



Dodgers Smash Six Homers To Defeat Milwaukee Braves 11-8 In Hot Slugfest

BROOKLYN, (AP)—Duke Snider smashed three home runs and a double as the Brooklyn Dodgers came up with six homers to beat the Milwaukee Braves Wednesday night in a weird 11-8 slugfest.

Snider took over the major league leadership with 15 homers, and his eighth inning double splashed high on the right field screen. He was the first player in the National League to hit three homers in one game this year. Three American League batsmen have smacked three in one game this spring.

It was the second time in Snider's career that he had three homers in one game, the other occasion coming against the Philadelphia Phillies May 30, 1950.

Other Brooklyn homers were hit by Peevée Reese, Jackie Robinson, and Roy Campanella.

Left-hander Billy Hoefi pitched his second straight shutout Wednesday, a two-hitter that ended Detroit Tigers' four-game losing streak with a 9-0 American League victory over Washington Senators.

Hoefi, who held Chicago Cubs Sox to six hits in his last start, struck out seven and walked five Wednesday at Briggs Stadium.

Tom Umphlett singled off Hoefi's glove in the first inning and not another Senator hit until Bob Kline hit a single over second base with one out in the seventh.

Jack Phillips drove in three Tiger runs with three of their 10 hits and a sacrifice fly. Al Kaline hit a two-run double and single.

New York Yankees edged Kansas City Athletics 3-1 in the first game of a day-night American League doubleheader at Kansas City.

Irv Noren's single in the ninth scoring Andy Carey broke a tie between Johnny Kucks and Roy Herbert. Then Mickey Mantle came home on Bill Hunter's bunt single to wrap up the game. Kucks pitched a two-hitter for the victory.

Ted Kluszewski whacked his 14th home run and Roy McMillan hit his first as Cincinnati Reds downed New York Giants 5-2 in the only day game in the National League. Joe Nuxhall held the Giants in check with a five-hit pitching job.

Nuxhall had a four-hit shutout until the ninth inning of the game at the Polo Grounds when Willie Mays followed a walk to Don Mueller with his 12th four-bagger. Jim Hearn, the Giants' starter, was tagged with the defeat.

Boston was at Chicago, Baltimore at Cleveland and New York at Kansas City again in night American League games. Three National League night games were on tap: Milwaukee at Brooklyn, Chicago at Philadelphia and St. Louis at Pittsburgh.

PITTSBURGH (AP)—Unbeaten southpaw Luis Arroyo recorded his sixth victory Wednesday night as he gave up only six hits in pitching his Cardinals to a 6-2 victory over the cellar dwelling Pittsburgh Pirates.

The Cardinals backed up Arroyo with a 12-hit attack. Ken Boyer and Bill Virdon led the hit parade, each getting three safeties.

Three-run third inning gave the Cards the victory and hung the fifth defeat on starter Bob Purkey. He has won two.

The Pirates bunched three of their hits in the second inning for all their runs.

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Sam Jones held Philadelphia to two hits in the first seven innings, but a pair of errors helped the Phillies post a 3-1 National League win over Chicago Cubs Wednesday night at Robin Roberts chalked up his eighth win on a six-hit performance.

The Cubs got their lone run on Ernie Banks' 12th homer in the fifth inning.

Roberts, who has lost only three, kept it tight all the way, fanning eight.

Jones gave way to a pinchhitter in the eighth and John Andre took over on the mound for the Cubs. The Cubs threatened in the ninth, loading the bases with two singles and a walk, but Dee Fondy fouled out to end the rally.

CLEVELAND (AP)—Early Wynn pitched a four-hit shutout and Al Smith hit a two-run homer Wednesday night as Cleveland Indians defeated Baltimore Orioles 5-0.

Wynn did not allow a hit until the sixth inning when Eddie Waitkus singled with two out. Smith's eighth homer of the year came after Wynn walked in the second.

Los Angeles Voters Turn Down Ball Park Project

LOS ANGELES (CP)—Despite prolonged clamor for big league baseball in Los Angeles, voters have rejected a proposed \$3,000,000 bond issue for a new park.

There was little enthusiasm for the issue. Opponents argued that the major league franchise would be operated by private interests and the public should not be asked to carry the financial burden of building the park.

Complete semi-official returns of Tuesday's general municipal election showed the park issue, which needed a two-thirds majority to pass, did not get even a simple majority.

Plan Big Sports Meet Here On Dominion Day

Centennial Sports Day, featuring a track and field meet at Memorial Field will be held here on Friday, July 1 (Dominion Day) by the Division of Physical Fitness in co-operation with the Charlottetown Abegweit Amateur Athletic Association.

Plans are being made to have every amateur club and every unattached amateur athlete in the Maritime take part in the events. The meet will be run under the A. A. U. of C. rules and all athletes participating must produce their 1955 amateur cards which can be secured by forwarding an application to W. W. Reid, Charlottetown.

