

Council Hears Encouraging Report On Polio Situation

The fact that there were no polio cases so far in Charlottetown and only two in the Province was reported by Dr. Wendall MacDonald, City Health Officer, as due to the carrying out of the Salk program which he gave his report to the regular monthly meeting of the City Council yesterday afternoon.

Referring to the presence of several outdoor toilet facilities within the City limits, the Health Officer said that topographical conditions would necessitate installation of a pumping station in order to provide sewerage system for many residents particularly in the Upper Queen street area. Several Councillors felt that this should be done and Mayor J.D. Stewart, who presided, said he would speak privately to the Board of Water Commissioners.

An amendment to a traffic by-law proposed by Councillor Arthur Gormley was given third reading. It provides for no parking on Queen street near Plover Councillor Gormley invited visitors to the city were not accustomed to looking high on the sides of buildings for street names and said they should be on corner standards as in other cities.

Dealing with Public Property Councillor Elmer MacDonald said the City was still waiting for the money promised by the Provincial Government to help defray cost of improvements in the Government Pond section. The Mayor said he would write Premier W. Matheson reminding him of the Government's promise.

A communication from the City School Board was read dealing with a request for funds still remaining from the total borrowed for the building of Queen Charlotte High. The Council previously pointed out that since the money was borrowed for the High School they could not give any of it to the School Board.

The letter read from the Board explained that it had made arrangements with the Sanatorium Commission to heat the new School from the Sanatorium in order to save money. This had necessitated installation of two new boilers in the Sanatorium for which the School Board had been billed for \$15,000. This amount had been amortized and one payment had been made with another due in December. The matter was left with the City Clerk for further correspondence.

Council authorized the purchase of two gas masks for use of the Fire Department and the sale of the old Bickle Seagrave flusher-sprinkler to Harold Moore for \$400. It also appointed Constable Alexander to heat the new School from the Sanatorium in order to save money. This had necessitated installation of two new boilers in the Sanatorium for which the School Board had been billed for \$15,000.

Mr. W.R. Ricey, President of the Fisheries Council of Canada who arrived on the Island on Sunday, was in conference with the directors of the P.E. Island Fisheries Federation last evening following a dinner meeting at the Charlottetown Hotel. In attendance were Messrs. S.H. Burrows, President, J.E. Burden, A.E. Gallant and A. Walthen Gaudet, Secretary.

Mr. Ricey on arrival motored direct to Tignish where he discussed problems of the industry with fishermen there and later conferred with similar interests in Alberton, Summerside and North Ruston before coming to the city. He will continue his round of activities today by calling on the fishermen at Souris, Montague, Sturgeon and Murray Harbour.

Last night Mr. Ricey said he was very pleased to learn of the steps taken by the Fisheries Federation towards closer co-operation with all associations so that an orderly approach may be made to governments on questions of mutual interest. He was also glad to hear of the successful lobster season which the Province has experienced, not forgetting the prevalence of Irish Moss, particularly in Prince County which has been the source of considerable revenue.

Mr. Ricey recently returned from Kingston, Jamaica, where he attended talks on the situation there with respect to salt fish, on behalf of the Canadian Atlantic Salt Fish Association of Nova Scotia. More recently he spent two weeks in Newfoundland visiting the plants there as part of his itinerary which brings him to the Island and will eventually take him to Vancouver.

On Sept. 15, Mr. Ricey will represent the Fisheries Council of Canada on a tour which the Minister of Fisheries, Hon. James Sinclair, will make along with the Minister of Fisheries from Russia and his official party. The schedule of points in Canada to be visited is as yet undisclosed. Mr. Ricey will leave the party in Winnipeg and return to Toronto to be joined by Gordon O'Brien of the Fisheries Council to continue his own official Canadian tour.

Mr. Ricey who resides in Riverport, N.S. is accompanied on his Island tour by Mrs. Ricey and their daughter Mrs. Albert Eisenhauer.
