## THE NEW YORK ELECTION.

All the Old Bets are Off.

HENRY GEORGE'S SON, HENRY GEORGE, JR.,

Selected to Run Instead of His Father.

NEW YORK, Oct. 30.—As a result of Henry George's death, all the election bets may be declared off.

The Henry George campaign committee was in session over three hours yesterday. Representatives of various organizations supporting Mr. George made speeches as to what course ought to be pursued. Some of them favored endorsing Seth Low.

A telegram came from Allan W. Thurman, urging the nomination of Henry George, jr. This suggestion was adopted unanimously and enthusiastically. A committee was appointed to see whether the son would accept. Henry George, jr., was seen almost immediately, and he has accepted.

## A LANTIC MAILS CONTRACT.

Fifty Thousand Dollars Added Cost,

BEAVER LINE TO CARRY MAILS FROM ST. JOHN.

Halifax Out in the Cold.

OTTAWA, Oct. 30.—There is a certainty that the Beaver Line will be given a contract to carry the Atlantic mails. The present subsidy will be increased by fifty thousand dollars, and St. John will be the port of call for the first time in fifty years. Halifax will have no English mail service.

## NEW BRUNSWICK GOVERNMENT.

A Shuffle in the Cabinet.

EMMERSON AT THE HEAD OF AFFAIRS

In Lize With Dominion Government.

ST. JOHN, Oct. 30.—Premier Mitchell resigned his office yesterday, and last night a reconstruction was effected. H. R. Emmerson becomes Premier, retaining the office of Commissioner of Public Works; A. S. White exchanges the office of Solicitor General for that of Attorney General. The late Premier, who was Attorney General, becomes Solicitor General. Dunn, Tweedie and Labellois retain their present offices.

The change is occasioned by the ill-health of the Premier, whose present office will be a sinecure.

The change transfers the Premiership to the Liberal party. Mr. Emmerson has been twice a grit candidate for Ottawa.

## NEWFOUNDLAND ELECTIONS.

Reduced Government Majorities.

Not Unlikely that Whiteway Government is Defeated.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Oct. 30.—The results of the general elections are coming in slowly. They indicate that the Whiteway Government will have a much smaller majority in the new House of Assembly, and that they will, perhaps, be defeated. Mr. Woods, Surveyor-General, has been defeated.

Mr. Morris, a member of the Cabinet without portfolio and Solicitor-General, barely carried his seat. All the Government majorities are largely reduced.

## LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL.

OTTAWA, Oct. 27.—Papers were made out today committing Ferdinand Carrier to an insane asylum. He is the man from Rimouski, who flourished a revolver and threatened Premier Laurier's life. Dr. Church says he is too dangerous to be at large.

LETTERIDGE, Alberta, Oct. 27.—During the absence of its parents, a little six-year old son of J. B. Rudd, of the Foot Hills got hold of a loaded gun and shot the head off his little three-year-old sister. The parents are heart-broken over the sad affair.

TORONTO, Oct. 28.—The Dominion bank has received an application for a portion of the reward offered in connection with the burglary of the bank's vaults at Napanee. The application is for two thousand dollars offered for the return of ten thousand dollars unsigned ten dollar bank bills taken from the vault. The application was made in a letter received through the hands of a newsboy. The boy says he was approached last night by a black bearded man who got him to dictate the letter in question. The money is to be paid to the account of a certain name in one of the New York, city banks when the bills will be returned through the agency of the newsboy in question. The bank had also to promise not to put detectives on the track. The bank is now considering the application for the reward.

LONDON, Oct. 28.—Lord Rosemead of Rosemead, better known by his former name and title of Sir Hercules Robinson, who was appointed governor and commander in chief of Cape Colony in 1895, died here this evening.

HAMBURG, Oct. 28.—The Boarsenhalle today announces that an agreement has been entered into between the Hamburg American steamship company and the Grand Trunk Railroad of Canada, for a regular monthly service between Hamburg and Portland, Maine, for which service some of the best steamers of the company have been designated.

LONDON, Oct. 29.—The Daily Chronicle prints this morning a sensational telegram from Bombay, which says: "There is much speculation here as to the reasons for the withdrawal of the second battalion Royal Irish regiment from Samana at Rawalpindi. It is asserted on one hand that the men balked at the critical moment and refused to march further. On the other hand, Colonel Lawrence says that two companies were at the front with other troops on the day in question, while the remaining companies were retired by order of a staff officer. This latter statement is contradicted from headquarters, but it is asserted that the order was to advance and not to retire."

