MONTEAL (CP)—Stocks fell back on a wide front Tuesday on the Montreal and Canadian Exchanges. Trading was light. Skim milk showed losses, the Royal falling 1/4 to 78¢ and Montreal 1/4 to 69 1/2¢. Papers were also down, price dropping 1/4 to 38 1/2¢ and Montreal 1/4 to 29 1/2¢. Dominion Star, down 1/4 to 10 1/2¢ and Sagrains, down 1/4 to 21 1/2¢. The indices were down, industrials 1.0 to 112.5, composite 1.0 to 127.7 and general 1.0 to 112.5.

disturbances down more than two points and golds and base metals fractionally lower. Western oils edged ahead. Banks acted as trend indicators, with the Dow Jones showing a general decline on the main list. Bank of Montreal, and Nova Scotia each slipped 1/2, Imperial Bank of Commerce dropped 1/4 and Royal dipped 1/4.

Additional big losers included: International Pipe Line down 1/2, Ontario Steel and Price Brothers, each off a point, Imperial Oil down 1/2, and Building Products and Guaranty Trust, both off 1/2.

On the outside, Texaco Canada moved ahead two points to a new 1963 high of 53. Canada General Investments rose 1/2 to a new top of 44, Canadian Tire jumped 1/2 and Canadian Tire A jumped 1/2.

In gold, industrials slipped 2.03 to 643.73. The Dow Jones 200 stock index dropped 18 to 2148.5. Western oils gained 1/8 to 128.71. Final volume was 2,525,000 shares compared with 2,555,000 Friday.

Little change was seen in western oils with the exception of Canada Southern Petroleum. The stock rose 20¢ to 64.00 on a turnover of about 38,000 shares following news that the company had filed for protection in the bankruptcy court in Calgary and Edmonton.

Base metals were held lower by International Nickel and Hudson Bay, both off a point. Noranda and Falconbridge each lost 1/2.
