

Braves Take 2 Game Lead By 3-2 Win Over Redlegs

Milwaukee's once-beaten Braves lost their home run punch, but still managed a 3-2 victory over Cincinnati for a two-game lead in the National League Sunday.

In the American, Chicago White Sox defeated Kansas City 5-3 and regained a one-game edge over Boston Red Sox, whose winning streak was ended at five games on Yogi Berra's 10th-inning home run in a 3-2 New York Yankee victory.

Elsewhere in the N.L., Pittsburgh and Bob Friend blanked the second place Brooklyn Dodgers 3-0, and the St. Louis Cardinals swept a doubleheader 6-2 and 4-0 with Chicago Cubs getting only five hits all day. Philadelphia's Phil Rizzuto pitched a shutout in his first game, but the Giants were ahead 8-7 when the nightcap was suspended after 6½ innings by curfew.

TWO SPLITS
In the American, Detroit and Cleveland split a twin bill with Al Aber winning in relief as the Tigers took the opener 2-0, Aber was the nightcap loser, 3-2 in 10 innings. Washington and Baltimore also split their doubleheader, the Senators winning 7-6 in 10 innings, then losing 3-2.

The Braves, who had hit 10 home runs in the last three games, got their ninth victory by bunching most of their nine hits off loser Tom Acker and three relievers: a two-run fourth did it on doubles by Billy Burton and Del Crandall, a hit single by starter Taylor Phillips and Danny O'Connell's sacrifice fly. The Redlegs, now 0-6 vs Milwaukee, got nine walks off Phillips and winning reliever Red Murf, but were turned back by four Milwaukee doubleplays.

FOILES BEAT CRAIG

Hank Foiles' fifth-inning RBI single beat Brooklyn's Roger Craig and the Pirates then packed it away by tagging Clem Labine for a single run in the seventh and eighth on a total of four hits. Friend, now 2-2, gave seven hits, including a triple and double by Gil Hodges.

Rip Repulski, with two doubles and a home run, and Chico Fernandez, with a homer, drove in three runs each for the Phillies who bagged the opener for good with a seven-run eighth inning. Rookie Jack Sanford one-hit the Giants until the eighth, when he gave way to Bob Miller. In the nightcap, the Phils blew a 5-1 lead in a six-run fifth as Gall Harris lined his fourth consecutive double. The game will be completed Aug. 16.

THREE-HIT CUBS

Stan Musial smacked two singles and a home run, good for three and a half runs, in the opener as young Lindy McDaniel three-hit the Cubs. In the second game, Herm Wehmer and Tom Cheney combined for the shutout.

A four-run sixth inning that featured Walt Dropo's two-run homer and Jim Rivera's double capped the White Sox home safe. Gerry Staley saved the victory for Jim Wilson, who gave up home runs to Gus Zernial, Jim Pisoni and Hal Smith.

Berras third home run of the season gave Don Larsen the Yankee victory in relief. Larsen came on in the ninth when the Red Sox rallied for two runs off Bob Grim, who had relieved Whitley Ford, to tie it. Ike Delock was the loser in relief, Mickey Mantle and Billy Martin were thrown out of the Yankee lineup for protesting umpire decisions.

Early Wynn had permitted the Tigers only one hit in an eight-inning shutout duel with Detroit's rookie Don Lee and Aber, but then was lagged for Frank Bolling's leadoff double, a single by Charlie Maxwell and a double by Ray Boone in the ninth to lose the opener. The Indians took the second game when Jim Busby singled, and scored on an error by catcher Frank House. Ray Nariieski won it in relief.

Washington won with a run after two were out in the 10th on a walk and singles by Clint Courtney and Jerry Snyder. Dick Williams scored the Oriole clincher on a passed ball after tripling in the nightcap fourth.

Richmond Vees Win Two, Move Back Into First

Richmond Virginians licked their doubleheader jinx and stormed back into first place in the International League race Sunday by whipping Montreal Royals twice, 2-1 and 6-1.

Beaten in both ends of their two previous twin bills, the Vees sent a pair of lefthanders—Jim Kite in the opener and George Maier in the nightcap—against the Royals and ran their seasonal record to 9-4 while taking a 3-0 lead in their four-game series with Montreal.

In other Sunday games Havana's Vicente Amor and Rancihillo Ramirez, fired shutouts as the Sugar Kings broke a four-game losing streak by defeating Rochester 2-0

and 3-0; Buffalo Bisons beat Miami 2-1 in the first game and then were clobbered 1-7 in the nightcap and Columbus beat Toronto 6-3 in the first half of a win bill.

At Richmond, Kite drove over the first Virginian run and had a shutout until the ninth inning, when he needed help from Johnny James to preserve his first victory against one defeat. James finally got out of the inning, but not without a struggle. He walked Al Ronning to force over a run but then got Al Schweigman on an infield out.

Maier struck out eight and was in constant trouble because of

wildness, even though he walked just four batters. The Montreal run came in the fourth on a single by Jim Williams and a double by Ronning.

At Havana Amor's opening victory came on a brilliant two-bitter in which the righthander faced only 23 men. In the nine-inning nightcap, Ramirez scattered seven Rochester hits as his mates pummeled Bob Blaylock for 11.

At Miami, Bisons scored both their first game runs in the seventh. After Dave Melton singled, Bobby Micelotta loaded the bases. A two-out single by Joe Caffe drove in Melton and Bill Stewart.

A shirt-sleeved crowd of 6,543, largest of the series to date, roared its approval as the wide-open, hard-hitting style snapped tempers with a minute remaining. All the players but the opposing goalkeepers got into the brawl which developed from a shoving

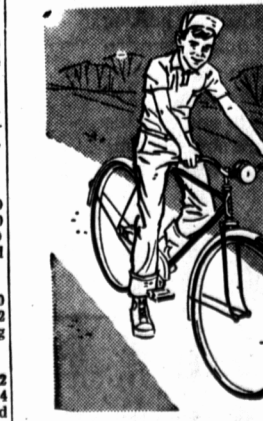
match between Whitby's Tom O'Connor and Bud Bodman of the Flyers.

Fairview, a Halifax suburb, got back on their feet in the third game after taking a 15-6 drubbing in the second. Sixteen teams entered the competition.

Sixteen teams played for the Walter Callow trophy in the highly successful tournament, which was run off on four Saint John Gymnasiums. The championship game was played at the YMCA gym.

The tournament was divided into four sections, A, B, C and D. Section "A" morning play saw St. John's United of Halifax march off with a two out of three wins over Basilea Youth Club of Charlottetown 14-16, 15-7 and 15-12. From there the Halifax team was never to be caught until the semi-finals. It was defeated by Stadacona two out of three matches 11-15, 15-5 and 15-9. That win put the Aces in the finals.

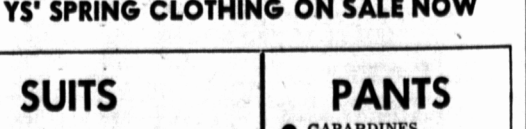
