RIEL'S TRIAL.

Court Adjourned for a Week.

REGINA, July 22.

The Court resumed the trial of Louis Riel this morning. An affidavit was handed in, stating that without the attendance of Gabriel Dumont, Dumas and Nolan, who are in Montana, and without the production of certain petitions in the hands of the Government, and captured by General Middleton, he could not make a proper defence or have a fair trial.

Mr. Lemieux's affidavit set forth that the attendance of certain witnesses was required to show that for three years Riel had been confined in the Beaubien Asylum as a lunatic.

Mr. Greenshield's complaint that the parties whose names have been furnished to him by the prisoner refuse to say anything to him. He therefore asked for one month's adjournment of the trial.

Mr. Robertson, on behalf of the Crown, replied that the publication of the intention to bring Dumont, Dumas Nolan and other fugitives from justice in the United States to give evidence at the trial for the defence was something without precedent. Regarding the petitions in the custody of the Government, he said they were held as state papers, and therefore the Crown could not consent to their production, nor allow the defence to use them. He held that the application for a month's delay of the trial was unreasonable, but he would consent to an adjournment for one week. The Court then adjourned until Tuesday next.

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EGYPTIAN TROUBLES.

A Rebel Defeat—2,000 Killed.

LONDON, July 22.

A despatch from Kassala states that a large force of rebels attacked that place and made several attempts to carry it by assault. The rebels were finally repulsed, and the garrison at Kassala following up their victory, captured the rebel camp with 2,000 oxen and sheep, and seven hundred rifles. The enemy lost 2,000 men killed and wounded, while the garrison loss was small.

The New Egyptian Loan.

LONDON, July 22.

Russia having assented to the issue of the new Egyptian Loan, the British Government has instructed the Rothschilds to issue the loan in August. The consent of Russia to the loan is held to indicate the growth of friendly relations between England and Russia. The growth of friendly feeling has caused a rise in all stocks.

The Halifax Battalion's Continuous Ovation.

HALIFAX, July 22.

The Halifax Battalion, on its journey homeward, is receiving one continuous ovation. Every station is crowded, and banquets are tendered them all along the line. They will arrive in Halifax to-morrow (Thursday) afternoon.

Nemo me Impune Lascensit.

A thousand years before our Saviour came To bless mankind with freedom from his sins, And give to righteousness the crown it wins, The families of Earth upheld the name Of chosen gods and goddesses, whose fame And votaries rose from many kiths and kins.

A thousand years before The Cross was raised, That bore the Son of God in martyred form, And hushed the tumult of man's passionate gorm, Man drew his Eden-emblems forth and praised A deity who held the world amazed With floral gifts, whether fair sky or storm.

The flowers of Earth (her homage and perfume), In rainbow colours grew at her command; The sunny south and cold elad north she planned To hold the Lily, or make strong the Broom; Adorning verdure brought each season's bloom On hill-side slope, along each watery strand.

A thousand years again, her hands outspread, She marked with favor Scotland's feudal lord, The second Malcolm, ruling hill and fiord, The Caledonian King, who, 'tis said, By his own famous claymore lost his head, The king asleep, assassins stole his sword.

But he had made full many a feudal chief, And placed his badge (drawn from an eagle's wing) On chieftain bonnets, allegiant to the King; And he ordained that every clansman's tie Should be (as all in Frons held belief) Some worthy emblem that from earth should spring.

Thousands of Scots, with bonnets to be decked, Rallied around their chiefs, and proudly stood In well lined order, staunch and firm as wood, Their flowing tartans free and rainbow-decked, Giving distinction as they stood, and took Hopeful of glory and of chieftains proud.

The MURRAYS grasped the Purple Juniper, The MENZIES reached out for the plant Ash, The GRAHAMS asked for Laurel fame and clash; McDONALD, Bell Heath; CRISHOLM, the Alder; Clan MCLACHLAN, the Mountain Ash prefer, And the brave clan MCKENZIE, the Deer-craze.

Red Wortleberry pleased the chief McLEOD, COLQUHOUN with Hazel bonnet his train; With Blackberry Heath the bold chief McLEAN; BUCHANAN from the Birch Tree was endowed; The CAMPBELLS of the Myrtle spray were proud; As CUMMINGS of the Salton's timber cane.

The Purple Foxglove, clan FARQUHARSON took; And GRANT the Cranberry to honor raised, SINGLARS chose clover that his cattle grazed; FERGUSON the Poplar, branching by the brook; Clan ROBERTSON, the Breachans in their nook, While proud MCNEIL the Eagle's feather praised.

LAMONT chose sourly the Crab Apple Tree, While ROSE-wort fell to valiant clan GUN; MCKINNON stepped up and his John's-wort won; MCNAB selected the Rose-black-berry; McQUARRIE chose Blackthorn, as tough as he, And OUGHLIVIE wore the Blossoming Thorn.

SUTHERLAND'S prize was some Cut-stail-grass; To ROSS fell a sprig of Bear-berry ripe; McPHERSON, variegated, chose in his stripe; The Mountain Heath to McDONNELL, they pass; McFARLANE took up the Cloud-berry class; And the ROSE clan, Rose Briar make their type.

Bright Maple shone on the brave OLIPHANT; And Sea-weed the caps of sailing McNEILS. Thus four dozen clans, old records reveal, Responding when called at Malcolm's command; And a more brave host never met in the land Of glorious Scotland, the "land of the leil."

Oh! Malcolm, the slain, they mourn thee who may: First to teach Scotchmen how great they can be; Feudal, thy freedom so crowned liberty, That now the whole world has homage to pay, Scotland, true Scotland, as erst, so to-day,— Sons worthy, sons wise, sons good, and all Free, RETSGAR.

NOTE.—Clans are said to have arisen in Scotland in the reign of King Malcolm II., about Anno 1008. The legal power of the chiefs and other remains of heritable jurisdiction were abolished in Scotland, and liberty was granted to the common in 1717, in consequence of the rebellion of 1745.

The chief of each clan wears two eagle-feathers in his bonnet, in addition to the badge.

The Scottish order of The Thistle, as founded by James V., 1449, consisted of himself, as Sovereign, and twelve knights, in imitation of Christ and his twelve apostles. In 1842 James died, and the order was discontinued about the time of the reformation. The order was renewed by James VII. of Scotland and II. of England, by making eight knights, May 29, 1687. It was increased to twelve by Queen Anne in 1703; to sixteen by George IV., in 1827.

Some Scottish historians make the origin of this order very ancient. The Abbot Justinian says it was instituted by Achaus I. of Scotland, Anno 56, when that monarch made an alliance with Charlemagne, and then took for his device the Thistle. It is stated that the King, Hungus the Piet, had a dream, in which St. Andrew made a midnight visit and presented him a sure victory over his foes, the Northumbrians, and that the next day St. Andrew's Cross (X) appeared in the air, and the Northumbrians were defeated. On this story, it is said, Achaus framed the order more than seven hundred years before James V.
