THE BIG FIRE AT WINDSOR.

Loss of Property Upwards of Two Millions.

Great Destitution Prevails — About \$75,000 Wanted.

WINDSOR, N. S., Oct. 19.—The relief committee officially places the loss of property by the fire at \$2,500,000. There will be great destitution and at least \$75,000 must be given to relieve the distressed. Contributions are coming in rapidly.

Of the fair town of Windsor all that remains is one church, one hotel, a college, a mill and about twenty-five houses. The woods about King's college were on fire more than once but the flames did not reach the grand old university building.

The progress of the fire was most rapid, and the wind was high and the heat intense. An idea of the rapidity with which the flames sped may be gathered from the fact that one unfortunate householder fearing that he would be burned out, piled his effects upon a team and was driving them away to a place of safety. A spark alighted upon a mattress, and before the man could extinguish it, the whole team load was ablaze. It was as much as the driver could do to save the horses, and the team and furniture were burned.

Forest Fires Raging.

YARMOUTH, N. S., Oct. 19.—Bush fires in Yarmouth County have done great damage. At Come's Hill the mill house was destroyed. A telephone from Forbes' Point, Shelburne County, says the church there is burned and unless the wind goes down it is feared the village will be destroyed.

Against the Afridis.

SIMLA, Oct. 19.—The advance against the summer headquarters of the Afridis will begin on Wednesday. Cholera is reported among the British troops.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL.

LONDON, Oct. 16.—The Vienna correspondent of the Daily Mail, describing the proceedings at the trial of two hundred brigands and receivers of stolen property now in progress at Tschaischak, Servia, which have already revealed systematic

plundering and murdering of members of the Liberal party at the instigation of Radicals, prominent among whom is Deputy Tajsitch, a well known member of the Assembly, says: "The leader of the brigands, a man named Brkitch, testified that he killed a schoolmaster named Backovitch, who was also a political writer, at the instigation of Deputy Tajsitch. He deposed that the latter promised to assist him to escape into Montenegro, where according to the Deputy, Prince Nicholas, who also desired the death of Backovitch, was to reward him handsomely. Deputy Tajsitch then sounded Brkitch as to the possibility of assassinating King Alexander of Servia. When this stage of the proceedings was reached the brigand leader suddenly stopped his disclosures, and declared that his previous testimony was false, but the retraction is said to be due to a bribe from Deputy Tajsitch."

TORONTO, Oct. 16.—The Sunday school of the Wesley Methodist church here is said to be the biggest in Canada. There are on the roll 1,145 names, 120 officers and teachers. The average attendance last year was 900.

LONDON, Oct. 16.—The Daily Chronicle announces this morning that in view of Lord Salisbury's desire to resign the Premiership, an early reconstruction of the Cabinet is possible.

BERLIN, Oct. 16.—The Munchener Nachrichten records the experience of a young German who undertook to establish a kissing record. He gained his sweetheart's consent, the terms being that he should take 16,000 kisses from her lips in ten hours with a brief interval for refreshment every half hour. Umpires were appointed to make a record. The young man scored 2,900 kisses in the first hour, 1,000 in the second. He had reached 750 in the third hour when his lips were paralyzed and he became unconscious.

TORONTO, Oct. 16.—The announcement is made as coming from Premier Hardy that the Ontario elections will take place next June or July and that the House will probably meet in February.

LONDON, October 16.—The Berlin correspondent of the Pall Mall Gazette telegraphs that the "condemnation by all parties of the naval septennate has had its effect" upon the Emperor and that he is yielding, adding that Admiral Koorr, the commander-in-chief of the Imperial navy, who, as cabled to the Associated Press on Wednesday last, after an interview with Emperor William, started on a long leave of absence, although he has been the soul of the movement to increase the strength of the German navy, is the "first victim." Continuing, the Pall Mall Gazette correspondent says:—"This new term in the situation will not be the last. It was arranged at the council of yesterday that Prince Hohenlohe will retain the chancellorship pro tem." Admiral Koorr, as previously cabled, has been replaced by Admiral Koster, of the Baltic station, and it has been rumored in Berlin that this means the retirement of Admiral Koorr from the post of commander-in-chief of the Imperial Navy.
