

R. A. Pichette Is Appointed

Hon. W.S.K. Jones, Commissioner for the Atlantic Provinces, announced the appointment of Robert A. Pichette of Fredericton as executive assistant to the general manager of the Atlantic Provinces Pavilion.

Mr. Pichette has been granted a year's leave of absence from his present duties as administrative assistant to Premier Louis J. Robichaud to assume the important responsibilities of this new office on behalf of the Atlantic Provinces.

In his new post he will be executive assistant to the general manager of the Atlantic Provinces Pavilion, Rear Admiral H.P. Pullen (retired).

Mr. Pichette, a native of Edmondston, N.B. and a son of Mr. Justice J. Albert Pichette of the New Brunswick Supreme Court, is an authority on Canadian her-

aldry and the history and culture of the Atlantic Provinces.

Prior to joining Premier Robichaud's staff in 1963, the former Canada Council scholar served in the RCAF, and was a member of the staff of CBC and private radio stations in Moncton, Hull and Ottawa, and was a senior editor of L'Évangéline, New Brunswick's only French-language daily newspaper.

Mr. Jones and Mr. Pichette will bring to his new post the additional administrative experience necessary to direct the combined efforts of the four provinces at Expo '67 next year.

Bruce Gamble of Cascumpec passed away on Sunday at the O'Leary Community Hospital following a period of failing health.

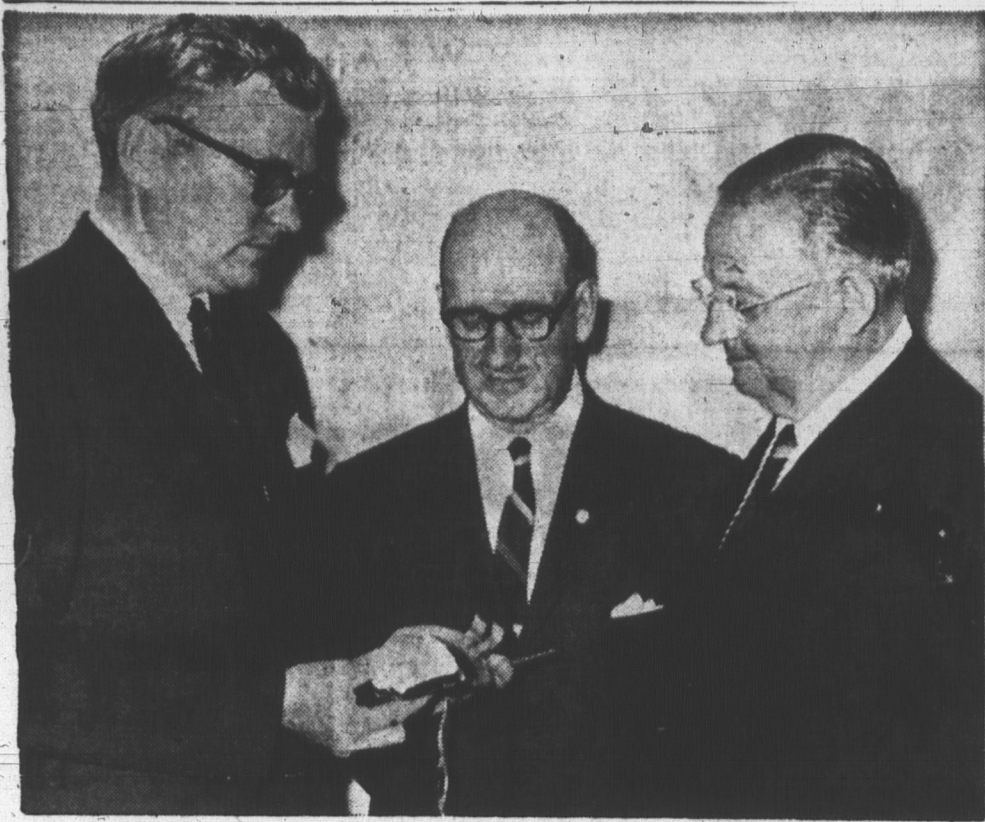
A son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Silas Gamble, he was born at Cascumpec eighty-eight years ago and lived there all his life.

Red Cross Team Has New Member

Back in P.E.I. for the fourth series of Red Cross blood donor clinics — the second for Charlottetown — the mobile blood donor team from Halifax is composed of thirteen members this time instead of the usual twelve. The additional team member is required because of the recent change-over from the traditional bottle to the plastic pack.

This week's four days' sessions of clinics will get underway this afternoon at the gymnasium at St. Dunstan's University where Paul Kelly, of Summerside, a Senior student is heading an enthusiastic committee composed of the various class presidents. With the enlarged enrolment at S.D.U. this year the committee is optimistic that the quota of 100 will be greatly exceeded.

TO CENTRE

At the completion of the clinic at S.D.U. the mobile team will move to the Confederation Centre where they will have everything in readiness for the opening at 8 p.m. This evening's clinic will be from 8-10 but the other evening sessions on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday will be from 7-9.

