

Detroit Downs Yankees As Red Sox Blast A's

Righthander Frank Lary, who made his mark by beating the New York Yankees, did it again Monday with Al Kaline's hitting help as the Detroit Tigers rapped the world champs, 5-2, and trimmed their American League lead over idle Chicago to 3½ games.

The Yankees, swept in the two-game set, now have lost five of seven on the western trip. They open a three-game showdown series with the White Sox at Comiskey Park tonight.

Boston's Red Sox mauled Kansas City, 16-0, unloading six home runs and collecting 19 hits while Willard Nixon gained his first shutout in more than a year with a five-hitter.

Milwaukee's Braves, breezing with a 7½-game lead, played a night game in Philadelphia on the slim National League schedule.

The New York Giants again clobbered Cincinnati, this time 17-3, with a 19-hit barrage in the only other National League game.

REPEAT PERFORMANCE
Lary beat the champs for the second time in four decisions this year with an eight-hitter that included Mickey Mantle's two-run

33rd homer in the first inning. It was the fourth victory in a row for the 26-year-old Alabamian, now 6-15.

Kaline's 17th homer, third in two days against the Yanks, followed a hit batsman and a walk from southpaw Tommy Byrne, who didn't finish the first. Young Johnny Kucks relieved and gave up the other two runs on six hits the rest of the way as the four-place Tigers squared their season series with New York at 10-10.

TIED AGAIN
Mantle, again tied with Washington's Roy Sievers in home runs and runs batted in (89), hit twice in four at bats, raising his average to .377. Boston's Ted Williams also was 2-for-4, however, and retained his two-point edge with .379.

Frank Malzone hit two home runs, a double and a single for the Red Sox, who hammered four homers in a 10-run seventh. Jim Piersall, Norm Zauchin, Ted Lepcio, and Gene Stephens hit the other homers with Piersall, Malzone, Zauchin and Jackie Jensen each driving in three runs. Ralph

Terry, first of five A's pitchers, lost it.

The Giants counted two homers, by Danny O'Connell and Hank Sauer. The big attack, led by Cincinnati's 13 safe-season high of 32 hits in a nine-inning game.

Ray Monzant won his second after relieving Roy Crane in the fourth. Vince Amor was the loser as the Giants scored five in both the third and sixth and counted six in the seventh.

Willie Mays had a two-run triple in the fifth, but had only one other hit, keeping his runner-up average at .335—five points behind injured Stan Musial of St. Louis, the National League leader.

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Pinch-hitter Ron Northey came through with a bases-loaded single in the ninth inning to give the Philadelphia Phillies a 4-3 victory over the Milwaukee Braves Monday night.

Northey's hit, a liner into right field, came after reliever Ernie Johnson walked. Ted Kazanski and yielded a single to Chico Fernandez. Harry Anderson batted for catcher Joe Lonnett and was purposely passed.

Northey's hit capped the relief work of Dick Farrell, who took over from Jack Sanford.

The Phils' victory nicked half a game from the Braves' National League lead, leaving them seven games ahead of Brooklyn and St. Louis, both idle.

Talking About Fight

Sir.—Of course everybody is still talking about the Howard and Soares fight and fight fans will be discussing that encounter until another Howard and Soares scrap comes along.

A large gathering of boxing fans flocked to the Civic Stadium Friday to witness one of the best action packed professional cards ever seen in an island ring. Rugged "Kid" Howard of Halifax, Canadian Lightweight champion and Bobby Soares fighting out of Boston battered each other for ten three minute rounds. Howard, the older and more experienced and heavier by pounds chased the New England fighter around the ring for ten rounds and repeatedly worked him into a corner where he flailed away with both hands to the head and body. He could do little damage upstairs for the Boston fighter elected to fight from a crouch covering his face and head with his gloves and forearms.

Soares' inexperience was plainly noticeable after the opening round he came out fighting in an upright position but a smashing right hook to the body brought him down to a crouch he favoured for the rest of the night. There were no knock downs; Soares took a pounding about the body, however he was never in serious trouble. It was obvious both had been well trained for the bout, they had the benefit of expert advice in their corners between rounds.

Howard listened to veteran fight manager Murray Langford the latter is a nephew of the original Sam Langford. In the other corner Soares nodded as Lem Moore told him how to fight. The two judges and referee all voted for Howard.

Prince County's Bud Ramsay ran into a human buzz saw in the person of Bud Cochran of Boston in the semi-final scheduled for 6 rounds. Cochran unleashed his heavy artillery in the third he hit the Alberton native with a series of lefts and rights to the body, the payoff punch was a short jolting right hook under the heart, it was several minutes before Ramsay was able to leave the ring under his own power.

