## Four Large Cutters Planned For Atlantic Coast Guard

OTTAWA (CP) — Four large international shipping cutters worth \$4,000,000 each and five shore-based lifeboat stations will be provided for the Atlantic region to improve the Canadian Coast Guard's search and rescue work. Transport Minister Pickersgill announced Thursday. Mr. Pickersgill told the Commons the new 290-foot cutters will operate mainly in off-shore areas used by deep-sea fishermen. There are now two medium-sized cutters in the Atlantic region. The lifeboat stations, to be manned by part-time volunteers similar to the British Coast Guard system, will be equipped with lifeboats worth about \$150,000 each. He said the location of the stations will be decided after further investigation and consultation with local groups about how the voluntary manning system can be established. There now is a station in the Bay of Fundy. The transport minister said the program will take four to five years to implement fully.

## Paper Shipments Are Increased

MONTREAL (CP) — The Newspaper Association of Canada reports Canadian shipments of newsprint in April totalled 676,637 tons, a 1.9-per-cent increase compared with 663,948 tons in April 1964. Shipments to the United States amounted to 518,694 tons against the previous April's 499,101 tons, a 3.9-per-cent increase. Total Canadian newsprint production in April was 621,588 tons, a 5-per-cent decrease compared with 624,761 tons for the same period in 1964.