Nova Scotia athletes can obtain their cards from Hugh A. Noble, 604 Dennis Building, Halifax and New Brunswick athletes from Stan Spicer, Fredericton.

In addition to the regular track and field events there will be a ten mile road race and ten mile bike race both of which will finish on Memorial Field.

Regular track and field events included: 100 yard dash; 220 yd. dash; 440 yd. dash; 880 yd. dash; 1 mile run; running broad jump; running broad (girls); running high

jump; running high (girls); pole vault; 100 yd. dash (girls); discus throw; shot put; hammer throw; javelin throw; hop, step and jump; 1 mile relay.

Clubs or associations can have three entries in each track and field event with a contestant entering as many events as he wishes. Each club or association will be entitled to enter a relay team of four in the mile relay and as many entries as desired in the ten mile run and ten mile bike race.

Regardless of these rules, however, the events will be run off by the officials as per the programme set up and there will be no delay of events to accommodate the entry of competitors.

Entries will be addressed to W. W. Reid, Director of Physical Fitness, P. O. Box 344, Charlottetown, P. E. I. Entries must be in the hands of Brigadier Reid not later than midnight June 28th. There will be no post entries.

There will be trophies, silver and bronze medals awarded to the leading competitors. A special award will be presented to the best overall athlete. There will be special prizes in the Ten Mile Road Race and the Ten Mile Bike Race.

Yanks Outstanding In 3rd Round Of U.K. Golf

ST. ANNES, England (AP)—Billy Joe Patton, golf's magnificent scrambler, and his American Walker cup teammates handed Britain their worst sports licking since Don Cockell took on Rocky Marciano as the British amateur golf championship completed its third round Wednesday.

Patton, whose personality has intrigued British golf followers as much as his unorthodox power-swinging has shocked the purists, led a parade of 11 Americans into the round of 32.

The colorful North Carolinian had to win two squeakers, both by one-up margins, and to eliminate another American, San Francisco's Ken Venturi, to reach the fourth round. He was joined there by Walker Cup team mates Dale Morey, Bruce Cudd, Joe Conrad and Jim Jackson; former Walker

Cupper Jimmy McHale; young Don Bispington and four little-known Americans.

They were James K. Bernard Jr. of Westboro, Mass.; Bert Weaver of Beaumont, Tex., a 23-year-old army man; George Coleman, Miami, Okla., but only a 65-year-old Boston J. Bridgeford, formerly of San Francisco but now a Paris resident.

The American delegation was cut on half Wednesday as the second half of the second round and all the third were played.

Survivors of Britain's Walker Cup forces were Irishman Joe Carr, the 1953 British amateur champion, and England's Phil Scrutton. Carr, Britain's strongest hope to stop the Americans, eliminated one of them, Joe Bullen Jr., a serviceman from Winston-Salem, N.C. 5 and 4 Wednesday.

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Possibility Of Poulton-McCluskey Fight In June

The possibility that Harry Poulton and Cobey McCluskey of Charlottetown may meet here around the last of June in a fight for the Maritime Middleweight Championship was seen yesterday.

Promoter Ivan Doherty has contacted both boys and is hopeful that satisfactory arrangements can be worked out for the long-awaited match.

The relative abilities of Poulton and McCluskey have long been disputed by fight followers. Both stand near the top among boys' standard middleweights. McCluskey is the number one contender and Poulton is number four.

They have fought all the leading middleweights in Canada and both have performed in United States rings. It is a very rare occasion when one City produces two leading fighters at the same time.

Next Monday night at Dartmouth McCluskey fights Willie Pollard in a 10 rounder while Poulton meets Eloi Durelle in Truro on June 16.

Several times the match was in the making but not until now has anything concrete ever been proposed. If the fight goes through it should be one of the best ever staged at the Forum and it should draw one of the biggest houses. There's more than money as the prize in this bout.

There's loads of professional boxing pride and a life-long reputation on the outcome. Poulton is working out with aggressive Gaston Roy at the Navy barracks in really rugged daily drills. Roy has accepted an offer from Nat Forman to meet colored Tommy Dixon of New York in Fredericton on June 15.

In Dixon, Roy is meeting the classiest opponent he has ever faced. Dixon has fought 58 professional fights and has only been stopped on one occasion. He has met Paulie Griffin and has fought a man who once beat Danny Taylor. The Roy-Dixon scrap is a ten rounder.

Canadiens To Name Coach Next Week

MONTREAL (CP)—Frank Selke managing director of Montreal Canadiens of the National Hockey League, said Wednesday a successor to coach Dick Irvin will be announced some time next week.

Irvin, coach of Canadiens for 13 years, recently was appointed coach of Chicago Black Hawks of the NHL.

Selke, chatting with reporters at the annual meeting of the NHL, declined to indicate who he has in mind as replacement.

Most frequently mentioned in speculation are Hector Toe Blake, Roger Leger and Billy Raey, all former Canadiens' players.
