## Accident Prevention Is Speaker's Theme

Norman Simmons, National Executive Director of the Canadian Industrial Safety Association, was guest speaker at the weekly luncheon meeting of Rotary held at the Charlottetown hotel yesterday.

Co-chairman was A. A. Scales (centre) and Chairman Walter Auld (right), by chairman Walter Auld and thanked by co-chairman Austin Scales.

President John Simmons expressed the thanks of the club to W. H. Hancock, chairman of the Easter Seal Campaign and co-chairman Dr. John Craig for a job well done entailing several weeks of crisscross work.

Head table guests were Hon. H. W. Wedge, Minister of Welfare and Labor, Wilfred MacAleer, Chairman, Labor Board and J. M. McAlduff, Board member.

President John Simmons extended a special welcome to R. B. Gray, New Zealand Trade Commissioner and R. A. Seath of the Commissioners office, Montreal, George Bouché, Toronto was also a guest. Keith Clark, St. John's, Nfld., and Rev. E. M. B. Wheelock were listing Rotarians.

"Last year in the United States more than 93,000 persons were killed in occupational accidents, over 9 million injured with a financial loss of 13 billion 600,000," Mr. Simmons said.

A pro-rata forecast for 1962 in Canadian industry indicates 1,000 deaths, 60,000 accidents of a severe nature and 90,000 minor accidents. The cost to Canada is forecast to exceed \$12 million, he stated.

The speaker referring to road accidents pointed out the wide acceptance of safety belts in cars and vividly described a personal involvement in which two occupants of a car not wearing belts, were killed in a collision while he and his companion wearing belts in the other car, received only a minor shaking-up.

"In a city corner crossing accidents at 35 miles per hour, or under, seat-belt occupants have five times the chance to avoid serious injury," he said.

Through the activities of the Canadian Industrial Safety Association, safety lectures are now being given by members of the faculty at both MacMaster University and Queen's University, the speaker said.

Tribute was paid by Mr. Simmons to Wilfred MacAleer of Charlottetown and his associates in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick for their outstanding work in the formative policy stages of the C.I.S.A.

The speaker was introduced by chairman Walter Auld and thanked by co-chairman Austin Scales.

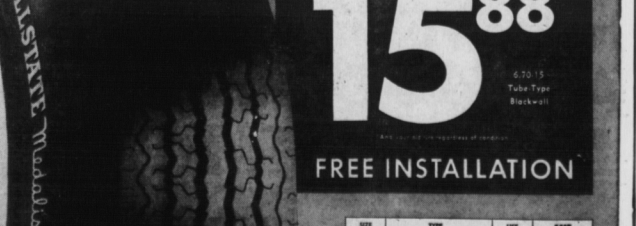
