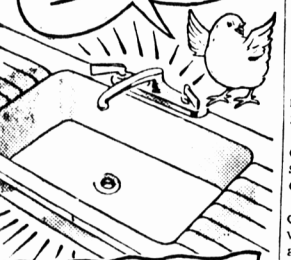

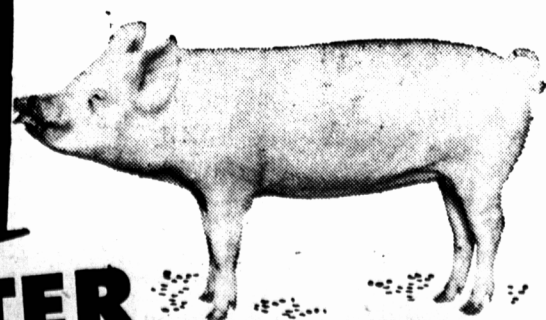

**First Michigan Negro In Congress**

DETROIT, (AP) — Charles C. Diggs, Jr., 31-year-old Detroit undertaker, today became the first Negro in history to represent Michigan in the United States Congress — and his margin of victory was a resounding one.

Diggs, a state Democratic senator, defeated Republican Landon Knight, son of John S. Knight, editor-publisher of the Detroit Free Press, for the seat in Detroit's teeming 13th district.

With 165 of 261 precincts reported, Diggs' margin was more than two to one. He had 40,283 votes in the heavily populated Negro sector, compared to 19,425 for
