## Canadiens' Chances Are Question Mark This Year

MONTREAL, Oct. 3 — (CP) — Meat prices will definitely drop if the Canadian dollar goes to par with United States currency, Agriculture Minister Gardiner yesterday told the Montreal branch of the Agricultural Institute of Canada.

"You will get your steak cheaper," he said. "Ham and other pork products should be cheaper and probably eggs and poultry products also will go down."

The Agriculture Minister said Canada's farm income promises to maintain its present high level for some time. The present income is at an all-time high of \$2,500,000,000.

The cattle and hog branch in Central Canada is thriving as never before, he said, and poultry and egg producers have boosted egg exports from 1,000,000 to 36,000,000 dozens annually. Feed produce from the west was finding a ready market in the east.

Only apple growers have suffered adversely, he said. "They met the greatest threat and cannot be said to have completely recovered."

Assuring this improved trend is Britain's improved dollar situation which may enable her to buy more bacon and dairy products in Canada shortly, he said.

"More than a third of Canada's exports come from the farm," he said. "Practically all our wheat, hog and dairy export products go to Britain while more than 400,000 head of our cattle find a market in the U.S."

However, he added, with an increase of business, the farmers also have to cope with increased costs of production.

## Millions Of Fans To See Series By TV

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 3 — (CP) — Millions of baseball fans clustered before television sets as far as 1,000 miles away will see the World Series with more "eyes" than the 33,166 who get seats in the Park.

The television, reaching out to a greater audience than ever before in series history, will have five cameras trained on the play. They'll follow the ball, and the players, too; peer into dugouts and bullpen and glimpse the faces of some of the fans.

"We hope to do the best job ever," said a spokesman for station WPTZ which will originate the telecasts here. "We think the televiewers will see the game better than the crowd in the ball park."

The television will be carried by cable and microwave relay to 47 cities from Boston west to Omaha, Neb., and south to Jacksonville, Fla.

More than 5,000,000 receivers now are in operation in the United States and another 17,000 in Canada—the greatest number in history. The NBC research department estimated that some 38,000,000 people will watch all or part of the first four games on television. If the series lasts longer, the audience total will increase proportionately.

There was no breakdown of the Canadian TV audience but a good guess would be something like 70,000. Some 44 per cent of Canada's TV sets capable of picking up the series are in the Windsor, Ont., area and another 34 per cent in the Toronto area.

The all-time attendance record for a World Series game is the 86,288 crowd that watched Boston Braves defeat Cleveland Indians 11-5 in the fifth game of the 1948 series. And the four-game record is 201,706 for the Yankees-Pirates series in 1927.

MOSCOW, Oct. 3 — (AP) — The Literary Gazette today, included Henry A. Wallace on its list of "enemies of humanity" and called the former leader of the American Progressive Party a "political business man." Wallace, former U. S. vice-president, was condemned by the newspaper along with a whole list of writers and cultural figures, including American author John Dos Passos, as "Truman lackeys."

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 3 — (CP) — Cuff-notes on the World Series: When Philly manager Eddie Sawyer dropped his bombshell announcement today that relief ace Jim Konstanty would start the Series opener against New York Yankees tomorrow, a sports writer asked him about his starting hurler.

"Oh, they'll be in the bull pen," the likeable Sawyer explained. "Incidentally, this will be the first starting assignment for the bespectacled Philadelphia whiz kid since he left Toronto Maple Leafs of the International League at the end of the 1948 season. Jim, who has served as fireman for Philly pitchers the last two years, had a 10-10 record with the Leafs in '48."

### A Nice Guy

And Sawyer, dubbed a "nice guy" by sports writers in the National and American Leagues, proved just that at Shibe Park this afternoon when his kids were put through a two-hour batting and infield workout. Sawyer didn't see it because he was busy answering questions thrown at him by a group of sports writers around the third-base line.

He answered every question affably and an outsider would almost figure the Phils were going through a routine session before a regular league game instead of build-up for Philadelphia Phillies' first World Series opener in 35 years.

The likeable one-time college professor has made a "bum" out of Leo Durocher, manager of New York Giants. Fans recall Leo's notorious statement at start of the season: "Nice guys finish last."

### An Omen?

In keeping with the whiz kid's fever that has hit this city of brotherly love, the Garden State Race Track at nearby Camden, N. J., dedicated its opening program to the Phillies. Each race was named after a Philadelphia player.

The \$5,000 fifth-race feature was known as the "Whiz Kids". A starter was a three-year-old named "Dancer Ahead." Yes, it was an also-ran.

### Wot, No Tickets?

The shortage of World Series tickets is reminiscent to a Canadian of the annual scramble for Grey Cup ducats, but they can be had here for a price — anything from \$45 to purchase of an automobile.

## Baseball Attendance

NEW YORK, Oct. 3 — (AP) — Only four teams, two in each league, showed increases as major league baseball attendance this year dipped 14 per cent.

Philadelphia Phillies, winners of the National League pennant, saw their attendance skyrocket to 397,382 fans over 1949. Chicago Cubs, who finished seventh, had an increase of 22,805.

In the American League, Detroit and St. Louis Browns were over last year's marks. The Tigers were up 129,274, while the Browns, surprisingly, had a 44,008 increase.
