

OUR MINISTER.

Sir,—Just now the Hon. Sir Louis Davies is quecting amongst the electors of Queen's County. His organ, the Patriot, tells us that he held a meeting at New London where an address was presented to "Right Hon. Sir Louis H. Davies." The organ tells us the meeting was attended by a vast assembly numbering four hundred persons, ladies included. As the organ invariably exaggerates in these matters one may reasonably conclude that the meeting did not contain half that number. Fancy a member of the Queen's Privy Council wasting his time addressing a meeting of boys and girls in an out-of-the-way country school house! CHARGED WITH STEALING.—This forenoon Edward Murphy and William Weatherbie were arraigned before police-magistrate Haszard on a charge of stealing a quantity of pocket knives, mouth organs and playing cards from the premises of Hasard & Moore some time between Saturday night and Monday morning last. Sergeant Bradley testified to arresting Murphy and Weatherbie, and finding at the former's home four packages of peas, a mouth organ, several match safes and some magazine pipe lighters.
