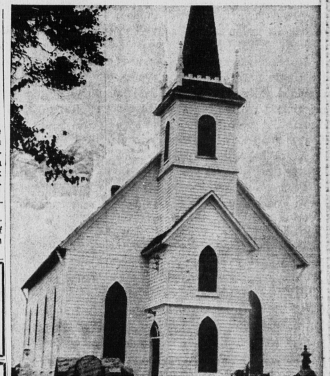


BEARDS OF ALL KINDS SEEN AT S'IDE

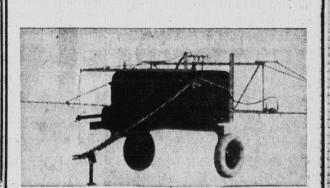
