

East End Stars Pound Out 7-4 Victory Over Northwest Falcons

Freddy Whelan's east end Stars got their first victory in a game in the young City League baseball season yesterday as they pounded out a 7-4 victory over the Northwest Falcons in a regular league game on Memorial Field diamond.

A four run outburst in the second inning opened the gate for the Stars' first victory in a game that produced a bit of everything in the way of baseball entertainment. The loss for the Falcons, their second in a row, leaves them in second place two games behind the Rovers.

Lefty McAleer made his first start of the season a winning one. Lefty pitched six full innings and left with the score reading 7-3. Young Ev Beagan completed the pitching chores.

Hard hitting Gus Flynn opened the Stars' second inning attack with a triple to right field. MacKinnon took first after being hit by the pitcher, after which Arnold MacCallum dumped a base-clearing double into left field. MacCallum scored when MacFayden reached first on an error. Then Leonard grounded to second to force MacFayden after which pitcher McAleer singled to centre.

Howatt was hit by a pitched ball and with the bases loaded Epy Ready took over pitching chores from Cliff Ready. MacKenzie grounded to first and McAleer was caught going to third to end the inning, after Leonard scored.

The Stars made it 5-0 in the fourth when Leonard got on first via a walk and scored. Falcons got this one back in their half of the inning after Wally Shephers doubled into left field, stole third base and came home on Whitlock's fly to right.

Stars' catcher Arnold MacCallum was heaved out of the game when he loudly protested the umpire's call on Shephers at home. "Red" Howatt was taken out of the game and sent in to catch, with Glen Matheson taking Howatt's place in the field.

But the Stars were not to be denied and with one way in the fifth rangy Irv MacKinnon drilled one through the hole between second and short. Matheson blasted a triple into right field to score MacKinnon and came home on a wild pitch.

The Falcons came back with two more runs in their half of the fifth with the aid of two walks, a stolen base and an error. They added another in the eighth when Shephers was hit by a ball, stole third and came home on a long fly.

The Falcons threatened in both the eighth and ninth innings but Ev Beagan held the door shut. With the bases loaded in the eighth Trapper Larter filed out to Gus Flynn at short to end the frame. Again in the ninth with one out and men on second and third Beagan struck out Shephers and LeClair.

Coach Buck Whitlock pulled a Paul Richard's shift with Cliff and Spy Ready, alternating them between first base and the mound. A total of 13 extra base blows were hit, three triples and three doubles.

Sugar Ray Disqualified in Berlin

BERLIN, June 24 (CP)—World middleweight champion Sugar Ray Robinson was defeated in an exhibition bout today when he was disqualified for kidney punching. A bewildered Robinson was declared loser of his bout with light-heavyweight Gerhard Hecht of Germany as irate fans threw soda bottles into the ring at the American fighter.

It was a non-title match. Under German rules, disqualification of Robinson automatically gave the fight to the German for the champion's second loss in an 11-year ring career. His only previous loss was a decision to Jake LaMotta, whom he defeated in February for the world middleweight championship, Feb. 5, 1943.

Robinson and his outraged handlers were escorted from the arena as some 25,000 fans booed and whistled.

Robinson appeared the complete master the short time the two men were in the ring but a judge announced after Robinson's departure that Hecht had been awarded the fight on a foul in round two. Kidney punching is strictly barred in Germany.

Robinson, obviously trying to end the bout quickly at the start of the second round, ripped two lefts to the German's face and then threw a right hand punch.

Hecht went down with a moan, clutching his back. The ring was a scene of wild confusion as officials and spectators milled about trying to escape the line of pop bottle fire directed at Robinson's corner.

The police led him out of the arena and the decision then was announced.

Keen Racing But Rain Cuts Short Opening Events Under Lights On Saturday

A big black pacing stallion, Cheeky Chief owned by Walter Hennessey of Charlottetown went the mile in 2:10 1-5 on a wet track Saturday night but placed second in Time Table to provide one of the highlights of the season's opening race on the Exhibition track. The night's racing, witnessed by a small crowd, was called off at the end of the sixth heat due to weather conditions.

