TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

THE ENGLISH ELECTIONS. Salisbury's Proposals.

LONDON, July 16. The Tories and Liberal-Unionists have made a net gain of forty-five seats over their net strength in the last house. Salisbury offers the anti-Gladstone Liberals four Cabinet offices and an equal proportion of the lesser offices. He will give Lord Hartington any office he may want excepting the Premiership and will make him leader of the Government in the House of Commons. Salisbury himself proposes to again take the Premiership, and the Secretaryship of State for Foreign Affairs.

The Premier's Sayings in Winnipeg.

WINNIPEG, July 16. Sir John A. Macdonald leaves for the Pacific coast to-morrow. Replying to an address from the Corporation, the Premier dwelt upon the immense trade with Asia and Australia likely to be developed by the C. P. R., and mentioned incidentally that Lord Salisbury had promised to subsidize an Asiatic line, and that the Dominion Parliament would be asked to subsidize a line to Australia. It was understood that Salisbury had promised a subsidy of \$500,000 for carrying the mails, but Gladstone cut the amount down to \$200,000. Salisbury also promised \$2,000,000 to aid emigration to the colonies but Gladstone also cut this down to \$200,000. The new Imperial Government will be likely to carry out the plans of the original agreement.

Interprovincial Rifle Match - A Phenomenal Success.

MONCTON, July 16. The first interprovincial rifle match, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick participating, took place on the Moncton range yesterday. The conditions were unfavorable, the wind being almost fustilant and a hazy light, yet the score beats the best Wimbledon record, the New Brunswick total for the three ranges being 701, or four more than the highest aggregate in the competition for the Kolapore Cup, while the Nova Scotians, 693 was but four behind. Rifle-men are delighted at the successful inauguration of interprovincial matches, and if the Nova Scotians are somewhat disappointed, the New Brunswickers are also surprised at their phenomenal success.
