Montague Man Named To BBG

CAPITAL BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN
OTTAWA—Keir Clark of Montague has been appointed to the Board of Broadcast Governors. It was announced here by Secretary of State Maurice Lamontagne.

Mr. Clark, 55, is a native of Mount Stewart, was educated at Prince of Wales College and Dalhousie University and graduated with a degree in commerce in 1934. He is director and general manager of Clark Bros. Ltd., general retailer of Montague and Mount Stewart.

The new appointee was mayor of Montague in 1940 and a member of the P.E.I. Legislature for the Third District of Kings from 1947 to 1959. He was appointed minister without portfolio in 1951 and became minister of education in 1953, a post he held until the change of government in 1959.

Mr. Clark is married to the former Anna McLaren of Georgetown and they have three daughters, all at university. Mr. Lamontagne said the appointment is for a statutory period of five years. The BBG consists of three permanent, full-time members and 12 part-time members drawn from all parts of Canada. The board meets regularly to pass on applications for radio and television licenses and changes in station regulations and services.

Mr. Clark fills the vacancy on the board created when the former P.E.I. representative, R. L. Burge retired Dec. 5, 1964. Mr. Burge, a resident of Five

houses, was appointed to the board in 1959 taking the place of David Stewart who resigned when he was appointed a member of the Shaw cabinet that year. A prominent Island Farmer, Mr. Burge is currently the president of the Canadian Horticultural Council.

 In September, 1963, Mrs. Darris received an anonymous telephone call from a woman who gave her the agent's home phone number. She dialed it and got Mrs. Catizone on the wire—not an ex-wife but a very present wife.

Before they could get down to really serious woman-to-woman talk, Catizone took the phone and told Mrs. Darris to get lost or he would have her "taken care of."

Disillusioned at last, Mrs. Darris went to the authorities with the whole incredible story. The FBI took over from there. They found out Mrs. Darris was only one of four feminine admirers of agent Tom Romano.

Whenever one of the admirers phoned Catizone at his garage, he would have a co-worker race a truck engine. Then he would explain to the caller that he had no time to talk, that the engine of his airplane was being revved up for a quick takeoff on a cloak-and-dagger mission.

Friday, in federal court, following a non-hurry trial, Judge Thomas F. Murphy gave Catizone two years in prison for masquerading as an agent of the Central Intelligence Agency. He continued the mechanic free in \$2,500 bail for an appeal from evidence he called "overwhelming."

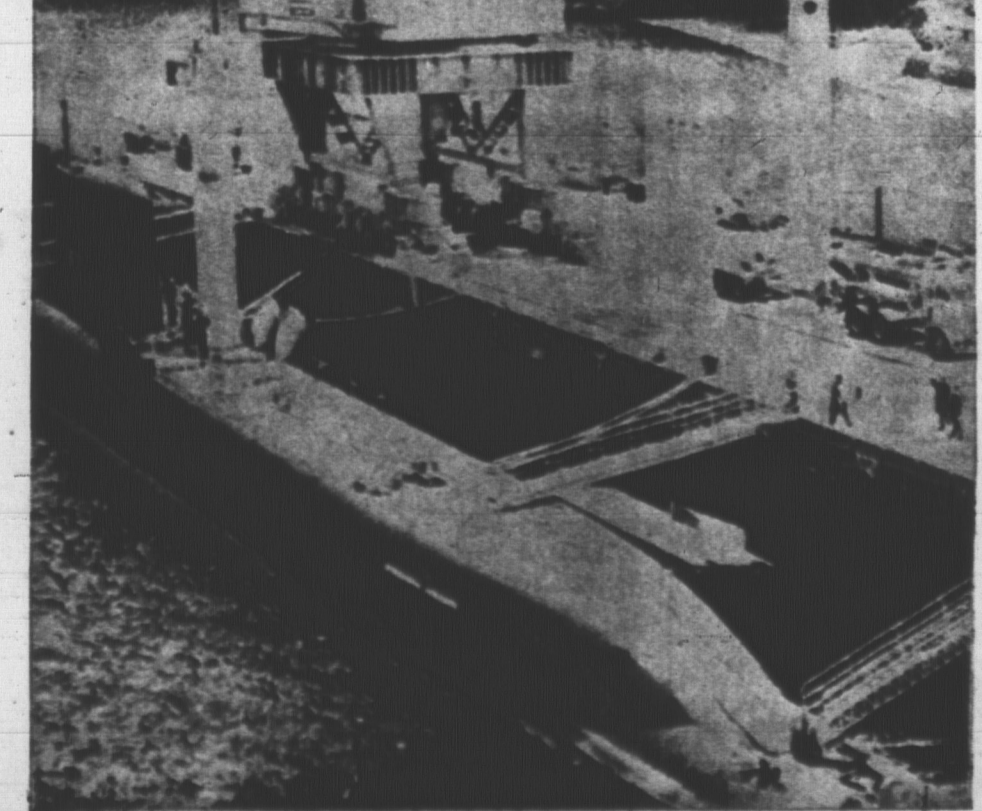
SPECIAL MUSIC
