Texas Gulf Sulphur Officers Ask Court To Dismiss Case

NEW YORK (AP)—Top officers of Texas Gulf Sulphur Co. asked U.S. district court Tuesday to dismiss a complaint against them by the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission. They also denied any violation of the Securities and Exchange Act or rules of the SEC. The SEC had alleged that the company had issued misleading statements about a huge ore find at Timmins, Ont., and that officers had profited from stock purchases. President Claude O. Stephens and Dr. Charles S. Fogarty, executive vice-president, said the SEC complaint is founded largely on "the erroneous premise that a single drill core, which did not and could not reveal the presence of a mineable ore body, was a 'material fact' affecting the price of the company's stock."

SHOW MANY FACTORS

The officers contended that the complaint "completely ignored the fact that during the period from November, 1963, to April, 1964, there were many factors affecting the company, the industry and the economy in general."

Britain Reduces Drastically Immigrant Flow Allowed

By PETER BUCKLEY LONDON (CP)—The Labor government has moved to ease Britain's race problem, slashing the number of immigrants it will allow into the country from Commonwealth countries and taking steps to encourage the integration of those already here.

Herbert Bowden, cabinet minister with the title of Lord President of the Council, who was chairman of a cabinet committee studying the whole problem, released a white paper on immigration and told the House of Commons that there "is a limit to the number of immigrants that this small and overcrowded country can absorb."

Immigrants from other Commonwealth countries, once received with all but open arms by Mother England, will be subject now to rigid quota systems.

Instead of the approximately 250,000 who entered Britain last year, the government plans to cut the number next year to 7,500, with an additional 1,000 to come from Malta under a special arrangement with that newly-independent island.

The quota will apply only to those planning permanent settlement. WONT AFFECT CANADA Government officials said the

changes are not likely to affect such countries as Canada, Australia and New Zealand. Each country of the Commonwealth will be allowed to provide a maximum of 15 per cent of the total immigrant quota; but the number of Canadians who come to Britain with the intention of settling permanently rarely exceeds more than a few hundred.

The government's new policy sets a premium on those who have lined up a job beforehand or those—such as doctors, dentists, nurses and teachers—with skills the country needs.

There will be no admission whatsoever for those without jobs or needed skills, a policy already in effect since last September. That leaves an estimated 300,000 such people in the limbo.

The entry of wives and children of immigrants will come under more thorough scrutiny to counteract the number of "evasions" of the law under which relatives or others have entered Britain illegally in the past.

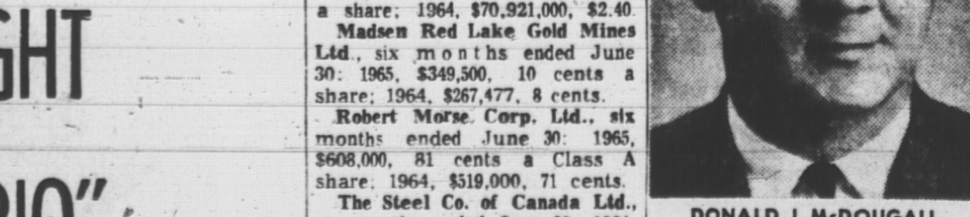
