Trial was continuing at press time yesterday.

One of the reasons for the optimism expressed by officials of the Charlottetown Figure Skating Club, over this year's skating season, is the Leadership of Paul Huenergard, a member of the Canadian World Team for the past two years.

Mr. Huenergard was born in England and came to Canada at the age of 11 at which time he embarked on his skating career. In 1960, he won the junior men's sectional championship and he and his sister Susan began working as pair skaters.

In 1963 Paul and Susan captured the senior pairs sectional championships and placed third in the Canadian championships in Edmonton, Alta.

The following year they retained their sectional honors and went on to the junior pairs.

**PAIRS CHAMPIONS**

In 1965 the pair won the Canadian finals to take the Canadian Pairs Championships and placed third in the North American trials. Paul and Susan represented Canada on the World Tour Team.

In 1966 they retained their title in Peterborough, Ont., and once again were members of the world team representing Canada at Davos, Switzerland.
