Oil Painting Of Noted Island Jurist Presentec

An oil painting of the Rt. Hon. Sir Louis Henry Davies, in his robes as Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Canada, was presented to the Province yesterday by Mrs. J. D. Hyndman, daughter of Sir Louis and mother of the artist, Mr. Robert Hyndman. The ceremony took place during a sitting of the Supreme Court of Prince Edward Island, in matrimonial Causes, Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell presiding. At his invitation, Mr. Justice J. D. Hyndman, retired judge of the Supreme Court of Alberta, occupied a seat on the Bench. Many of the Island judges and barristers were present.

The picture was accepted on behalf of the Government of this Province by the Premier, the Hon. A. W. Matheson, Q.C., who referred to the illustrious career of Sir Louis at the English Bar, the bar of this Province and on the bench. Sir Louis Davies was called to the Bar of the Inner Temple in 1867, the Bar of this Province in 1867, was made a Queen's Counsel in 1880 and was a member of the Legislature from 1872 to 1879. He was premier from 1876 to 1879. He entered Parliament and for a time held a portfolio in the Federal Government. He was appointed to the bench of the Supreme Court

of Canada in 1901 and became Chief Justice in 1918, a post he held until his death in 1924. He was created K.C.M.G. in 1897 and an imperial privy councillor in 1919. Mr. F. A. Large, Q.C., and Mr. R. R. Bell, Q.C., spoke for the Bar of the Province in expressing appreciation of the gift and of the inspiration which Sir Louis's career has been to young attorneys and barristers.

Chief Justice Campbell referred to the activity of Mr. Justice Hyndman on enquiries and commissions.

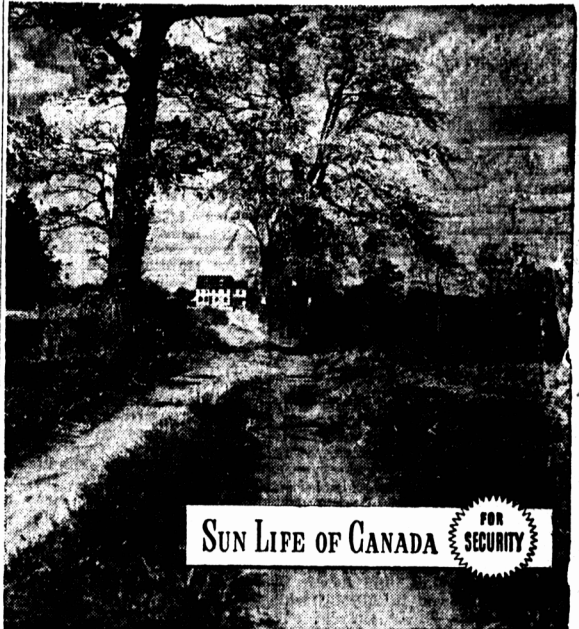
