#### Fresh Fruits, Vegetables Re-Condition After Winter

THE CHEF threw our country test kitchen window open wide and stood appreciatively sniffing the warming air. He cocked his head on one side, listening.

"In the air I seem to notice a quiet rustle — the rustle of spring," he said. "Perhaps it is tiny noises made by seeds and bulbs as they crack open; the upward thrust of asparagus spears through the softening earth or the leaves of rhubarb working always upward. "It is an inspiring season—the upwaving of spring."

Carrot-Apple Saladettes  
Asparagus-Chicken-Rice Casserole

Hot Fresh Fruit Compote  
Dropped English Pound Cakes  
Coffee - Tea Milk

#### CARROT-APPLE SALADETTES

4 scraped raw medium carrots  
2 peeled, cored raw tart medium apples  
3 tbsp. French dressing  
Lettuce or cress  
Mayonnaise or sour cream dressing

Put carrots and apples through coarse knife of food chopper. Season with French dressing. Chill 30 min.

Serve on lettuce. Pass desired dressing. Serves 6.

#### ASPARAGUS-CHICKEN-RICE CASSEROLE

4 c. cooked flaky rice  
3 tbsp. butter or margarine  
2½ tsp. flour  
1 c. milk  
1½ c. chicken stock or bouillon  
2 c. cooked asparagus, 1 in. lengths  
2½ c. medium-diced cooked chicken

½ tsp. powdered tarragon  
Salt and pepper to taste  
1 tsp. butter, additional  
1 pint, chopped fine  
Oil casserole. Line with ½ in. layer of rice; reserve remaining rice for topping.

Melt butter. Stir in flour; gradually add milk and chicken stock. Cook - stir until smooth and boiling.

Add asparagus and chicken. Season to taste with tarragon, salt and pepper and pour into casserole.

Cover with remaining rice.