They were other highlights too as the horse and drivers braved the rains to turn in a first class racing program. Ma Cherie nosed out Just Brenda in an exciting second dash; A bad spill at the wire in the first race knocked the favorite out of contention; and H. H. Cormier of Moncton drove three winners. Biggest thrill for two lucky bettors was their collection of \$56.10 on Billy Budlong in the first heat. Roky May jumped at the wire going away. Major Boy fell over the sulks and Just Nellie C. the favorite, struck Major Boy's sulks. Billy Budlong went to the front and remained there to the wire. Wisner, driver of Roky May, narrowly escaped injury in the accident. Cheeky Chief, the six year old speedster driven by Joe Hennessey, appeared to have race sewed up in the fifth dash as he headed into the back stretch about three lengths ahead of Time Table.

About half way down the stretch, however, he spotted a cap on the track and jumped it off. He continued jumping to the wire and although he finished first was set back by the judges. His owner, Mr. Hennessey, stated that he could have easily done 2:07 on a dry track and he looked it Saturday night.

Polly Reynolds, a pacing bay mare, moved under the wire a good two lengths ahead of Dale B in the third heat of the night. The Reynolds mare, driven by Cormier, lead all the way.

A bay gelding, Campbell's Buddy, driven by Roach MacGregor won the fifth dash at the halfway mark to lead the field at the top corner and win easily by half a length over Norah Dale.

Ma Cherie went to the front at the three quarter mark and remained ahead to the wire in winning the second dash. Just Brenda, a bay pacer, got away at the pole in the sixth heat and led all the way to beat out Ma Cherie and three other pacers.

White Sox Split Series With Boston To Cut Lead In A. L. To Single Game

(By The Canadian Press) Chicago's White Sox continued unravelling on Boston snags Sunday and their American League lead over the runner-up New York Yankees was reduced to a single game as they divided a doubleheader with Boston Red Sox. The Chicks took the opener 6-5 and then bowed 8-6 while winding up their 16-game road trip with an even split.

Manager Paul Richards' hopefuls, arrived here with a 4 1/2-game lead over the Yanks, cashed only one of their four chances against the third-place Red Sox. Thanks to three homers, two by Phil Masi and the other by Eddie Robinson, the Chicks put on a courageous battle for the opening game before a 34,899 crowd. Robinson's 16th circuit drive, which came with Bob Dillinger aboard in the seventh, was the clincher.

The Red Sox took a 5-1 lead after five innings in the nightcap but Chicago pulled on even terms in the seventh inning, only to be promptly let down hard by reliever pitcher Larry Rothblatt.

Boston pulled ahead for keeps in its half of the seventh. Gene Woodling belted a two-run homer in the eighth inning to break a tie and give New York Yankees a 5-3 victory over Cleveland Indians. Vic Kaschl gained credit for his 11th victory.

The Yanks swept the three-game series from the Indians. Vic Wertz led a 15-hit attack on four Washington pitchers with a home run, double and two singles as Detroit mauled the Senators 10-5. Freddy Hutchinson, who replaced Virgil Trucks in the fourth inning, got the victory, his sixth against two defeats.

Gene Woodling belted a two-run homer in the eighth inning to break a tie and give New York Yankees a 5-3 victory over Cleveland Indians. Vic Kaschl gained credit for his 11th victory. The loser was Vern Bickford, while Max Lanier was credited with his fourth victory against five.

Bill Nicholson whacked a two-run homer in the ninth to shatter a 2-2 stalemate and give Philadelphia Phillies a 4-2 nightcap victory and split in their doubleheader with Cincinnati. Cincinnati won the opener 3-1.

Saturday, Chicago's American League lead dwindled to 1 1/2 games as the White Sox dropped their second straight to the Red Sox in Boston while the runner-up Yankees came from behind and edged Cleveland Indians 7-6. The White Sox were beaten 8-5 in 11 innings with Vern Stephens doubling home Ted Williams from first with the winning run. In other American League games, Washington Senators downed the Detroit Tigers 5-0 and Philadelphia Athletics defeated St. Louis Browns 4-1.
