New Drugs For Old Ailments

Sanderson, M.D. Two new drugs for treating rheumatoid arthritis and gout, steroid for relieving itching and burning eyes, and a method of improving eyesight by use of electric current are the medical advances announced in this column today in our monthly review of what's new in medicine.

Colchicine is reported to be good for long-term safe control of certain cases of crippling rheumatoid arthritis.

While it gives an immediate evidence of any anti-inflammatory effect on joint swelling and pain, it appears to have little disease process in the body as a whole.

Colchicine is reported to be highly effective in suppressing painful and distressing arthritic symptoms that accompany acute gouty attacks.

The new eye preparation is Metrolon Ophthalmic Suspension a steroid-antibiotic, which can be used for a wide variety of resistant allergic eye conditions.

It is reported to be especially helpful when the eyes are bothered with reactions from hay fever or asthma. Investigators set it gives prompt relief from itching, tearing and burning.

Application of mild electric current to the temples is said by two Maryland doctors to have improved vision greatly in 10 persons with varying degrees of visual loss.

It is nice for the public to know about the new drugs in medicine, but it is also equally important to understand that medicine is not a magic wand.
