No Such Thing As Cheap Education, Says Dr. MacKinnon

HALIFAX, (CP) — Dr. Frank MacKinnon, principal of Prince of Wales College at Charlottetown, says taxpayers who hold down teachers' salaries are in the same class with shoppers who expect to buy caviar for five cents a pound. Speaking at a Rotary luncheon here, he said there's no such thing as cheap education.

"Teachers' salaries are on the whole far too low for the kind of teaching we expect," he said.

Newest Icebreaker Sails For Arctic Waters Today

MONTREAL, (CP) — Canada's newest icebreaker, the C.G.S. d'Iberville, casts off from sun-baked Montreal Wednesday night for a cool 12 weeks in Arctic waters.

But the trip will be strictly business, not pleasure. The d'Iberville, loaded with sufficient fuel oil for her 12,000-mile voyage, will sail first for Newfoundland before turning north to Labrador and the islands off northern Quebec.

Aboard she will carry a cross-section of the "other world" lying hundreds of miles north of the bright lights of Canada's modern cities. Her passengers are government scientists and mounties, bearded missionaries and headless Eskimos, and a Newfoundland magistrate, H. Noseworthy, whose job it will be to fly ashore in one of the ship's two helicopters to swear in deputy returning officers for the Aug. 10 federal election.

Varied Cargo

In her holds she has food and medical supplies, mail for east Arctic outposts, trade goods, and complete pre-fabricated barracks for the new R. C. M. P. base.

The R. C. M. P. base is being established at Cape Herschel on lonely Ellismere Island. Four R. C. M. P. constables are going to relieve other officers at R. C. M. P. posts and to open the new Ellismere Island base. Seventeen of the passengers went aboard in Montreal Wednesday night. Among them were eight replacement meteorologists of the department of transport who will take over the running of far north weather stations. At Quebec four Eskimos will come aboard. They are headed here for treatment in Quebec City hospitals. At Cornerbrook, Nfld., the last

stop before the Arctic run, Magistrate Noseworthy, complete with ballot boxes and ballot papers, will join the ship so that he can conduct Canada's 1953 general election at 55 scattered settlements.

All the way north the ship will call at isolated stations to pick up and put down police officers, Hudson Bay officials and missionaries.

Eskimo Families Moving

Sixteen Eskimo families are being brought from Clyde River to points further north where they believe game will be more plentiful. Four families are moving to the new R. C. M. P. post at Cape Herschel, others to Pond Inlet, Resolute Bay and Craig Harbor.

Before returning the d'Iberville will rendezvous with the C.G.S. C. D. Howe to take aboard members of the eastern Arctic patrol of the Department of Resources and Development and Health officials.

Blight Danger From Potato Cull Piles

No late blight has been observed in the potato fields, but active infections have been found on plants growing in cull piles, states the weekly potato bulletin issued by the Science Service Laboratory.

Every year many thousands of dollars are spent to protect the potato crop from attack by the late blight disease, an attack that the growers encourage by dumping piles of old potatoes in key positions over the Province. The spores of the disease organism

N. S. Miners To Seek Advice On Wage Talks

GLACE BAY, N. S., (CP) — Leaders of Nova Scotia's 10,000-member coal miners union announced Wednesday that they plan to fly to Washington for talks with international leaders, presumably for advice in their stalled wage talks.

The executive board of United Mine Workers (CCL) district 26 met here for three days without reaching agreement on the next move in contract negotiations with Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation.

President Freeman Jenkins and several aides will fly to Washington Thursday and plan to be home again for another executive session Monday.

are carried by the wind from these dump heaps to the fields thus providing the growers with the opportunity to use their spray equipment early and often. A more reasonable program would be to spray the cull piles with a strong solution of a vine killer or destroy them by fire.

The first brood of potato flea beetles is now about over, the bulletin states. The second brood will begin to appear about the last week of July. Colorado potato beetle larvae or "red grubs" have been seen in early planted fields and they are causing considerable damage. Potato aphids have been in very early planted fields in Prince Edward Island, but in Nova Scotia they are quite prevalent in the Valley area of Kings County. In this area also high infestations of tarnished plant bugs have been reported and they are causing considerable damage to the plants. DDT 25 per cent emulsion 1 quart to 100 gallons of spray will give a reasonably good control of all these insects.

newest. Thirty-six Sabres from Canada's No. 1 fighter wing at North Luffenham, commanded by Sqdn. Ldr. Bill Gill of Toronto, were in the airborne part of the show.

On the ground earlier, the Queen and the Duke inspected more than 1,000 airmen and 300 lined-up planes, including a Canadian contingent commanded by Wing Cmdr. Doug Lindsay of Arnprior, Ont.

Thousands of persons lined the road from the railway station to greet the royal party, which included the Duke and Duchess of Gloucester and the Duchess of Kent. It was pouring rain when they arrived. The sun broke out later, but a persistent 40-mile-an-hour wind made the fly-past a tricky business.

The planes flew over in two layers. The trainers, including types in which the Duke of Edinburgh won his pilot's wings, were followed by light and heavy bombers at 2,000 feet.

Then came the jets, filling the entire airfield with their white as they swept in over the tree tops at speeds of from 300 to 665 miles an hour.

Four Venom jets climbed into the blue to write "VIVAT"—long live—with their vapor trails. Earlier they had inscribed in the sky the letters "E.R." for Elizabeth Regina.

Aircraft of Tomorrow

Speakers got a look at Britain's aircraft of tomorrow, including the crescent-winged Handley Page Victor, removed only last week from the secret list. The jet bomber flew at a scaled-down 228 miles an hour.

Thousands ducked their heads as a Hawker Hunter fighter screamed in at 700 miles an hour and was lost again, gone almost before they heard it coming.

A Canberra jet screamed across the field. It had left England the same morning for Malta, where the crew breakfasted, and was returning to its home base in Lincolnshire.

Speakers also saw a tiny Tiger Moth trainer piloted by a schoolboy on his first cross-country solo. Before the fly-past began a four-engine transport carrying 32 wounded from Korea flew over the crowd. A radio message of greeting was flashed to the plane.

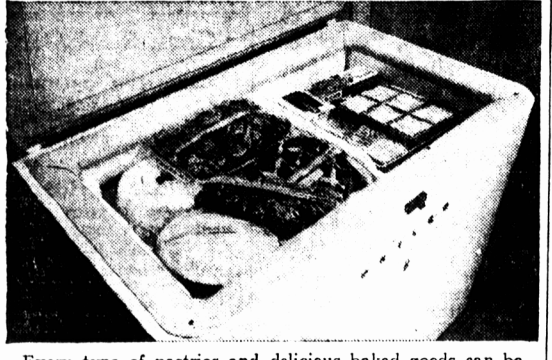

Angel food, sunshine, sponge, butter cakes and spice cakes can be frozen and stored very successfully.

Cakes may be stored either frosted or unfrosted. Homemade cookies make a welcome addition to the lunch box, or a late evening snack. They can be packed in special freezer bags, or placed in regular wax cartons for long time storage. Thawing time takes about 15 to 20 minutes at room temperature.

The wonders of the "Bake and Freeze" method never cease. If the homemaker is interrupted in her baking, or if she decides that she's done enough for the day, she merely packs her unbaked dough in a regular wax carton, and stores it in the freezer for another time. If rolled and cut, celophane sheets should be placed between layers of cookies or doughnuts to prevent their freezing together. Even weeks later, they will bake exactly the same as freshly made dough.
