4-Day Rocket Shoot Planned

ST. HUBERT, Que. (CP)—A four-day rocket shoot will be held this month over the rocky bushlands of northern Alberta, with 18 RCAF jet teams battling for the title of Canada's best aerial gunners.

The intercepter rocket shoot will be staged Sept. 15-19 over the 4,000-square-mile air force range at Cold Lake, Alta.

Two teams from each of the nine Canadian-based intercepter squadrons will blast away with six-rocket salvos at a seven-foot plastic target towed by T-33 jets. The winning team will get the MacDermid trophy presented by Air Vice-Marshal W. R. MacBrien who recently took command of Air Defence Command.

Manager Of Montague Bank Returns From Wales Visit

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Agree On Radiation Danger But Scientists Are Hopeful

By JAMES TOMLINS — GENEVA (Reuters) — American and Soviet scientists agreed Friday on the dangers of radiation to mankind, but held out hope of an eventual cure for the dread atomic disease.

The warnings and hopeful statements came in a series of research papers presented to 5,000 delegates at the 69-country "atoms for peace" conference here.

Western and Communist delegates expressed surprise at the similarity of much of their respective research into radiation hazards and protective measures. Two United States scientists told the conference they have found an unidentified substance in living cells which is able to prevent death caused by radiation.

AMOEBIA EXPERIMENTS — Experimenting with the one-cell amoeba, Dr. E. W. Daniels and H. H. Vogel of Chicago's Argonne National Laboratory reported saving 96 per cent of these primitive forms of animal life after they were exposed to normally lethal doses of radioactivity.

A technical paper submitted by Russian, Chinese and Bulgarian scientists said the nervous system is affected within 20 minutes of even the smallest exposure to radiation. It previously has been assumed the nervous system resisted radiation. Mutual compliments were handed out at a press conference after the scientists had outlined to the atoms congress some of the techniques aimed at achieving a controlled thermonuclear reaction.

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Descriptions of some Soviet projects have "added to one phase of American understanding" of the so-far unsolved problem, said Dr. Sterling A. Colgate of the University of California.

Russia's V. M. Glagolev, a member of the Soviet Academy of Sciences, came right back with particular praise for the work of American scientists on the thermonuclear project.

Text Of Prime Minister's Proposed Bill Of Rights

OTTAWA (CP)—Text of Prime Minister Diefenbaker's proposed Bill of Rights: An act for the recognition and protection of human rights and fundamental freedoms.

Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows:

PART I Bill of Rights

1. This part may be cited as the Canadian Bill of Rights.

2. It is hereby recognized and declared that in Canada there have always existed and shall continue to exist the following human rights and fundamental freedoms, namely:

(a) The right of the individual to life, liberty, security of the person and enjoyment of property, and the right not to be deprived thereof except by due process of law;

(b) The right of the individual to protection of the law without discrimination by reason of race, national origin, color, religion or sex;

(c) Freedom of religion;

(d) Freedom of speech;

(e) Freedom of assembly and association; and

(f) Freedom of the press.

3. All the acts of the Parliament of Canada enacted before or after the commencement of this part, all orders, rules and regulations thereunder, and all laws in force in Canada or in any part of Canada at the commencement of this part that are subject to be repealed, abolished or altered by the Parliament of Canada, shall be so construed, abridge or infringe or to authorize the abrogation, abridgement or infringement of any of the rights or freedoms recognized by this part, and, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, no such act, order, rule, regulation or law shall be construed or applied so as to:

(a) Impose or authorize the imposition of torture, or cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment;

(b) Deprive a person who has been arrested or detained (I) of the right to be informed promptly of the reason for his arrest or detention, (II) of the right to retain and instruct counsel without delay, or (III) of the remedy by way of habeas corpus for the determination of the validity of his detention and for his release if the detention is not lawful;

(c) Authorize a court, tribunal, commission, board or other authority to compel a person to give evidence if he is denied counsel or other constitutional safeguards;

(d) Deprive a person of the right to a fair hearing in accordance with the principles of fundamental justice for the determination of his rights and obligations; or

(e) Deprive a person of the right to a fair and public hearing by an independent and impartial tribunal for the determination of any criminal charge against him.

4. The minister of justice shall, in accordance with such regulation as may be prescribed by the governor in council, examine every proposed regulation submitted in draft form to the clerk of the Privy Council pursuant to the Regulations Act and every

bill introduced in the House of Commons, to ensure that the purposes and provisions of this part in relation thereto are fully carried out.

PART II

5. Nothing in part I shall be construed to abrogate or abridge any human right or fundamental freedom not enumerated therein that may have existed in Canada at the commencement of this act.

6. Section 8 of the War Measures Act is repealed and the following substituted therefor:

"6. (1) Sections 3, 4 and 5 shall come into force only upon the issue of a proclamation of the governor in council declaring that war, invasion or insurrection real or apprehended, exists.

(2) A proclamation declaring that war, invasion or insurrection, real or apprehended, exists shall be laid before Parliament forthwith after its issue, or, if Parliament is then not sitting, within the first 15 days next thereafter that Parliament is sitting.

(3) Where a proclamation has been laid before Parliament pursuant to subsection (2), a notice of motion in either House signed by 10 members thereof and made in accordance with the rules of that House within 10 days of the day the proclamation was laid before Parliament, praying that the proclamation be revoked, shall be debated in that House at the first convenient opportunity within the four sitting days next after the day the motion in that House was made.

(4) If both Houses of Parliament resolve that the proclamation be revoked, it shall cease to have effect, and sections 3, 4 and 5 shall cease to be in force until those sections are again brought into force by a further proclamation but without prejudice to the previous operation of those sections or anything duly done or suffered thereunder or any offence committed or any penalty or forfeiture or punishment incurred.

(5) Any act or thing done or authorized or any order or regulation made under the authority

of this part, shall be deemed not to be abrogation, abridgement or infringement of any right or freedom recognized by the Canadian Bill of Rights."
