of blotter, which is later mailed to the Department of Health laboratories to be tested.

**NO COST TO PARENTS**

The testing will be at no cost to parents.

"The first 400 cases are to be included in a continent-wide research project conducted by Dr. Gutrie," the spokesman stated. "In these cases we ask mothers to mail urine tests to the lab. If there are no problems with the first 400 tests we'll carry on with just the blood tests."

With an average of 2,500 babies born on the Island each year, the P.C.I. testing will involve a great deal of work. It is a cooperative effort of several groups.

Spearheaded by the Child Health Committee of the P.E.I. Medical Association, which provided the initiative and organization, the project involves the P.E.I. Division of the Canadian Association for Retarded Children, supplying the necessary funds, the provincial laboratories of the Department of Health, handling the technical aspects, and the hospital staffs, collecting the specimens.

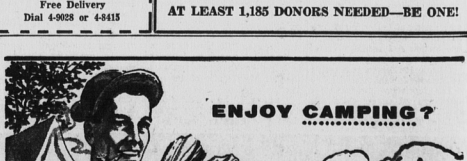

### Little Theatre Guild Closes Season With Shavian Note

"Man and Superman" is both a comedy and a philosophy. Brenda O'Grady, MA, PhD, told the audience at the year's final presentation of the Charlottetown Little Theatre Guild Thursday night.

Dr. O'Grady, professor of English at St. Dunstan's University, was giving a talk explaining the nature of the writings of playwright George Bernard Shaw, particularly as related to the play "Man and Superman," previous to a reading of a portion of that play by four Little Theatre actors.

Shavian comedy, he said, is of a kind which is not a comedy in the usual sense of the word, but a comedy in the sense that it is a comedy of ideas.

"Shaw isolates his hero, who proclaims his independence, seeks approval from his own conscience and in the end becomes a victim of his own wisdom," said Dr. O'Grady.

Dr. O'Grady went on to explain further the elements of Shaw's writings and the playwright's intentions in writing the play. He contrasted the Shaw play, based generally on the "Don Juan legend," with Mozart's opera, "Don Giovanni," from which the play is more directly taken.

Following Dr. O'Grady's introduction, the "Dream Sequence" or "Don Juan in Hell" from Act 3 of "Man and Superman" was dramatically read by Mary Moran, Ken Dolan, Al Breerton and Dr. J. J. Coyte.

This scene, Dr. O'Grady explained, was because of the length of Shaw's plays, seldom performed.

### RECALLED DOCTOR

Gasbarri was recalled from Bologna to assist physicians already on the scene when the emergency developed at the main entrance to the apostolic palace, which is closed on the death of a pope, remained open in the afternoon.

In Sotto il Monte (Under the Mountain), the Italian villa where the Pope was born Angelo Giuseppe Roncalli, his three elderly farm brothers received an urgent visit from Bishop Giuseppe Piazzi of nearby Bergamo.
