

**Farm Officials Issue Series**

F.M. Cannon, entomologist and L.C. Calbeck, plant pathologist at the Experimental Farm issued the fifth in a series of Potato Bulletins yesterday morning. It reads as follows:

"Because of the virtual absence of potato late blight last year and the hot, dry weather that has prevailed during July and most of August, we may consider that the chances of infection so far this season have been slight, only a trace of the disease having been observed at this date. However we must not rule out the 'insurance' aspects of spraying. The acreage is higher than in any previous year and it would be foolish to gamble with it. Any period of wet, sunny weather from now on should be regarded as dangerous because, in addition to any local sources of infection that may exist, the

possibly of spores drifting in from outside the region cannot be ignored. Aphids have greatly increased in most potato fields during the past week. Second brood flea beetles are now out but generally they are not numerous. Second brood Colorado potato beetles are quite common and although this stage may not cause serious damage to the plants at the present time, they should be controlled because these adults overwinter in the soil and could produce high populations next year. Thiodan, or a similar type insecticide, is satisfactory for controlling all these species."

**Nova Scotian Harp Player Is Performing Here Sunday**

Phyllis Ensher used to go to supermarkets hunting for a mute for her harp. She'd try Dominion and Sobey's and all the rest, but in Halifax, where she makes her home now, she couldn't find anything of quite the right thickness.

You see, to mute a harp you use a paper bag. Not very glamorous perhaps, but it works. However, when Phyllis plays here Sunday evening in concert at Confederation Centre she'll be using a piece of very soft felt for the paper bag effect.

The work she's performing with The Atlantic Orchestra has a lot of interesting effects like the muting, she said in an interview. Harry Somers' "Suite for Harp and Chamber Orchestra" is "a very enjoyable work to play."

Somers, like Phyllis, studied under harpist Carlos Salzedo, the man who developed the paper bag muting technique. **LIKE ALGEBRA**

Phyllis Ensher was born in Boston and took up the harp at "about eleven or twelve." "My mother started me on the instrument," she said. "She thinks every youngster should have music. It's a good thing to know like algebra or geometry. Music should be part of your life as well."

"She thought I'd be more interested in it (harp) than in piano." Certainly Phyllis was interested. She started on a little Irish harp and while still playing that, gave her first recital,

but on "a big harp with pedals." She didn't know how to work the pedals on a harp they're to make sharps and flats, not for volume control—and indeed, she couldn't even reach them, so her teacher stood behind her and did it for her.

Later she graduated to two bigger models and studied at the Curtis Institute of Music, then in 1958 moved to Halifax, where she bought the standard concert model she has now.

In fact, she has two harps. It's a necessity with such a large instrument. One is one place, the other somewhere else. The harp is taller than Phyllis is, and when she goes to perform somewhere she travels with it in a truck with an entourage of two reliable movers.

**THE FROSTING** Phyllis is nationally known mainly through a popular CBC television series of a few years back, "Kingfisher Cove." It was an informal weekly program in which Phyllis, a violinist and several singers performed in a Nova Scotia home. But in spite of its popularity it was dropped suddenly by the network.

Now, sighs Phyllis, "a harpist in Halifax is like frosting on a cake" and she's spent much of the past year working in a bank. "The harp is a lovely instrument, but in fact it was not used orchestral until Wagner, and to play works after Wagner you need a very large orchestra," she explained.

So although she belongs to the Halifax Symphony, the number of works in which she can play with the orchestra is limited. Nevertheless, Halifax will be her base for the next few years while her husband Frank Peters, the Atlantic Orchestra's first oboe, studies engineering physics at Dalhousie University.

**BROADENED TASTE** Still, working in Halifax has broadened her musical tastes to include a wide range of fields. She's done solo recitals, theatre music, original compositions for a children's television show called "Indian Legends," popular music, and jigs and reels on the Don Messer show.

In a big centre I'd probably do just the symphony work. In smaller places you have to be able to do everything, she comments. "I'd love to try rock and roll!" she said.

She'd also like to experiment with an electronic hookup for her harp. After all, if guitar players can do it...

Phyllis likes working with theatre people, and in the past year she's become more and more involved with stage companies.

Last summer she and her husband did the incidental background music for Neptune Theatre's "As You Like It." Then in the fall Phyllis played the season with The Canadian Opera Company in Toronto.

The winter brought a special musical thrill with the Manitoba Theatre Centre's western tour of the musical "The Fantasticks", which took Phyllis as far west as Calgary.

This summer, as a member of The Atlantic Orchestra here at the Festival, Phyllis is playing the pit for "Anne of Green Gables" and "The Adventures of Private Turvey", and has played in several Sunday concerts.

The Somers suite is on the second half of this Sunday's program. Also scheduled for performance are Murray Schafer's overture "Festival Music for Small Orchestra"; Schubert's "Symphony No. 5 in B flat major"; and Wagner's "Siegfried Idyll". The concert begins at 9 p.m.

**Wilson Deflationary Moves Biting Into Auto Industry**

LONDON (Reuters)—The British government's massive deflationary measures announced last month seem to be biting at the cost of jobs, particularly in the export-winning automobile industry.

Thousands of workers have been warned their jobs are in jeopardy while hundreds have already been laid off. Government hopes that the measures would help to restore overseas confidence in the pound sterling also appeared to be justified.

The pound was officially quoted here Wednesday at \$2.7894 (U.S.) compared with \$2.7873 before the July 20 squeeze.
