stolen "a large sum" of money from the Soviet embassy before he sought Australian protection early this month. A note handed to the government demanded that Petrov be handed over as a "criminal."

But Prime Minister Robert Menzies scoffed at the charges and asked the Russians to back them up. He said Russian Ambassador Nikolai Generalov could state his case before the royal commission set up to investigate Petrov's charges of widespread Russian espionage in Australia.

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China Shows

1. The Peiping radio charged the United States is stepping up its "military ventures" in Indo-China. The broadcast did not elaborate on the nature of the ventures, but used the term "armed aggression."
2. Wilson announced that President Eisenhower has asked Gen. James Van Fleet, retired former commander of the U.S. Eighth Army in Korea, to survey the military aid programs in the Far East—especially in Korea and Formosa.

Wilson said it has not been decided whether Van Fleet will go to Indo-China.
Wilson said he himself expects to leave on a long-planned trip to the Far East about May 11.

3. Vice-President Richard Nixon told newspaper men in Chicago that U.S. policy has this purpose: "That American boys will not have to fight in Indo-China or anywhere else."

Wilson's statement on the U.S. airlift of French reinforcements via an 8,500-mile hop from France to Indo-China—for use in the battle of Dien Bien Phu—confirmed dispatches from Paris.
French officials declined to say how many troops are involved in the action, but they were believed to number at least 1,000 and may have included a battalion of French Commando paratroops.

Canadian Chemical And Cellulose To Issue New Shares

MONTREAL, (CP) — Canadian Chemical and Cellulose Company, Ltd. announced Wednesday that shareholders at the annual meeting approved issuance of 100,000 shares of preferred stock with a par value of \$100.

The stock will be used in settlement of a \$10,000,000 loan obtained from Celanese, S.A., a subsidiary of Celanese Corporation of America.

The announcement said dividend rate for the new issue has not been determined but is expected to be six per cent, non-cumulative as to dividends for the first five years and cumulative thereafter.

This will be the company's first issue of preferred stock.

Changes in the management set-up of the company were also announced. Increase in the board of directors from eight to nine was approved and Dr. G. J. MacKenzie, former president of Atomic Energy of Canada, Ltd. and of the National Research Council, was elected to the board. Dr. MacKenzie has been serving as scientific adviser to the company.

Other directors re-elected are Harold Blanche, Dr. Damille Dreyfus, H. A. Dyde, A. E. Gauer, M. W. MacKenzie, George H. Richards, George Schneider and R. L. Weldon.

At the directors' meeting M. W. MacKenzie, executive vice-president for the last two years, was named