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 27.—Much discussion has been caused here by the fact that the faculty of Cooper medical College declared that sixteen patients have been saved from consumption by Dr. Joseph O. Hirschfelder's remedy. This cure is exyberculine, made from veal which has been saturated with turberculine. Hirschfelder has been experimenting three years to secure this lymph. Among the patients whom he has cured is Thomas H. Williams, jr., the wealthy horse-breeder. All the other patients were carefully examined and all were declared cured. Some were far advanced in the disease when they began the treatment.

Oxytuberculine is injected, and soon restores vitality and heals the lungs.

STOCKHOLM, Oct. 28.—Dr. Otto Norden-skjold, the well-known Arctic explorer, will superintend an expedition to be fitted out at the joint expense of Norway and Sweden, to ascertain whether any trace of Prof. Andree's balloon can be found near Prince Charles Promontory.

BRINDISI, Italy, Oct. 28.—News from Athens, which the censor there refused to allow the operators to send, says that great excitement prevailed at the Greek capital on Monday. Several hundred volunteers invaded many of the shops of the city and seized clothing and food. The shopkeepers resisted some of them using arms in so doing. This caused a panic. All the shops in the town were hurriedly closed and finally the rioters were dispersed by the troops, who succeeded in arresting the ringleaders. The rioters defended their conduct.

TANGIER, Oct. 28.—The Sultan of Morocco has won a victory over the Beni-anier tribe at Tadia. The tribesmen fled to the mountains. Many prisoners were taken, and 55 heads were spiked on the walls of Marakech.

PARIS, Oct. 28.—The Eclair publishes a remarkable article to-day, to the effect that three French missions are now on the way to Khartoum, by forced marches, as the result of an understanding with the Madhi, reached in 1896, by which France recognizes the Soudan as an independent state, under the suzerainty of the Sultan of Turkey, in return for certain concessions. In conclusion the Eclair says: "France is acting in these regions by the express desire of the Madhi, and in conformity with the principle of the maintenance of integrity of the Ottoman Empire, incessantly proclaimed by M. Hanotaux."

HALIFAX, Oct. 29.—There came near being a fatal accident here yesterday afternoon during an exhibition of Horton's new patent extension ladder. The ladder was elevated 70 feet and two men mounted it with two streams of water. The ladder suddenly collapsed, bending like a reed. The two men were thrown in against Gordon & Keith's large warehouse, before which the exhibition was taking place, and to save their lives had to cling to the window sills of the fourth story for several minutes, to the horror of the spectators. The men finally broke in the windows and crawled into the building. The ladder was not properly guyed and this caused it to bend. It was a close call for the men.

SIMLA, India, Oct. 28.—During the recent attack upon tribesmen who had occupied Dargai Ridge, one of the pipers belonging to the Gordon Highlanders, who were leading the attack, was shot through both ankles, rendering it impossible for him to walk. His wounds did not, however, diminish his ardour. Sitting amid the hail of bullets, he continued his piping as unconcerned as though he was on parade. This is only one instance of the coolness and bravery displayed by the Highlanders, which have called forth the praises of the commanders. The losses of the tribesmen at the storming of Dargai Ridge were 1,000 killed and wounded.

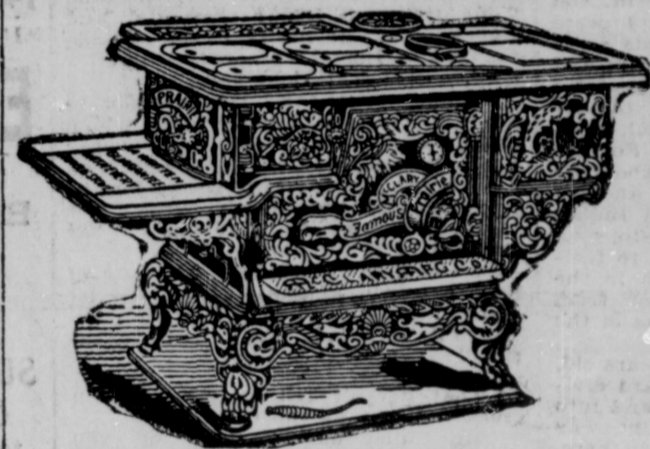
