Struck By Baseball Bat Boy Is Flown To Halifax

City police early last night reported an aura of mystery surrounded how and where Lloyd Blaquiere, 13-year-old son of Mrs. Nettie Blaquiere and the late Jack Blaquiere, 273 Dorchester Street, city, received a serious head injury at about 3.30 p.m. Sunday. The mystery was finally cleared at a late hour after questioning of the lad's companions. Reports indicate that the youth was playing baseball on the vacant lot across from Buster MacMillan's service station on ea.t Grafton Street and that he was struck on the head with a baseball bat. The injured youth was removed to the Charlottetown Hospital where investigation and tests apparently revealed that the injury was more serious than first suspected. As a result of the tests a call was sent for aid from the RCAF, and the injured youth was flown from the Charlottetown airport shortly after 6.30 last night via an RCAF Albatross

'Forbie' Hurt As Car Rolls

Well known hockey player with the Detroit Red Wings of the National Hockey League, Forbie Kennedy, received a painful injury Saturday evening when his new Ford Falcon station wagon rolled over several times.

Another passenger in the vehicle, Joseph Coyle received a wrenched back, and a third man, Ivan Brown escaped uninjured when he was thrown through an open window. Kennedy was taken to the Kings County Memorial Hospital in Montague for more than a dozen stitches in his scalp. He returned to Charlottetown and yesterday entered the P.E.I. Hospital where x-rays will be

taken today of his neck and shoulder. The mishap is said to have occurred in the vicinity of Montague about 6 o'clock Saturday evening as the party was returning from a fishing trip to the Cardigan River. The station wagon is said to have struck a soft spot on the shoulder of the unpaved road as it was passing another car.

It struck a heavy rut which caused the vehicle to roll over several times, it was reported.

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
