Rotary Club To Contribute To Sheltered Work Shop

The directors of Rotary were authorized at the luncheon meeting of the club at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday to make a contribution to the "Sheltered Work Shop" project following a presentation of the full meaning of the movement by guest speaker Dr. Malcolm Beck, director of mental health clinics and head of Sherwood Hospital for the retarded.

Two special guests from the Rehabilitation Centre, Gerard Whalen of New Zealand, P.E.I., and Sydney Blackett, Bay Fortune, who was "Timmy 1963", were introduced by president Andrew Likely.

Former club member Sheldon Carson renewed friendships. The president said he was very happy to see Rev. Harry Somers and Reg Jenkins present once again.

"The work shop is designed to assist people who are not quite capable of looking out for themselves," Dr. Beck said as he described the various types of cases dealt with, and elaborated on the real and pressing need for support of the project.

"Incorporated in the set-up is provision for young adults to know the dignity of work. The necessity for giving advice on home caring is a continuing program which helps the home and in society benefit productivity," the speaker said.

"A remarkable improvement has been observed in the multi-handicapped in the social and emotional spheres. Trainees work and work well," he said. "We must have a Sheltered Work Shop to deal with the staggering revelation of a recent survey made in which 50 persons between the ages of 16 and 34 in Charlottetown were deemed in need of such assistance and 243 throughout the province to whom a Work Shop should be available.

"Financial support to the extent of \$5,000 is needed to overcome the shortage in this year's operation and moral and business help is required for the entire operation," Dr. Beck stated and added that the government has not participated in this work—it being an entirely public operation.

In the question period, Gordon MacLeod, work shop supervisor, reviewed the work done for firms and organizations in packaging and preparing items for mailing and many other items which can be done at the work shop, and releasing high paid and busy employees to attend to their regular jobs.

Introduced by chairman Dr. Robert Forsythe, the speaker was thanked by co-chairman Dr. Mac Phinlan and presented with a gift. Both are members of the Rotary Committee on Crippled Children and Rehabilitation.
