**HOME FOR INTERMENT.**—The body of the late Captain Gillis, who lost his life by the recent wrecking of the schr. Janet A off Miramichi, was brought home last evening by the Northumberland, and forwarded to Tignish for interment.

**ANOTHER BODY FOUND.**—According to a Chatham despatch on Wednesday the body of a woman, identified as that of Mrs. Thos. Clark, was found on Fox Island the previous afternoon. Mrs. Clark was one of the persons lost off the schooner Janet A, recently wrecked on the Island.

**DON'T SPIT ON THE SIDEWALK.**—It is stated that the streets of Spokane are adorned with copies of an ordinance which makes it a misdemeanor to spit on the sidewalks of that city. **TRAIN ROBBED.**—An east-bound passenger train of the Santa Fe route was boarded at Grant's station, New Mexico, one night recently, amid a fusillade of shots by a number of robbers. Having secured the contents of the safe the robbers departed, and the fireman who remained on the engine undertook to back down to the train; but in the excitement and darkness he ran into it with such force as to telescope the express car, day coach and chair car, all three of which took fire and were completely destroyed. The principal safe by some means or other escaped the attention of the robbers.
