into fifth place.

McDonald's goal, which tied the score at 4-4 midway in the final period came while two Red Wings were in the penalty box. One of the pair was Marc Boileau, who was serving a tripping penalty called against goalie Hank Bassen.

Chicago went ahead 5-4 at 17:03 when Mikita scored his second of the night and 22nd of the year. Bassen, who had just saved on Pierre Pilote, was flat on the ice when the puck sailed over his head into the cage.

Nesterenko's marker was sent into an empty net at 19:25 of the period after Wings had pulled Bassen in favor of a sixth skater.

Bobby Hull smacked in the opening goal for Chicago in the first period at 9:47. But Gerry Odrowski evened the count for Red Wings with a tally at 17:05.

But Mikita made it 2-1 for Chicago with his first goal of the night just 22 seconds later. And Hull widened the margin to 3-1 less than a minute later with his second counter of the night. That ran his goal total for the season to 37.

Alex Delvecchio closed the gap by one counter with a goal at 18:53.

Red Wings moved into the lead in the second period. Val Fonteyne deadlocked the contest at 9:32 with his fourth goal of the season. Norm Ullman slammed in No. 23 less than two minutes later to make it 4-3 for Detroit.

But Black Hawks stormed back in the third period and locked the game up.

NEW YORK (AP)—New York Rangers unleashed a brilliant third period comeback with a three goal barrage and shipped Boston 4-2 Wednesday night to extend Bruins' National Hockey League winless streak to 12.

A Madison Square Garden turnout of 13,700 saw Andy Hebenton produce the analyzer on a picture play goal midway in the final stanza. Defenceman Harry Howell then put Rangers ahead 3-2 on a long screened shot at 16:57.

Johnny Wilson provided the clincher with 23 seconds left, scoring into an empty net for his second goal of the night.

The wild game was marred by a stick swinging duel in the final period between Ted Green of Bruins and Guy Gendron of Rangers. Both players were given match penalties for deliberate intent to injure and were automatically ejected from the contest by referee.
