**Intecollegiate Hockey Controversy Is History**

**This Week At SDU**

 The Maritime Intecollegiate Hockey League is history now; its abrupt finish will drift into the chapters of oblivion in only a few weeks. The executive's decision to award the Marti title to UNB on the basis of having a better goal spread in the two games against St. Dunstan's caused a great deal of controversy in Charlottetown and on the mainland. St. Dunstan's students were so disgusted with the ruling that they paraded through the streets of Charlottetown to show their displeasure, and to plead for a playoff.

The March was particularly effective because of the location of press corps in town for the Brier, and the protest story reached papers all over Canada. It was hoped that, through this publicity, the Canadian Intecollegiate Athletic Union would revoke the decision. But the march was in vain. Almost every Maritime newspaper agreed that the ruling was a complete fiasco; the referee's point, however, is that no one can do anything about it.

Because the executive made the decision on a by-law of the old handbook, there could be no protest. A telegram to the coach from the CIAT confirmed this. The trouble with the by-law itself, however, is that there is a contradiction in the handbook. Section "A" states that in the 1963-64 season, there will be no playoffs in the next Section. It states that "there will be no playoffs in the whole matter is a bitter pill for everyone at St. Dunstan's. It has been a long year since the Maritime Championship, to see a team come so close and yet not to be so far away is difficult to swallow, especially without a chance to break the first place tie by the conventional method, a playoff game.

**Record Income, Spending Forecast In N.B. Budget**

**FREDERICTON** (CP)—Record high expenditure and revenue, with no change in taxation, were estimated here today by Finance Minister T. DesRivais for the fiscal year starting April 1.

In his budget speech in the New Brunswick legislature, Mr. DesRivais predicted a current account surplus of \$19,881—the difference between expected expenditure of \$12,258,730 and revenue of \$12,969,591.

He also anticipated capital account expenditures of \$30,967,797, with a capital account deficit of \$12,909,797.
