WHY SHE KILLED HERSELF.—"If I was as ugly as you I would go and drown myself in a cedar swamp." This nasty remark was made by a young man to a Miss Bedore, of Bedford, Ont., whose face was blotched, the result of impurities of the blood. Miss Bedore was most sensitive, and, grieving over the young man's deprecatory utterances, decided to end her life. She took a large quantity of Paris green, and was soon a corpse, though two doctors tried to save her life.

THE ST. JOHN CARNIVAL.—The carnival committees have asked the common council for \$1300 to meet its bills and the electrical exhibition committee have asked for \$300. These modest demands the council don't care to sanction and no doubt think the summer carnival an expensive affair. Ald. Kelly said it was "perfectly ridiculous" and Alderman Christie called it "presumption and cheek" and said nobody but hotel keepers and a few "wet" and dry goods merchants were the ones to profit by this costly picnic. The matter was referred to the Treasury Board.

A BIG MONTH.—The month of August was a big one at the Police Court. Following is a synopsis of the cases disposed of:—Scott Act, 2 convictions and 2 dismissals; assault, 2 convictions and 3 dismissals; cruelty to animals, 1 conviction and 1 dismissal; larceny, 1 conviction; drunkenness, 49 convictions; malicious injury to property, 1 dismissal; fast driving, 1 conviction; housebreaking, 1 conviction for trial in the Supreme Court; abusive language, 2 dismissals; refusing to deliver an article, the property of the Crown, in violation of the Militia Act, 1 conviction. The net receipts for the month were \$457.21.

AN OLD GAME WITH A NEW VICTIM.—A young man named George Ryder, belonging to St. John, N. B., had a very old game played upon him at Portland, Me., a few days ago. He fell in with a young man giving the name of Ellison, and claiming also to be a New Brunswicker, who got \$70 for immediate use out of Ryder, to be repaid as soon as they could find his wife. The \$70 was, of course, all Ryder had. Ellison is described as rather stout, weighs about 170 pounds, has light hair and whiskers, and wears dark clothes, with a kersey hat. He is about 40 years old.

WITH THE BIG GUNS.—After the close of the rifle tournament, which began at Ottawa yesterday there will be a gathering of the garrison artillery of the Dominion Artillery Association competition, commencing the 9th September. It is expected that 24 batteries will attend, made up as follows: Six of the Halifax brigade, three of the New Brunswick, three of the Prince Edward Island, six of the Montreal, two of the Levis, three of the Quebec, one of the Digby, one of the Yarmouth and one of the Pictou. Ontario will not be represented, as Coburg has the only efficient garrison in the province, and it has already done practice at head-quarters.

DOMINION ILLUSTRATED.—We would direct the attention of our readers to the present number of the *Dominion Illustrated* for a capital article, with excellent illustrations, of a typical Manitoba city. Brandon, to whose birth, growth and present condition, it is almost entirely devoted, is the creation of the C. P. R. and—the people of Brandon. This last constituent in the making of the place must be well borne in mind. The portraits are a revelation. Not a leading man over 35 years of age. Young blood is building up the Northwest. The sowing and harvest, as well as the city scenes, the views of the Experimental Farm and Lake Clementine, are all characteristic and good. The letter-press is also up to a high mark. The *Dominion Illustrated* is published at 73 St. James Street, Montreal. Mr. G. E. Osburne is managing director. The subscription is \$2 per annum. A new volume began with July. The two first volumes, being the new series, are now ready.

Daring Robbery.

A correspondent at Crapaud writes:—"On Saturday evening, 31st of August, between the hours of 9 and 10 o'clock, while Mr. and Mrs. Collett were enjoying a lunch, a thief about twenty-five feet away was having a little fun to himself, raising their bedroom window (all on the ground floor) and taking therefrom a small desk containing securities and valuable papers to the amount of some three or four thousand dollars. The desk also contained a small cash box, wherein was a fair lot of cash, consisting of gold 20s and 10s and a few sovereigns, also some paper money. The thief also secured a second small cash box, containing about eleven dollars of paper money, some small change, gold and silver rings and other valuables. A search was made but nothing found until Monday afternoon, when a little boy, who was going around the shore or edge of D. W. Palmer's marsh, stumbled over the desk. It had been broken open. The papers were all safe, but most of the money was gone. The thief, strange to say, overlooked (not intentionally) one twenty dollar gold piece, an English crown of ancient date brought to this country by Mr. Collett many years ago, also one Spanish dollar and some old coins, highly valued by the owner. Mr. Collett's loss amounts to nearly one hundred dollars. There is, as is the case when anything like the above happens, always a lot of loose talk about who the thief is. I can, after taking in all the surroundings, safely say that so far the guilty party is not known. There is not the smallest particle of evidence to point to any person or persons. It is one of the mysteries as yet."

A Telegrapher's Ruse.

Dr. J. Emmet O'Brien contributes a paper to the September *Century*, entitled "Telegraphing in Battle," from which this incident is quoted:—"On one occasion an operator started out from Fairfax Station on a hand-car propelled by three contrabands to attempt to restore the line so that Pope's operators could communicate his whereabouts. Finding the line cut beyond Pollock Bridge, he spiced it and got signals from both directions. While so engaged, a party of guerrillas emerged from the woods to the track and surrounded him. Bidding the negroes stand fast, he dictated a swift message over the line, which was being repeated back to him and copied as the Confederate leader leaned over his shoulder and read the significant words: 'Buford has sent back a regiment of cavalry to meet the one from here and guard the line. If you are molested we will hang every citizen on the route.' The instrument ceased ticking as the operator firmly replied, '— (O K) —' a painful pause ensued. The Confederate might have suspected a ruse if at the moment a gleam of saliers had not shone in the direction of Fairfax Court House. Hastily starting for the woods, the leader exclaimed, 'Come home, boys; these yere ain't our niggers'; and they disappeared, while the hand-car, as if driven by forty contraband power, sped rapidly rearward. Pope's wires were not well guarded at any time."

Occulation of Jupiter.

AN eclipse of Jupiter by the moon will take place on Tuesday, Sept. 3rd, and will be visible at Charlottetown. About eight o'clock in the evening Jupiter may be seen about 1 deg. to the east of the moon. At about twenty-five minutes to eleven (Charlottetown time) he will be very close, and those who wish to see the occultation should then begin to prepare. The moon at that time will be a little more than half full with its dark side next Jupiter. It is behind the dark limb that Jupiter will disappear, and the disappearance will occur while he is still at some distance from the illuminated part. As Jupiter is not a mere point in the sky the eclipse will not be instantaneous. Between first contact and final disappearance there will be an interval of two minutes.
