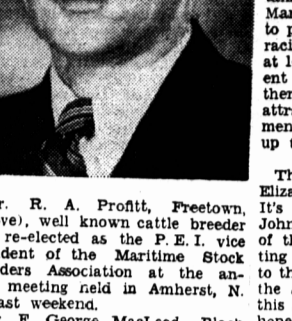

S'side Electric Light Employees Join Union

The employees of the Summerside municipally owned Electric Light Department have joined local 1432 of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers and have been certified by the provincial secretary's office as a proper collective bargaining agency.

The president of the Summerside unit of the local is Mr. Lorne Spencer, and the secretary-treasurer is Mr. Gordon Sullivan. A union contract basically the same as the one that the employees of the Maritime Electric Company have with that company in Charlottetown, is presently being prepared and it is expected that the union representatives will meet with the Town Council within a few days to discuss the proposed contract. It is understood that the union will ask for an increase in pay, while retaining the present 44-hour week.

The Summerside Electric Light Department employs about 25-30 men.
