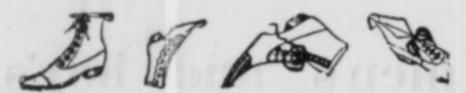

MGR. FALCONIO'S VISIT.

Addresses to be Presented—Band Concert and Reception.

The clergy and laity of the diocese of Charlottetown are making preparations for the reception of His Excellency Mgr. Falconio, Apostolic Delegate, who comes to this city on the 2nd July, this day week. At a meeting of the congregation of St. Dunstan's, held last evening after Vespers a reception committee of eighteen was appointed, from which sub-committees were afterwards selected.

His Excellency will arrive about half-past eight by the Princess. He will be met at the wharf by the Catholic societies with bands of music and escorted to St. Dunstan's Cathedral where addresses of welcome will be presented on behalf of the clergy and laity.

After the addresses are presented and acknowledged, His Excellency will give the Papal Benediction.

After the service in the church there will be a band concert in the beautiful grounds of the Bishop's Palace, which will be especially illuminated. Two bands will participate in this feature of the reception.

During His Excellency's stay in Charlottetown a reception will be held at the Palace. This reception will probably be held on Tuesday afternoon.

St. Dunstan's Cathedral will be especially decorated in honor of the distinguished visitor.

ACCIDENT AT ST. PETER'S ISLAND.—On Saturday afternoon Wellington Houston, the seven-year-old son of the late Mr. Wm. Houston, met with a serious accident at St. Peter's Island. He was standing on the landing stage of the Portland Packing Co., with two other persons when the structure collapsed. The three fell a distance of over ten feet to the rocky shore. The young lad was badly bruised and received painful injuries. Mr. Watson, of the Natural History Society, examined the boy, and it was decided to convey him to Charlottetown by the Southport. This was done and Dr. Jenkins sent for. He found the boy's right leg broken above the ankle. The little fellow bore the pain bravely and is now doing well. He will remain in Charlottetown till able to return home.

ATHLETES TRAINING HARD.—Word comes that the athletes from outside of Charlottetown, from Pownal, Montague, Georgetown and other places, are training just as hard as their rivals in the city, and we are safe in saying that they will have to be reckoned with in every event on the list. Our own athletes are hard at work and some wonderful records have been made in the sprints, jumps and shot and hammer throws. Great interest centres in the relay race. This will be the first time in Charlottetown that this event has been seen, and it promises to be of unusual interest, as the city companies have teams which are very evenly matched. Then there will also be several teams entered from outside companies. Such keen rivalry has never been known here, and it is going to be the biggest day's sport ever held on P. E. Island.

NATURAL HISTORY AND ANTIQUARIAN SOCIETY.—Certain members of this society with a number of friends visited St. Peter's Island on Saturday for their annual outing. The party was conveyed to the island by the steamer Southport. The day was spent on the shore and in the fields and wood. A number of fossil plants, shells, plants, and other specimens were collected, and the day was made memorable by the discovery of the second specimen of fossilised animal remains ever found in this province. It is considered by those of the society competent to express an opinion upon the matter to be the caudal vertebrae of an ancient Saurian. The specimen will be a most interesting and valuable addition to the collection of the society, which, we trust, will soon be deposited for public instruction in suitable quarters which should be provided by the Government as has been done in the sister provinces. The party returning reached Charlottetown at six o'clock, after what was unanimously declared to be a pleasant and profitable day.