In other bouts on the card, fight fans saw a new fighter in Walter "Peanuts" Arsenault not new in the ordinary sense of words but a youngster who has developed into a cool methodical fighter from the wild swinging Steele at the Sports Arena on his first appearance here in upstaging highly pre fight favorite Buzzy Urquhart former Maritime welterweight champion. Arsenault also upset the odds merchants who prior to the fight were willing to be 2 to 1 on Urquhart.

It was a light heavyweight champion, Monday was signed for a 10-round bout against Billy Besmanoff of Munich, Germany. Promoter Nick Londeas said the fight will be staged at Olympia Stadium Sept. 25. It will be televised.

Durelle, of Baie Ste. Anne, N.B. fought light heavy contender Tony Anthony to a draw here in June.

Middleweight Bout Stopped As James Norris Takes Ill

NEW YORK (AP) — Promoter James D. Norris was stricken by food poisoning and taken to hospital late Monday. The illness forced postponement of a meeting with middleweight champion Sugar Ray Robinson threatened with loss of his title earlier in the day by the state athletic commission.

Norris, 50, became ill in International Boxing Club offices shortly before Robinson showed up.

Robinson had arranged the meeting after the commission ruled he had to fight Carmen Basilio Sept. 23 as scheduled or face possible loss of the 160-pound crown. The champs' advisers had urged him to threaten out his troubles with Norris in a meeting with the IBC president.

Truman Gibson, IBC secretary announced negotiations in the title fight have been shelved temporarily.

Robinson added, however, that "we'll try the best we can to make the fight. I guess we'll all be glad if we can."

The three-man commission, headed by chairman Julius Helfand, ruled after a stormy hearing Monday, that Sugar Ray had to meet Basilio at the Yankee Stadium under terms of a commission contract calling for radio, movies and theatre television.

Robinson told the commission he would report "if my health permits" but said he would walk out of the ring if there were radio, television or any cameras except still cameras for newspapers.

He wound up a stormy session, punctuated by acrimonious exchanges with Helfand, by threatening to sue the commission, the state and the International Boxing Club.

The commission contract signed by Robinson Basilio and Norris specifically includes radio broadcast movies and theatre television.

Robinson and Norris have been deadlocked over differing interpretations of "ancillary rights" mentioned in a separate agreement and over which company should handle the closed circuit telecast to theatres.

Redlegs Lose Big Gus Bell

CINCINNATI (AP)—Cincinnati Redlegs Monday lost outfielder Gus Bell for the remainder of the season because of an injury. They recalled Bob Thurman from Seattle of the Pacific Coast League.

At the same time, they asked for waivers on pitcher Vincente Amor in order to make room for Thurman. No player can be placed on the disabled list after Aug. 1.

X-rays showed that Bell suffered a fracture of a small bone in his right foot in a sliding mishap in Pittsburgh last week.

They were cocksure about their pitching but concerned about how well they will hit in the three-game showdown that opens tonight in Comiskey Park.

The Yanks were four games ahead of the Sox before New York's match with Detroit Monday.

So the Chicago series will bear a "must win" label for the contenders in the American League pennant race.

Manager Al Lopez said that the Sox were in better physical shape to face the Yankees than they have been for a long time.

"I'm not worried about our pitching," he said.

But, switching to the subject of hitting, he added that outfielder Larry Doby and catcher Sherman Lollar "have to give us the boost we need."

Luck Will Decide Winner Of Hambletonian Race

DUQUOIN, Ill. (AP)—Just plain luck will pay the most important part in determining today's winner of the \$111,126 Hambletonian at the Duquoin State Fairgrounds.

That is the opinion of 77-year-old Fred Egan of Orlando, Fla. driver ever to win the all-aged trotting stake, which this year was shifted from Goshen, N.Y. and carries the second largest purse in the event's 32-year history. He won in 1940 and 1949.

The sharp-minded dean of harness racing will be aiming for his third Hambletonian triumph with Cassin Hanover, an unofficial 8-1 shot in the big stake which will have no pari-mutuel betting for the first time since 1940.

"In the Hambletonian, luck is 75 per cent of it," said Egan. "Maneuvering — or brainwork — of the driver is important, but you have to have luck to be able to take advantage of your driving skill."

Egan, a great sentimental favorite, likes Hoot Song, driven by Ralph Baldwin; Hickory Smoke and driver John Simpson; Buckeye Demon and Harrison Hoyt, and Major Newport and Del Cameron.

All of these are even money choices except Major Newport, quoted at 3-1.

The field of 21 three-year-olds, which includes only four fillies, will be trotted in divisions for the first time. Two heats in each of the two divisions will reduce the field for the decisive mile. It will be contested by two, three or four horses, depending on the outcome of the heats.

The first heat of the first division will open the Hambletonian competition on the fast clay mile oval at 4:45 p.m. ADT. The championship mile will start at about 6:50 p.m.

A crowd of 50,000 is expected. About 16,000 at Goshen, where the Hambletonian had been a fixture since 1930.
