OTTAWA (Special) J. Watson MacNaught, Liberal M.P. for Prince and parliamentary assistant to Fisheries minister Sinclair, held a series of last-minute conferences here Friday with departmental officials prior to leaving for Japan to attend a meeting in Tokyo of the North Pacific Fisheries Commission. He also completed a series of inoculations required for Canadians travelling to Asiatic countries. Leaving Ottawa tonight, Mr. MacNaught will stop over for two days in Vancouver to discuss his Tokyo visit with Fisheries Minister Sinclair who is convalescing from injuries suffered in the course of a trip to Siberia earlier this year. He will also spend some time securing the latest data on the West Coast salmon industry in company of the superintendent of western fisheries. Prior to his departure, Mr. MacNaught told the Guardian he is hopeful that the Tokyo meeting will display the same spirit of co-operation as has marked previous meetings of the International North Pacific Fisheries Commission.

Queen Unveils Bronze Statue To Her Father

By Robert Rice Canadian Press Staff Writer LONDON (CP) - Queen Elizabeth, wearing a black showerproof coat stood Friday in a steady drizzle as she unveiled a bronze statue of her father, King George V. All members of the Royal Family, except the Princess Royal who is in Canada, were present in a garden terrace near St. James's Palace for the tribute to the "sailor king" on a day which also marked the 150th anniversary of Trafalgar, Britain's greatest naval victory. "It is fitting," the Queen said, "that this ceremony should take place on the anniversary of one of the great events of our history as a seafaring nation." She spoke quietly and clearly of her father, who died Feb. 6, 1952 after ruling from 1936. She said he gave "his unremitting service and all of his strength" to uphold the realm and promote the happiness of his peoples. The Queen pulled the white cord unveiling the bronze figure which Chelsea sculptor William McMillan took three years to shape. Then she said down her black umbrella. A French official in morning dress picked it up and held it over her as she spoke into a microphone. The monument, part of a larger memorial to the king, shows the monarch standing bareheaded in the uniform of an admiral of the fleet, his left hand on a sword. Among the crowd were Commonwealth representatives, including Canadian high commissioner Norman Robertson. Prime Minister Eden and Opposition Leader Clement Attlee stood with other members of Parliament. The monument was erected by a memorial committee which is devoting most of the £1,424,400 pounds collected to helping young and elderly persons. Of this, the Queen said: "I am sure that nothing would have given him more pleasure than the knowledge that his memorial fund is providing for the welfare of young and old alike."

Gardiner Sticks To Guns On Butter Stocks View

REGINA (CP) - Agriculture Minister Gardiner says Canada needs 600,000 pounds of butter at all times to keep the pipeline filled, and another 300,000 pounds to prevent sudden consumer-price increases. In an interview here Friday he told the National Dairy Council to task for its criticism of his recent statement that if Canada sells between 10,000,000 and 12,000,000 pounds of butter there will be no surplus. "The council says in a recent statement there is storage now for 42,000,000 pounds more than the five-year average at this time and the agricultural prices support board has the greater part of it. "When we got down to the five-year average once in the last six years the so-called dealers raised the price in Regina to the consumer to as high as 85 cents a pound toward spring. "So long as we need butter to prevent that, then it is not a surplus."
