Case Dismissed Re Transient Resident

The case of Mr. John B. Brown of St. Avards, charged with "being a non-resident of the City and doing transient work within the city without first having obtained a licence" was dismissed by Magistrate K. M. Martin after hearing evidence in the City Police Court on Tuesday morning.

Magistrate Martin held that under the law such non-residents were only required to obtain a transient licence in the event of their employment being for a period of less than two months. In the event of the period of city employment exceeding two months, the regulations requiring the payment of poll tax only, become effective. Mr. Brown, who has been employed by the Maritime Electric Company for more than six months and works in all parts of the province, was represented in court by Mr. G. E. MacMillan.

CEYLON GRAIN MISSION

COLOMBO, Ceylon, (Reuters)—A Canadian grain and flour mission here met R. G. Senanayake, minister of trade and commerce and J. R. Jayawardene, minister of agriculture, Wednesday and discussed Ceylon's flour needs. This is the first time Canada has sent such a mission to an Asiatic country.
