Red Arrests Across India Exceed 2,000

More than 2,000 Communists have been arrested throughout India since their party launched a five-day country-wide campaign Monday against rising food prices.

Some 500 Communist demonstrators were arrested Tuesday afternoon in New Delhi, Bombay, Jaipur and other cities raising the total to more than 2,000.

New Delhi police picked up Communists picketing leading banks and the capital's stock exchange.

Some 100,000 party members, including Leader S. A. Dange, rallied to the cause in a bid to win the backing of at least a million Indians.

Prime Minister Lal Bahadur Shastri's government currently faces a critical food problem with the winter harvest still six weeks away.

Family Allowance Forms Delayed

Forms to be filled out by parents of children qualifying under new FA regulations for further payments and expenses allowances have been delayed in the mailing.
