INSURANCE STATISTICS.—An abstract of the reports of insurance companies doing business in Canada in 1890, recently published, shows a considerable increase in premiums and profits by all companies. Canadian fire companies received \$1,249,884 in premiums and paid \$739,113; British companies received \$4,671,452 and paid \$3,145,347; American companies received \$520,292 and paid \$300,918. From 1863 to 1890, inclusive, the premiums paid all fire companies in Canada reached \$85,843,628, while the losses aggregated \$50,816,228. The premiums received by life companies in 1890 show a slight decline compared with the preceding year, though the amount of claims paid is increased by \$226,000.

NEWFOUNDLAND

Disquieting Reports From the Fisheries.

Delegates Before the House of Lords.

Eloquent Presentation By Sir William Whiteway.

LONDON, April 24.

A cablegram from Miquelon to the Paris Temps says: "Forty Newfoundland vessels have run the blockade into St. Pierre with herring. The Fortune Bay fishermen are in armed revolt. Thirty-four armed schooners have left St. Pierre for the Banks."

The scene in the House of Lords yesterday, when the Newfoundland delegates were heard at the bar of the House, was unexampled in British history. The Prince of Wales and a host of the dignitaries of the Empire were present. Premier Whiteway spoke in clear and earnest tones. He recited the history of the treaties with France, and concerning Newfoundland pointed to the steadfast loyalty of the colonists down through the ages, stated the objections to Lord Knutsford's bill in an emphatic and concise manner, and submitted Newfoundland's ultimatum, which he regretted up to the present time had not been accepted, though Newfoundland therein proposed a heavy sacrifice in order to maintain the unity of the Empire.

Lord Knutsford, in moving a postponement of his bill until Monday, paid a high tribute to Sir William Whiteway's eloquent presentation of Newfoundland's case. If the delegates don't get justice they will appeal to the bar of the House of Commons.

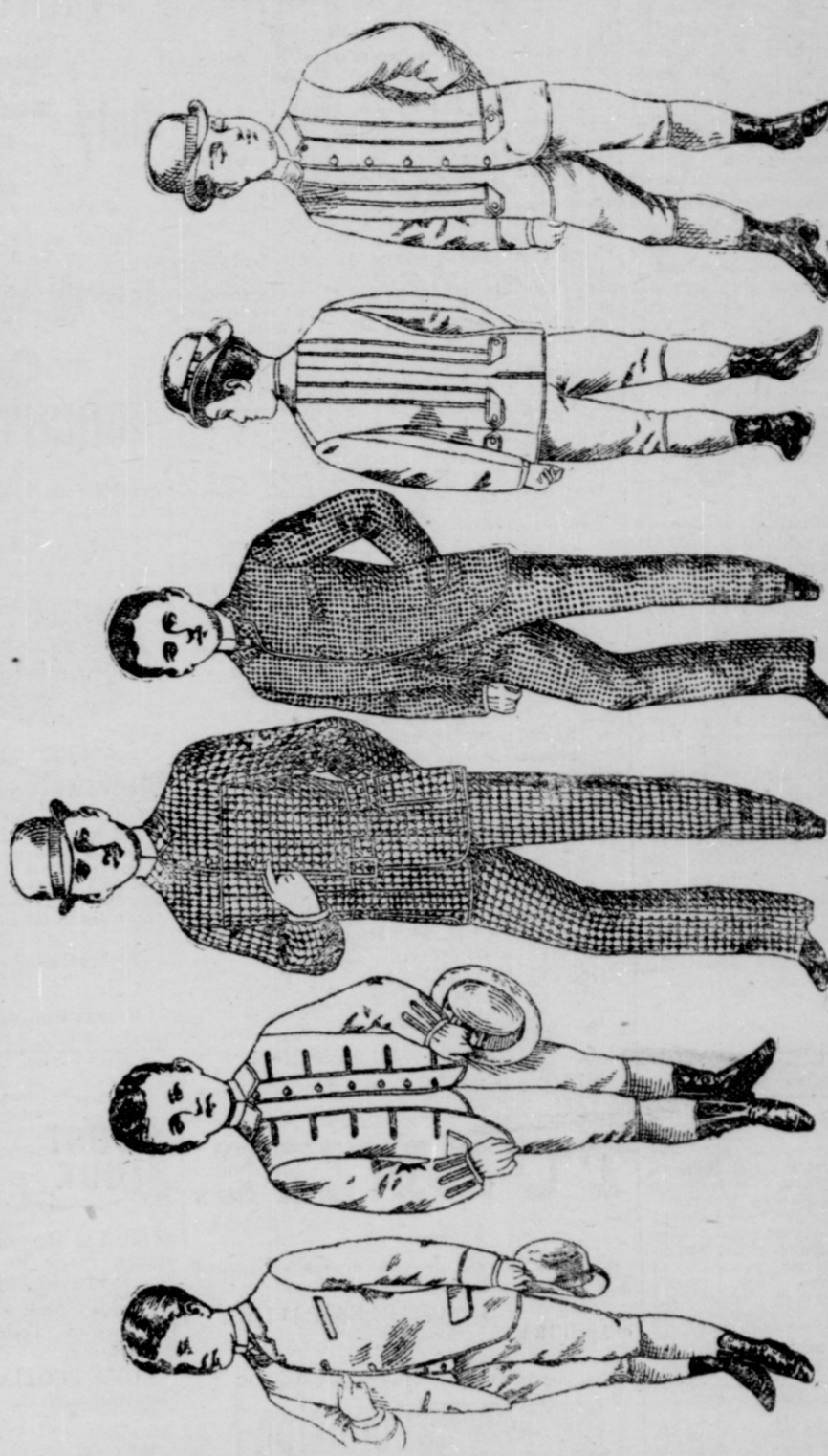
