## Conventional Sub Defence Is Solved, Not So Nuclear

OTTAWA (CP)—Vice-Admiral H. S. Rayner, retiring chief of naval staff, said here the problem of hunting and killing the conventional submarine has been solved. But this was far from the case with the nuclear submarine, he said in an interview. Tremendous advances in anti-submarine warfare since he was a Second World War destroyer commander had given the indi-

vidual hunter the advantage over the individual conventional sub, but these had been offset to a great extent by the large number of potential enemy subs. This pointed to the need for large numbers of inexpensive anti-submarine craft. (NATO estimates place the number of Soviet conventional submarines at between 600 and 500 and of Soviet nuclear subs at about 25).

Admiral Rayner said the nuclear boat is faster and much harder to find and hit than the conventional sub. However, he added, there are promising new developments in anti-submarine weapons such as longer-range, faster and deeper-running torpedoes, detection gear and fast hydrofoil boats.

**HYDROFOIL ON TIME**  
The Canadian hydrofoil development was on schedule and everything pointed to success of this 180-ton water-skimmer as an anti-submarine weapon. The \$10,000,000 prototype boat is expected to be ready for sea trials in 1966.

Admiral Rayner said that even if the hydrofoil is successful, the navy will still need bigger ships for control, communications and surface operations. The navy would also need two transport ships to carry Canadian air equipment and possibly troops, in cases where they couldn't be flown, for United Nations peacekeeping operations.

Admiral Rayner said he expects there will be a rash of UN peacekeeping jobs in the next several years. The navy now could carry vehicles and troops in the aircraft carrier Bonaventure and supply ship provider but this meant these two ships had to be taken away from their regular duties. (A special defence department report on comparative anti-submarine weapons systems scheduled to reach defence Minister Healey by Aug. 1. Mr. Healey has said that new warships will be built in Canadian yards).

**NEEDS AIR DEFENCE**  
Admiral Rayner also said the navy has requirements for air defence of the fleet. Trials had shown that the American Skyhawk jet was effectively flown from the Bonaventure. He did not foresee any major changes in the navy but was quick to point out the need for unification of the armed forces' command structure.

He said an exercise would be held with the army in Newfoundland in October. Admiral Rayner, 83, leaves his office Monday, the last chief of naval staff. The position is being abolished under command unification.

## Prospects Are Dim At Enheat For Repair Work Says Shaw

Premier Walter R. Shaw told the Guardian yesterday that prospects for the continuation of aircraft repair work at the Charlottetown plant of Enamel and Heating Products Ltd. are not too bright. The Premier said, "I have had very unfavorable reactions from the federal government on my views which urged that the plant be kept open."

"C.M. Drury, the federal minister of industry, has written me that Sabre jets, overhauled at the local plant, are being gradually withdrawn from service, and no more are requiring inspection and service."

Premier Shaw can't understand why a plant with qualified personnel that have proven they can do an excellent job, can't service other types of aircraft. "These other types need servicing and repair and, to my mind the aircraft repair industry should not be centralized in certain points outside the province. A reasonable portion of the servicing should be directed toward the local plant," said the Premier.

**LACK OF ATTENTION**  
He feels the Island has suffered too much in the past from centralization and insufficient attention to the needs of this province by Ottawa. A meeting between government and company representatives to discuss the possible closing of the plant, which could come within a few months, is scheduled for Monday.

Mr. Shaw said that his government intends to "fight a strong protest" with the federal authorities.

## Break, Entry Hearing Commences

In City Police Court yesterday morning the preliminary hearing in the case of Francis William Quinn was held before Magistrate A. J. Haslam. Quinn is charged with breaking and entering.

The offence is alleged to have occurred at the Main Branch Club June 26. The accused is represented by Allison Gillis, with Alan Scales appearing for the crown. Crown witnesses David Henry Yeo, Halifax, N. S., told yesterday of seeing two persons enter the club after one of them broke a window when they climbed the fire escape on Eillsboro Street. The witness said he phoned the police, then he and a friend stood at the bottom of the ladder to prevent a person in a red jacket from descending.

Pet. Donald Trainor identified the person on the ladder as the accused. He said that while the accused was being arrested he heard a noise at the club door on Kent Street. The door lock was then found to be broken and the club rooms, when searched, empty. There was no trace of the second man. The accused was remanded to July 21 with bail set at \$100. Glen John Campbell, North River, and Aemasa B. Henriksen, Charlottetown, both pleading guilty to charges of drunken driving, were sentenced to serve days in jail each. Their drivers' licenses will be suspended for one year. Lowell James Brown, Charlottetown, was fined \$15 and costs or five days on a speedily charge. A vagrant was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days. Two men and a woman were charged with being drunk and inebriate. The men were fined \$20 and costs or 20 days each and the woman \$10 and costs or five days.