A. Fremont Archer, Red Cross blood donor chairman for Charlottetown said last night that he is confident the former donors from the city and surrounding area will co-operate in their usual generous manner and again put Charlottetown "over the top" by exceeding the objective by a considerable number. He stressed the importance of donors bringing their cards with them as this dispenses with the necessity of re-typing and effects a saving of both time and money.

"Since the blood bank is so low at the present time," Mr. Archer remarked, "there is an urgent need for donors of all types but particularly for the O-positive and O-negative types since there seems to have been a very great demand for these types in the past couple of weeks."

Joe Gallant Re-elected President

Studs Legalized

Regulations under the Highway Traffic Act have been amended to permit the use of studded tires on the highways of Prince Edward Island from November 1 to April 30. The announcement was made Saturday morning by the Hon. T. Earle Hickey, provincial secretary.

Mr. Hickey said that officials of the motor vehicle division have investigated these tires and find they will not cause damage to the highways and that use of such tires provide added safety against the hazards of winter driving.

The regulations prohibit the insertion of studs or protruberances in used or worn tires. The insertion of studs in tires prepared for this insertion by the manufacturer must be carried out by a recognized tire dealer only.

**Liquor Cases
Head Docket**

Magistrate A. James Haslam was faced with a large docket in city police court Saturday morning.

Eight men were accused with violating the Liquor Control Act and were fined \$20 and costs with the option of a 30 day jail sentence.

For speeding at 35 miles per hour in a 20-mile zone on a motor bike, Daniel MacIsaac was fined \$15 and costs, while Daniel A. MacLean was fined \$20 and costs for travelling 40 miles per hour in a 20-mile zone. Lester A. Shaw was fined \$10 for failing to stop at a red traffic light and Wilso. Stanley MacDonald paid \$5 for failing to stop at a 'Stop' sign. Kenneth Livingstone also paid a \$10 fine for failing to stop for a red traffic light. A previously adjourned case of false pretences was further adjourned to October 1.

Brian David Foley, charged with failing to yield the right of way to a pedestrian at a crosswalk, entered a not guilty plea and the case was adjourned to next Saturday, October 1.

Home, School Holds Meeting

TIGNISH — The first meeting of the Tignish Home and School Association for the school year was held in the regional high school auditorium on Thursday evening with a large attendance.

Mrs. Frank Arsenault, president chaired the meeting and introduced guest speaker for the meeting Mrs. Frank Ross of Charlottetown who outlined three projects that could be carried out by the Home and School Association as their central contribution to Canada.

The financial report was given by Mrs. George Handrahan. The president Mrs. Arsenault extended sympathy to the family of the late Walter Christopher and spoke of his time spent on the executive committee.

Mr. Malone in his remarks about home and school said it is an excellent vehicle for an exchange of ideas. He urged that parents and teachers work closely together in an effort to solve problems facing both parent, teacher and pupil.

Adult education classes will be continued during the school term, and Home Economic evening classes will commence on October 11th. In October parents will visit the schools and receive the children's report cards. Committee chairman named were: School Life, Sister Angela Shea; Community, Gerald Keough; membership, Mrs. Alcide Boudreau; finance, Mrs. Will Boyce.

A get acquainted hour for parents and teachers followed the meeting.

Licensing System Announced

The announcement of the implementation of a seasonal licensing system for farm trucks from September 1 to March 30 was made Saturday morning by the Hon. Daniel J. MacDonald, minister of agriculture.

The program is aimed specifically at reducing the registration fees for farm trucks used during the harvest season. Trucks having a gross weight of 10,000 pounds or more used in the transportation of farm produce, and being the property of the registered owner or his agent will be registered at one-half the regular semi-annual fee.

Mr. MacDonald further stated that this program is being initiated on a trial basis and it is proposed that a system of seasonal licenses for farm vehicles will be enacted by the P.E.I. Legislature at the spring session.

Farmers who have already registered after September 1 and all applications for seasonal licenses between September 1 and November 30 must be supported by an affidavit.

Transfer Announced By Premier

It was announced Saturday by Premier Alex Campbell that the government of Prince Edward Island has accepted the transfer from the Atlantic Development Board for the water supply and sewage disposal system to serve the Industrial Park site at Summerside.

The Atlantic Development Board has recently completed all phases of the installation of the two systems on a total cost of \$118,327.31.

Although no industries have as yet established on the site, Premier Campbell said that he is hopeful that prospective industries would now be encouraged to establish since adequate water and sewage facilities are available. In addition the Premier said that the excellent location of the park should be further incentive to prospective industries.

The Industrial Park will be administered by the Summerside and Vicinity Area Industrial Commission which will include representatives from Summerside, St. Eleanor's, and Wilnot. Councillor Grant Molison of Summerside is the Provisional Chairman and it is expected that he will announce the other members of the Commission within two weeks.
